However, <u>I suppose</u> there will be the usual number of intruders ... just as we had on Babies' Night when ten <u>million</u> grownups tuned in ... by mistake. After going to all that expense and trouble arranging a Babies' Night, we asked over two hundred infants in various parts of the country if they listened on that gala night. MISS ROSS De trink Canada Tri Gingherale by-de-glass.

JACK What?

MISS Ross De trink Canada Tri Gingherale by-de-glass.

JACK Funny, I can't understand you ... what do they do?

MISS ROSS (IN DISGUST)

De use Schmaltz' toothbicks.

JACK There you are, fellers ... <u>another victory for Canada Dry.</u>

MISS ROSS Bardon me, Mr. Pennec, I got some tree-minute boilet ecks on de vire, and de've

been dere an hour alreaty ... I gotta, run avay.

JACK All right, thanks for coming up, Miss Zinc.

# **ORCHESTRA & SHUTTA & FREY**

**JACK** 

Since announcing that tonight would be Boarder's Night, we have received thousands of letters inquiring about it. Here's a letter from a boarding-house keeper in Shower ... <u>Bath</u>, Maine ... This letter reads ... <u>all right</u>, <u>wait till I open it</u> ... it reads:

"WJZ BENNY,

Care of Station Canada Dry.

Dear <u>Cur</u>: (Imagine spelling <u>Sir</u> with a "<u>C</u>")

I listened in to your program the other night when you told a lady how to make a <u>Fran Frey</u>. I followed your rules closely, made the dish and served it to my fifteen boarders. I am now very anxious to keep the <u>seven</u> survivors, as boarders are hard to get these days. I have often heard you mention "Hotcha Gardner" on your program, which sounds <u>very</u> appetizing. Please advise me how you make it. Will be listening in Wednesday night.

All right, Mrs. Phane, tune me in clearly ... and listen. In the first place, this dish does <u>not</u> have to be a Hotcha <u>Gardner</u>. It could just as well be a Hotcha <u>Dumpling</u> ... or a Hotcha <u>Tamale</u> ... Now <u>which</u> do you prefer, Mrs. Phane?

MISS ROSS

I like it very plain.

**JACK** 

Say, is this a <u>radio</u> or a <u>telephone</u>?

But, first of all, what is <u>Hotcha</u>? ... It comes from that Latin gambling phrase, "<u>I gotcha</u>" ... and as in that other Latin word, "watcha" ... like "watcha-doing tonight?" ... #### 3. LITTLE FRAULEIN

#### **ORCHESTRA & SMALL**

JACK We have <u>another</u> surprise for you ... even for us. Tonight we bring you for the <u>first</u>

<u>time</u> on the air one of the well-known <u>boarders</u> of the world ... the <u>Mexican Border</u>. He comes direct to you from Rio <u>Grand</u> ... Street, where he is a well-known doormat ... I mean, <u>mat-a-dor</u>. His daily pastime is <u>fighting the bull!</u> ... And now may I

present to you Mr. ...er ... what's your name, sir?

RALPH ASHE (with Spanish accent)

I am Uncle <u>Don</u> Pedro ... from <u>Don</u>town ... and who are <u>you</u>?

JACK I am <u>Don</u> good and tired from playing golf.

ASHE The <u>Golf</u> of Mexico, Senor?

JACK All right, <u>I'll</u> tell the jokes on this program, Pedro ... I suppose you came here pre-

pared to entertain your fellow-boarders tonight?

ASHE Sie Sie, senor.

JACK You mean, see, see, senor.

ASHE Yes ... see, see, senor ... what's the diff'rance?

JACK Of course you're a <u>real</u> Mexican, aren't you Pedro?

ASHE See ... I was born in Mehchico.

JACK Born where?

ASHE <u>Mehchico</u>.

JACK <u>Mehchico</u> ... is that the way they pronounce it down there?

ASHE See ... See.

JACK Well, I was born in Brook<u>ch</u>lyn ... Anyway, it <u>mex</u> no difference. Tell us, Pedro, what

are you going to do to entertain us tonight?

ASHE I weel do like I do in Mehchico ... I will fight <u>de bool</u>.

JACK You will fight the bull? ... Did you hear that, you lucky customers? ... a bull fight

right in this studio ... Say, Pedro, did you bring the bull with you?

(SOUND EFFECT: Scraping of feet, moving chairs, etc.)

#### TRUMPET CALL

JACK Scram, everybody!

Ladies and gentlemen, you are about to witness a <u>fight to the finish</u> ... between Don Pedro, the <u>Mexican Border</u> ... and Joe Bull ... of <u>Bull</u>, Montana ... I know what

you're thinking of, you little customers, you.

This fight will be refereed by those four Mexican football players ... One <u>Don</u> and

three to go.

Here they come into the ring ... the first to enter is the Matador ... and his little

brother, <u>Cuspi</u> ... who will second him. All right, <u>Senor Olsen</u>.

(ORCHESTRA PLAYS OPENING BARS OF "TOREADOR" SONG FROM THE OPERA "CARMEN.")

SOUND EFFECT: BULL'S HOOFS.

FRAN FREY (bellowing) Ma-ax! ... Ma-ax!...

JACK AH! here comes the <u>bull</u>.

PAUL (loud) AND HOW!

SOUND EFFECT: GONG

JACK They are now in the center of the ring. The bull looks confident, but Don says it is

meat for him ... Jack Benny talking and Canada Dry Ginger Ale is paying.

ORCHESTRA BOYS (ad lib) Hooray! ... bravo! ... Boo! ... etc ... etc.

JACK Don grabs the bull by the horns, but the bull tears out of a clinch and chases Don

around the ring.

ASHE (muttering) Sacramento!

FRAN MA-AX ... MA-AX ... MA-AX ... MA-AX.

