# 1. SING - (IT'S GOOD FOR YOU)

PAUL And now Jack Benny, the Canada Dry humorist.

JACK Hello Christmas shoppers...... this is Jack Benny, your boy-friend,

talking. And if you are doing your program shopping on your dial right now, stay with us...... because tonight is the night of all nights..... the treat-of-treats. Did you ever have a treat-of-treats, folks? No? Well, you just haven't lived, that's all. Tonight we have..... er, er..... yes folks, tonight we are going to offer –well stick around. You never can tell what we will have on this program. In fact, I don't know myself, but we have several suspicious characters hanging around this studio tonight and there might be a brokendown genius amongst them. Anyway, I know something will happen.

VOICE Hey! Are you Jack Benny?

JACK (It happened) What do you want?

VOICE It's very important. I'll see you later.

JACK And as I said before, how many of you people realize what tonight

is? It is Thursday. Yes, I'll admit that, but what does it mean? It means that you have only one year and nine days to do your next year's Christmas shopping...... I understand that this year Santa Clans is going around with just a moustache, and one reindeer.

MARY What are you talking about, Jack?

JACK What's the difference? It kills time. This is a <u>half hour</u> program. It's

almost over now.

MARY Jack, I hate to ask you this, but.....er, er,........

JACK What, Marry?

MARY You know last Sunday when you played "Grind Hotel"?

JACK Yes.

MARY Well, you didn't pay me for being the telephone operator.

JACK Oh, that's right, I forgot all about it..... Here, Mary.

MARY Thanks, Jack, but I think a telephone operator should get more than

that.

JACK Well, you know Mary, the hotel business isn't so good now. When

things pick up – well, after all, you were just a telephone operator.

MARY Yeah, but a girl has to keep plugging along......Get it, Jack?

(LAUGHS)

JACK Go, Mary. (THAT WASN'T part of this program, folks – just some

business I had to clear up.)

TED WEEMS Good-evening, Jack.

JACK Hello, Ted. How do you feel?

TED Oh, just <u>dashing!</u>

JACK Dashing?

TED Yes – how do you feel, Jack?

JACK Oh, ducky, Ted—just ducky! – That was Ted Weems, folks......

our cheer-leader -- a perfect gentleman, but overdoes it. You know Ted is the kind of a fellow who -well, if you owned a café and were going to hire a bouncer, you'd pass up Ted.. How about it, Ted?

TED Oh squash!

JACK Baked or mashed?

TED Just squash.

PAUL Say Jack.

JACK Yes, Paul?

PAUL While you are kidding around, doing nothing – do you mind if I use

the microphone just a moment?

JACK No – go right ahead, Paul. (Hm, advertising – I know. You can't get

rid of these guys.)

PAUL Ladies and gentlemen, whenever you buy a large bottle of Canada

And now, ladies and gentlemen, one of our big surprises of the evening. We are going to offer for your approval for the first time on the American air – our guest star of the evening.... that great and extinguished Vulgarian Violin virtuoso .... Senor Mox-Nix-Ouse. We have brought this (clears throat) ... this great artist up here tonight for the benefit of the music-lovers who have been writing us, asking for the better things in the line of entertainment. This gentleman I

refer to is not a selfish violinist. He has given concerts in back-yards for which he has not received <u>one penny</u>. Of course, it might have been a cheap neighborhood.... But anyway, he has also played in Germany where he received several <u>marks</u> for his work. In fact, he might get a few more marks up here this evening. I can feel it.

So now, ladies and gentlemen, let me present to you that famous

violinist, Mox-Nix-Ouse.

#### (ROUND OF APPLAUSE)

(not too much applause, fellows – watch your scripts.)

Say something, Moxie.

SARANOFF Vee gates, alla menschen?

JACK He says he is glad to be in this country – likes our tall buildings and

beautiful women and he might stay here for a while..... isn't that

right, Mox Nix?

SARANOFF Nein.

JACK He says he is going to play <u>nine</u> numbers. And what is your first

number?

SARANOFF Du bist faricht.

JACK He says his first number will be "Du Bist Faricht" from that famous

Viennese operetta, "Liederkranz".... is that right?

SARANOFF Cheese!

JACK Are you saying <u>cheese</u> – <u>chess</u> – or <u>yes</u>?

SARANOFF Yah!

(TERRIBLE SQUEAKY NOISE TUNNING UP VIOLIN)

JACK (He is now resin-ing his bow.) I suppose you want to tune up?

SARANOFF Yah – gif me an "A."

JACK All right, boys – a little cooperation with our guest artist. Give him

a loud "A" like this . (SINGS) "A".....

ORCHESTRA (SINGS) "A".....

SARANOFF No, not like dot. I vant vit moosic, like dis....

