(AFTER COMMERCIAL, MUSIC UP AND DOWN)

DON: THE LUCKY STRIKE PROGRAM, STARRING JACK BENNY. WITH MARY LIVINGSTONE, PHIL HARRIS, ROCHESTER, DENNIS DAY AND "YOUTS TRULY" DON WILSON.

(APPLAUSE. MUSIC UP AND DOWN)

DON: LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, THIS IS OUR FINAL BROADCAST OF THE SEASON..AND AS YOU KNOW, FAREWELLS APE ALWAYS SAD..AND DOING THE FINAL PROGRAM IS ALWAYS SAD...SO, WITHOUT FURTHER ADO, WE BRING YOU RADIO'S SADDEST COMEDIAN..JACK BENNY.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Thank you, thank you...hello again, this is Jack Benny talking...and Don, that was a rather puzzling introduction

DOM: Puzzling?

JACK: Yes...only last Sunday, in honor of National Pickle Week,
you said I was a barrel of Fun... And it pusses mo to this
that in one short week, E could deteriorate from a Barrel
of Fun to Radio's Saddest Comedian... How could that be?

DON: It's really very simple, Jack...A pickle is something sour. According to Webster's dictionary, sour means morose. morose means gloomy..gloomy means sad.. So it's very logical for you to go from National Pickle Week to radio's saddest comedian..See?

JACK: Oh...Well Don, I've looked in Webster's Dictionary myself..

And I found that when you pickle a thing, it's submerged in brine..when it's submerged in brine, it's preserved..when it's preserved, it's canned, and that's exactly what you are, goodbyeAnd now ladies and gentlemen, having said farewell to beautiful Don Wilson, we continue with ours-

PHIL: You wanna bet, Donzy?

JACK: Hmmmm..speaking of things pickled, here's Phil Harris.

PHIL: You can stop with that too, Jackson. I ain't had a drink in two weeks..since Femley had his accident.

JACK: Remley had an accident?..What happened to him?

PHIL: Oh, it was horrible, Jackson. Ghastly. He was carrying a bowl full of gold fish when somebody yelled, "Bottom's Up."

JACK: You mean...????

PHIL: Yep....Drained it, send and all.

JACK: Gee, Phil, I'm sorry to hear that about Frankle. It must have been awful.

PHIL: He didn't mind the fish, but that water nearly killed him!

JACK: Look Phil, why don't you --

DON: Jack, I hate to interrupt but I'm really worried about your firing me.

JACK: Oh, for goodness sakes, Don, I was only kidding...I wouldn't fire you. You've been with me for fifteen years...Cut your salary, maybe, but not fire you...So forget it.

DON: Oh, I guess I was silly to let it bother me... After all, you couldn't be that cheap.

MARY: (COMING IN) You wanna bet?

JACK: Oh. hello Mary.

DON: Hello, Mary.

MARY: Hello, Don.

PHIL: Hiya, Liv.

MARY: (ALA PHIL) Hello Curly..you Aly Kahn of Encino.

PHIL: (EMBARRASSED) Aw, cut it out, Livvy..you're embarrassing me.

JACK: Oh fine, look who's trying to act modest.

MARY: Yeah..on the bumper of his car he has a rubber stamp that says, "You Lucky Pedestrian, You've Just Been Hit By Phil Harris."

JACK: That's right.

DON: Mary, you're kidding.

MARY: No I'm not...Jack, take off your shirt and show him.

JACK: Wery, he hit me while I was bending over and let's forget it.

.. By the way Don, since this is our final show of the
season, where are you going on your vacation?

DOM: I'm going to spend two glorious weeks at the Brown Derby

JACK: That's nice ... What are you going to do, Mary?

MARY: Well, my sister Babe is coming to visit me, and we're going hunting.

JACK: Hunting? Isn't that more of a sport for a man?

MARY: That's what Babe's hunting for.

JACK: Oh, well it's a shame Nature gave her such bad emmunition.

What about your vacation, Phil?

FHIL: I can't take any, Jackson, I'm making a picture for Twentieth Century Fox.

JACK: Oh .. what's the name of it?

PHIL: "Take Me Out To The Brewery."

JACK: Good good..that's a nice title.