JACK Ah! he's paging the Four Maax Brothers ... Well, it looks like the Don is don ... But

<u>no</u>! ... he steps to the right and escapes a wild uppercut from the bull.

ASHE Sacramento!

JACK The bull is running away! ... Don is after him with his sword ... And how that bull

can take it ... What's this? ... they break and meet in the center. The bull leads a long

hoof to the jaw, nut Don counters to the <u>sirloin</u> with mashed potatoes ... <u>what a</u>

mash ... THEY BREAK AGAIN...

SOUND EFFECT: GONG

ORCHESTRA BOYS (ad lib)

HOORAY! ... BRAVO! ... DON PEDRO! ... BOO!

JACK (quickly) just as the gong brings the <u>first</u> round to a close.

Cuspi is working over Pedro ... while the bull is over in his corner, looking over the stock ticker.

And now I will give the mike to ... No, I will <u>not</u> plug any product between rounds...

PAUL SMALL (HIGH VOICE)

Get your Canada Dry Ginger ale, by-the-glass ... etc. etc.

BALDWIN (HEAVY VOICE)

You can't enjoy the bull fight without a glass of Canada Dry Ginger Ale made-to-order, etc. etc.

**THOMAS** Here, boy! give me fifteen glasses.

SMALL & BALDWIN (REPEAT THEIR LINES)

**JACK** That noise is just something that they <u>happen</u> to be selling ... sounds like Canada Dry Ginger Ale to me ... But who knows? Anyway, it's a swell drink with...

(SOUND EFFECT: GONG RINGS)

(Mumbling of crowd)

ROUND TWO! ... Kid Chocolate steps into Berg ... I mean, Don steps up to the bull with a knife and fork ... but the bull is in rare condition ... He steps away. Now they are feinting ... the bull is now charging Pedro ... I don't blame him. Who wants to work for nothing? ... And now they are clashing...

ANNOUNCER (INTERRUPTING)

Jack ... Jack! ... here's a note from the sponsors.

JACK A note from the sponsors, eh? ... Pardon me just a moment, folks ... So that's what the sponsors want ... Okay, I'll give it to them...

> They are still fighting ... and the bull sidesteps by courtesy of Canada Dry Ginger Ale ... they are now battling hoof to toe ... by courtesy of Canada Dry Ginger Ale ... there goes a <u>right to the bull's eye</u> ... by courtesy of Canada Dry ... another right ... now a left ... by courtesy of Canada Dry ... Pedro is down to the floor ... by courtesy of ... a left ... by courtesy of ... the bull ... Canada Dry ... Don Pedro ... by courtesy ... (Gives a heave) Ah!...

ANNOUNCER Ladies and gentlemen, Jack Benny has just collapsed ... thru the courtesy of Canada Dry Ginger Ale ... which is now sold by-the glass at all fountains.

Well, the <u>fight is over</u> ... and the bull is the winnah!

ORCHESTRA BOYS BRAVO! ... HORRAY! ... CHEERS, etc.

**ANNOUNCER** And now the bull will say a few words to the radio audience.

FRAN FREY (imitating bull) Hello, ma-a-a ... I'll be right ho-oome. **ANNOUNCER** 

George Olsen and his Orchestra will now play, "Such Is Life", sung by Ethel Shutta.

#### 4. SUCH IS LIFE

#### **ORCHESTRA & ETHEL SHUTTA**

**JACK** 

And now, <u>boarders</u>, stand by ... we have a bedtime story for you. Of course when I was a boarder, I never went to bed before three a.m., and I'm not asking <u>you</u> to go to bed. Just listen to our bedtime story and you'll easily fall asleep ... Of course, if you happen to be asleep already, that's <u>your gain</u> and <u>our loss</u>.

Once upon a time there were three little hunters who went into the woods to shoot some dice ... Dice are two little spotted animals who gallop along at the snap of your fingers and the word "ha!" ... Now the first little hunter saw a pair of dice ... which are just like leopards only they are red with white spots ... Now the way to handle these dice is to grab them and shake them up ... which this little hunter did, depositing two bits on the ground to catch two other bits ... Just then, there was a groan as he looked into snake eyes...

### ORCHESTRA BOYS (SNORE)

JACK What's that?

ETHEL (WHISPERS) That's a swell bedtime story, Jack, but not so loud. George and the boys are

already asleep.

JACK (STARTS TO YAWN) Well, so the policeman bid <u>one club</u> ... the umpire bid <u>a diamond</u> ... and

the undertaker bid one spade ... and the dummy bid them all good-night ...

what a fight for honors!...

ETHEL Jack, for heaven's sake, don't you fall asleep.

JACK Pardon me, Ethel ... so Eeeny said to Meeny, you stay here and Miny Moe ... as the

traffic is very heavy and he's liable to get run over. Just then little Boy Blue came along in a high-powered car and almost ran over Moe, and he said, "Little Boy Blue, come blow your horn" ... and Little Boy blew ... I think we ought to blow, Ethel.

(TERRIFIC SNORING HEARD)

Even the bull is asleep.

ETHEL No, that's <u>George</u>.

JACK We'll have to take George up as he has to play "The Scat Song" from the <u>Scat</u> and the

Fiddle. It will be sung by Hotcha Gardner ... who will sing it in his sleep.

## 5. SCAT SONG HOTCHA GARDNER

JACK That was the last number on the 24th program on the 20th of July. Were you bored,

boarders? ... hmmm? And next Monday we're going to have a Request Night, in

which we will do everything that we have been requested ... well, of course, net <u>everything</u> ... just the pleasant things ... Must leave you now, and as they say in Mehchico ... Say, Ethel, what do they say in Mehchico?

ETHEL I don't know Jack.

JACK Well, good-night, then.