(HITS SOUR NOTE ON VIOLIN)

JACK Ha, ha – I noticed that little touch of technique, Mox Nix. But don't

worry- I have trouble with these boys, too. If they don't give you an

"A", we'll send out for one....... Has anybody got an "A" around

here? There's your "A" Mox-

SARANOFF Plays a "B" on violin.

JACK You're in perfect tune.

SAX GIVES AN "A"

CLARINET GIVES AN "A"

TROMBONE GIVES AN "A"

BASS HORN GIVES AN "A"

PAUL These A's come to you thru the courtesy of Canada Dry Ginger Ale,

made-to- order by the glass.

JACK Hmmm, I'm sorry I started this......All right, Mox Nix, go ahead.

SARANOFF (PLAYS OPENING BARS OF "SOUVENIR")

JACK That's supposed to be "Souvenir," folks.... I'd sooner hear the

"A"s".

SARANOFF Well, Mister Bennie, you see I'm a treeck violineest.

JACK Oh, you're a <u>trick</u> violinist. Why didn't you say so? Mary, after this

when you announce a guest star, please tell me their right specialties.... Here's a trick violinist, and I thought he was another Kreisler.

MARY He's a plumber, Jack. He fixed the pipes under our sink last week.

JACK (Mary, sh! ...... Don't lower the dignity of this program....) So

you're a trick violinist, eh?

SARANOFFF Yes, I'm er.....I mean, yah!...... Here's a list of my treecks.

JACK Hmm, quite a list! – Now his <u>first</u> trick, ladies and gentlemen, will

be playing a violin and a musical saw at the same time. (That should

be very good.) Go ahead!

SARANOFF (PLAYS "Yankee Doodle Dandy" – SOUND OF SAWING WOOD)

(ROUND OF APPLAUSE)

JACK Now his next trick, ladies and gentlemen, will be playing a violin

and saxophone simultaneously – and writing home for money at the

same time. Ready?

SARANOFF Yeah!

(SAXOPHONE AND VIOLIN PLAYING "YANKEE DOODLE"

## ALSO, CLICK OF TYPEWRITER)

### (ROUND OF APPLAUSE)

# (CLICK OF TYPEWRITER CONTINUES ALONE).

JACK (he is <u>still</u> writing home for money.)......Now Mox Nix, I'd like to

suggest a trick. You don't mind a few suggestions, do you?

SARANOFF No - vot you vant I should do?

JACK Well, I'd like to hear you play the violin – the cello and the bass

drum –(let's see, that leaves your mouth open) Say, play a jew's harp, then march out of the studio in perfect rhythm...... Is that

clear?

SARANOFF Yah.

JACK Have you got all your instruments?

SARANOFF Yah.

(SOUND OF INSTRUMENTS DROPPING)

JACK Here you are, Mox Nix..... You dropped your clarinet..... All

right now, go!!

(PLAY BAGPIPE MUSIC ON JEW'S HARP – ALSO DRUM ROLL)

JACK Now right out of the studio – that's it!...... All right, quick Mary!

Slam the door.

(TEFFIFIC DOOR SLAM)

Play something, Ted – and I don't want any tricks!

#### 3. I'VE GOT A RIGHT TO SING THE BLUES

JACK That was Andrea Marsh singing, "Minnie the Moocher".....

Say Paul.

PAUL Yes, Jack.

JACK I've got to tell you a story I heard today. It's the cutest thing you ever

heard.

PAUL Yeah?

JACK Yeah—really, this will kill you.

PAUL Go ahead, then.

JACK Wait, you'll die at this...... Mary, come here – I want you to hear

this, too.

MARY Hear what?

JACK This story – it's marvelous. Now get this – a dollar and a penny were

having an argument (now stop me if you've heard it - you , too, listeners...) Now a dollar and a penny were having an argument.

See?

... You know, one of those little petty personal things, get it? Oh, you

know how a dollar always tries to bulldoze a penny.

PAUL Sure.

JACK Well, anyway, in the middle of this argument, the dollar got very

nasty, turned to the penny and said:

"Huh, I don't see why I should even stand here fighting with you,

I'm worth a <u>hundred</u> of you!"

And the little penny looked up and said:

"I'm better than you are ---

JACK-MARY- PAUL I go to Church Sundays.

JACK I see.... Ted, come here. I thought you told me that was a very <u>new</u>

story.

TED Well, Paul told it to me.

JACK Where did you hear it, Paul?

PAUL I got it from Mary.

JACK Where did you get it, Mary?

MARY Well, I read it in Burns and Allen's script.

JACK Oh, you did – eh? Well, wait till I call up Burns and Allen..... Give

me that phone. Oh, a dial phone, eh?

(SOUND EFFECT, FIVE TERRIBLE CLICKING SOUNDS OF PHONE DIAL)

(This phone is a little hoarse, folks).... Hello, Burns and Allen?