MARY: Say, Jack, before we went on the air, you said you were going to do something special on the program today... What is it?

JACK: Well Mary, I thought it would be nice on this last show to introduce all the people connected with the program....end

I'd like to start off by presenting Bill Days, Marty Spurzel,
Gurney Bell and Bob Stevens...better known as the Sportsmen
Quartet..Hiya, Fellows.

QUART: HMMMM.

JACK: And a Happy HARRIN to you, too..Don, have the boys prepared a number?

DOM: Yes/Jack..they're going to offer their version of Frank Loesser's new song hit.. "Baby, It's Cold Outside."

JACK: But Don, that number needs a girl singer, too.

DON: I know, and we're fortunate to have with us the girl who made the popular recording of that song with Johnny Mercer..

None other than Margaret Whiting.

JACK: Margaret Whiting! Is she here?

MARGARET: Yes Jack. Hollo. everybody.

JACK: Hello, Margaret.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: (LOCKS AT HER) Well, now I see where Nature sent all the good ammunition...But Margaret, it's swell having you here with us...This is really a surprise.

MARY: Some surprise..you've been arguing salary with her for three weeks.

JACK: Mary, stop...I really am surprised to see Margaret.

MARY: Oh.. Well then what is she doing here?

MARGARET: I lost the argument.

JACK: Yes yes..my agent is a regular bulldog....Well, look

Wargaret, before you sing, I'd like you to meet my

orchestra leader. Oh Phil. this is Margaret Whiting.

MARGARET: Hello, Phil.

PHIL: Well, Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition.

JACK: Say Margaret , I understand this record you made with

Johnny Mercer is a sensational hit. They're selling

like hot cakes.

MARGARET: Yes Jack, and I'm very happy about it... By the way, did

you buy one of the records?

JACK: No, I didn't,...I figured that as long as you're a guest

on my progrem, you'd bring me one.

JACK: Newsreels, Newsreels... One little camera when I bought my

new suit, and she makes a big thing out of it Now

Margaret, are you ready to do your song with the quartet?

MARGARET: Yes Jack, who's going to accompany us?

PHIL: My orchestra, honey.

MARGARET: Well, praise the Lord and pass the Bromo Seltzer.

JACK: Well look, Margaret, if you don't want Phil's music,

perhaps I can accompany you on my violin.

MARGARET: Well...

JACK: Well, what?

MARGARET: That puts me between the devil and the deep blue eyes.

JACK: Thank you...And now, ladies and gentlemen...Margaret

MARGARET: I REALLY CAN'T STAY.

WUART: BUT BABY, IT'S COLD OUTSIDE.

MARGARET: THIS EVENING HAS BEEN

"UART: BEEN HOPIN' THAT YOU'D DROP IN

MARGARET: SO VERY NICE

QUART: WE'LL HOLD YOUR HANDS, THEY'RE JUST LIKE ICE.

MARGARET: MY MOTHER WILL START TO WORRY

(CRCHESTRA INTERLUDE)

MARGARET: I SIMPLY MUST GO

QUART: BUT BABY, A LUCKY STRIKE

MARGARET: I HATE YOU TO KNOW.

QUART: THE KIND THAT YOU ALWAYS LIKE

MARGARET: I LEAVE WITH REGRET

wUART: A WONDERFUL CIGARETTE

MARGARET: AND THAT'S A FACT.

QUART: SO ROUND AND FIRM AND FULLY PACKED

MARGARET: SC DARLING, IF YOU GET LONESOME

~UART: THAT'S WHY WE ALWAYS OWN SOME

MARGARET: RENERBER ALL THOSE LUCKIES BY YOUR SIDE

QUART: WHAT'S THE SENSE OF HURTIN' PRIDE

MARGARET: YOU KNOW WHAT I LIKE

QUART: IT MUST BE THE S

"UART. & MARG: LET'S SMOKE A LUCKY STRIKE.

(APPLAUSE)

(medium unitarial)

JACK: That was Margaret Whiting and the Sportsmen Quartet singing "Beby, It's Cold Outside." ... Thank you, Miss Whiting... And now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I'd like you to meet the man who is responsible for all the musical commercials that we do with the quartet... My arranger, Mr. Mahlen Merrick.

(APPLAUSE)

MAHLON: Thank you, Area

JACK: Mahlen, how long have you studied music?

MAHLON: Oh, I've never studied music, Jack.

JACK: Never studied music? Then how come you're qualified to make arrangements for Phil Harris's orchestra?

MAHLON: I used to work in a boiler factory.

JACK: Oh.

MAHLON: Every summer I go back there for a rest.

JACK: Well, I don't blame you....And now, to get on with the introductions. I'd like to present an actor that I'm sure our listeners always walt for ... Mr. Kitzel, are you here?

ARTIE: Hoo hoo hoo.

(APFLAUSE)

JACK: Mr. Eltzel, I haven't seen you for a few days..where have you been?

ARTIE: I went to the Rita Hayworth - Aly Kahn weoding.

JACK: Oh, ...Well, Mr. Kitzel, that must have been thrilling.

ARTIE: Thrilling! When Rita said "I do" I got so excited I fell in the swimming pool.

JACK: Oh, you're kidding. You didn't fall in their swimming yool.

ARTIE: Smell me.

JACK: Oh, oh, oh...Well, Mr. Kitzel, you've appeared on hy program many times during the last lew years...Now how about telling the listeners who you really are.

ARRIE: (STELICAT) Ill be glad to; Jack ramp name is Antie
Auerbach.

JACK: Well, Artie, I want to thank you for all the laughs you've brought to the show and I'm glad you're going to be with us again next Fall.

ARTIE: Thereto Jack, and while you're away on your vacation, I wish govern drop me a post card now and then.

JACK: Sure, what's your address, Artio?

ARTIE: 4270 Riverton Avenue, B.H.

JACK: B.H.? Is that Beverly Hills?

ARTIE: (III AGAIN) No, dotle Boyle Heights.....Goodbye, Mr. Being Boy.

JACK: Goodbye, Mr. Kitzel.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: And now ladies and gentlemen, I'd like to introduce another telented actor named Joe Kearns. You know him as Ed, the man who guards my underground vault...He's been there for years, and thenever I go down to get money..he always says--

KEARNS: Helt, who goes there. friend or foe?

JACK: Frieni.

KEARNS: What's the Password?

JACK: Home, 1987 the foot of wil evil-

KEARNS: Oh, it's you, Mr. Benny.

JACK: Yes, Ed...I'd like to get some money for my Summer vacation ... I'm going to drive to New York.

LEONARD: Okay, it's your show.

JACK: Good, good...At this moment, folks.. I'd like to present Frank Nelson .. Let's see, where is he...Oh Mister, Mister..

NELSON: YESSSSSSSSSSSS.

JACK: Are you Frank Nelson, the actor?

NELSON: What do you think I'm doing with the script in my hand, swatting flies?

JACK: All right, all right, I just want the people to meet you...

But you know, Frank, it's funny .. whenever I run into you

on the program, you're always so antagonistic toward me.

NELSON: Yes.

JACK: Well look, Frank/.that's just on the program...but in real I life, do you really hate me?

NELSON: 0000000HHH, DO I?

JACK: Thank you, Frank Nelson.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Ladies and Gentlemen, a radio program is only as funny as the writers make it, and I happen to be fortunate enough to have four of the greatest, most talented, most original, most versatile writers in the entire industry...Mary, introduce my writers.

MARY: Why don't you introduce them?

JACK: Every time I look at them I get sick...All right, I'll do it... My writers are Sam Perrin, Milt Josefsberg, George Balzer, and John Tackaberry!

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Sam, I understand you're going to spend your vacation at the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas.

SAM: Yes, and thanks for mentioning it, Junk, now I won't have to pay.

JACK: And George, you're going to spend your vacation at the Del Mar Hotel in Delmar.

GEORGE: Thanks for mentioning it, Jack, now I won't have to pay.

JACK: And Tack, you're going to spend your vacation at the Shamrock Hotel in Houston.

TACK: Thanks for mentioning it, Jack, now I won't have to pay.

JACK: And Milt, you're going to spend your vacation at your brother's house in Brooklyn.

MILT: Thanks for mentioning it, Jack, but he's still going to charge me.