MARY (IMITATING GRACIE ALLEN –THRU MECHANIC) Yes.

JACK Gracie?

MARY Yes

JACK This is Jack Benny.

MARY Come on up.

JACK I'm in the Studio.

MARY Bring him up, too.

JACK Say Gracie, where did you got that story about the dollar and the

penny?

MARY Oh, the story about the dollar and the penny?.... Why. George told it

to me.

JACK Well, who told George?

MARY My brother ....my brother tells him everything. I think it's the cutest

story -don't you think so, Jack?

JACK Yes.

MARY I think so.... My brother made it up. He makes up the silliest stories.

Just the other day he told me this one –what's the difference between?

JACK Between what?

MARY That's it (SILLY LAUGH)

(SOUND EFFECT: HANGING UP PHONE)

JACK Play Guy – or, I mean, Ted!

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#### 4. COME TO ME

(FOURTH ROUTINE)

PAUL Hello, folks. This is your announcer – Paul Douglas – speaking.

Jack Benny has quit work for the day and has taken the gang to the soda fountain. So now, if you will stand by for a moment, we will

tune you into the Nickel-back Soda Fountain.

(SOUND EFFECT: STATIC OF RADIO.. ATMOSPHERIC SOUNDS AT SODA FOUNTAIN: CHARGED

WATER, CLINK OF GLASSES, BUZZING OF VOICES)

BLANCHE STEWART (IST CLERK) - What can I do for you, Madame?

MRS. MARSH (IST CUSTOMER) - I'd like a lollipop for my boy.

BLANCHE What size does he wear?

MRS. MARSH Vanilla.

BLANCHE Here's a nice lollipop. I think it will just fit his mouth.

BLANCHE (2ND CLERK) Here's your butterscotch, lady.... What's yours, sir?

WASHBURN Five cents worth of jelly beans.

BLANCHE We're all out of jelly beans. How about a nice alarm clock?

WASHBURN What kind of gum have you?

BLANCHE Chewing gum.

WASHBURN Pardon me, I wanted an inner tube.

BLANCHE Two counters down.

(MORE CHARGED WATER AND ATMOSPHERIC COUNTER NOISES)

PARKER GIBBS (FRESH CLERK) What's yours, Buddy?

RED INGELS Gimme a large Canada Dry ice Cream Soda.

GIBBS And yours sir?

ELMO TANNER Make mine a frosted window pane.

JACK BENNY Hey, clerk.

GIBBS Yeah?

JACK I'll have a floating kidney.

GIBBS Just a moment – here's your Canada Dry Soda...... What's yours,

sir?

ELMO TANNER Give me a hot chocolate.

GIBBS Do you want crackers with it?

ELMO No, steak and onions.

JACK Say, clerk, give me a large glass of Canada Dry made-to-order. I got

to try that.

GIBBS I'll get yours later.... What do you want, young fellow?

PAUL I want a nickel back on this large Canada Dry bottle.

TED I'll have a cherry slap.

JACK A cherry slap!...... you mean, a cherry <u>punch</u>.

TED Well, if you want to get rough about it – yes.

GIBBS Say, is that Ted Weems?

JACK Yes.

GIBBS Are you Jack Benny?

JACK Yeah.

GIBBS Of the Canada Dry program?

JACK You said it!

GIBBS Well, if we weren't broadcasting, would I tell you something......

Now listen, I've heard a lot of guys on the air, and are you two mugs

ungood!

JACK Take your glasses off and say that again.

GIBBS I'm not wearing glasses.

JACK I mean the glasses off the counter.

GIBBS There you are. (TERRIFIC GLASS CRASH) Now what?

JACK It's a good thing our half hour is up – play, Ted.

#### 5. BABY

(CLOSING ROUTINE)

Jack That was the last number of the 66<sup>th</sup> program on the 15<sup>th</sup> of Decem-

ber ....and if you will remember, last Sunday night our little stock company gave you our version of "Grind Hotel." Well, next Sunday night we are going to offer for your improvement .... Our version of

"Unusual Interlude." So until then – hello!

MARY Oh Jack, you know Christmas is only nine days off.

JACK I know, Mary.

MARY What are you going to buy me for Christmas?

JACK What would you like?

MARY Oh, any little thing – I don't care....You know, I saw the cutest dia-

mond bracelet in a window on Fifth Avenue today.

JACK You did?

MARY Yes – and I was just thinking that if someone was fool enough to buy

it for me -

JACK I get it - I get it.

MARY What would <u>you</u> like for Christmas, Jack?

JACK Oh, any little thing, I don't care ... I saw the cutest little Empire

State Building on Fifth Avenue today.

MARY Come on, Jack.

JACK Good-night, folks,

ANNOUNCER When you order Canada dry for your holiday entertaining – don't