JACK: he has to, I own his house..... And working in close cooperation with me and the writers is our little script girl.. Jeanette Eymann.

JENNY: (COMPHY) Hello Blue Eyes, I'm going to miss you this summer.

JACK: She can't type .. but she's a good secretary ... You know folks, all the people I introduced here tonight will be with us again next season as well as my regular cast.

DENNIS: Me too, Mr. Benny?

JACK: Yes, you too, Dennis .. And don't do enything silly right now because I was just gonna talk about you.

DENNIS: You were?

JACK: Yeah .. I was gonna say that you're talented, clever, versatile, and you're looked up to as one of the most promising personalities in radio...and you know what that means coming from me.

DENNIS: Yeth, when you're all washed up you'll want me to give you a job.

JACK: Emma.

MARY: Lennis, Jack really meant what he said, and I feel the same way .. You're not only a fine entertainer, but you're modest, considerate, kind, and one of the nicest boys I've ever met.

DENNIS: "I can understand it coming from you.

MARY: Wr.J?

DENNIS: You're nuts about me.

JACK: All right, all right... Look Dennis, it's time for your song. What's it gonna be?

DEMNIS: I'm going to sing "Three Wishes", which is my latest recording.

JACK: Good.

DENNIS: On sale at all music stores.

JACK: Dennis--

DENNIS: Saventy-five cents.

JACK: Dennis, sing!

DENNIS: Chay.

(APPLAUSE)

(DENNIS'S SONG -- "THREE WISHES")

(APPLAUSE)

(THIRD ROUTINE) -15-

JACK: That was Dennis Day singing his latest recording, "Three Wishes."

DENNIB: On the other side is "A Kiss In The Dark."

JACK: I know, I know..Ladies and Gentlemen, there are two telephone operators on my program whom you have enjoyed many times...Bea Benadaret who plays the part of Gertrude...and Sera Berner who plays the part of Mable.

DON: / Jack, I don't see the girls around.

JACK: You don't?...Well then maybe they're still at the switchboard..I'll pick up the phone and find out..

(SOUND: RECEIVER UP..CLICK CLICK OF RECEIVER.. FADING TO BUZZ BUZZ OF SWITCHBOARD.)

BEA: On Meble?

SARA: What is it, Gertrude?

(APPLAUSE)

BEA: Mr. Benny's line is flashing.

SARA: I wonder what Knock On Fir Bent Door wents now?

BEA: Shell I enswer it end find out?

SARA: Let him weit. I had a date with him last week to go to the movies and he kept me waiting two hours. . If I wasn't eitting down, I'da got awfully tired.

BEA: Sitting down?

SARA: Yeah, when Mr. Benny takes you to the movies, he meets you inside.

BEA: I know what you mean. he's a slick one. Once he took me up on Mulholland Drive, shut off the motor, and then he said "You know, Honey, my back itches. would you mind rubbing it for me?"

SARA: So?

BEA: Then he said, "I want to take my shirt off. Would you mind closing your eyes?"

SARA: All right, so you closed your eyes and rubbed his back.

BEA: Rubbed his back nothing. when I got through I found out I --- simonized his car.

SARA: / Well, of all the --

(SOUND: CLICK CLICK OF RECEIVER)

JACK: Operators..operators..Gartrude..Mable.

(SOURD: RECEIVER DOMM)

JACK: Folks, I really did want you to meet them, but I guess the switchboard is busy...And now, Ladies and gentlemen, I'm going to introduce one of the most versatile actors in radio..Mel Blanc.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: As you may or may not know, Mel plays several parts on my program. For instance..when I come downstairs in the morning and walk into my den, he looks at me and says --

MEL: (TWO SQUAWKS)

JACK: Oh, hello Polly.

MEL: HELLO.. (SQUANK AND WHISTLE)

JACK: Many times the Folly had to listen to me take my violin lesson. but Folly never complained, because she knew my French Violin Teacher was also Mel Blanc.

MEL: (AS PROFESSOR LEELANC) No no no no, Monsieur Benny..How many times must I tell you it is not..(TO EXERCISES) DA ---- Ch, what's the use..Monsieur Benny, my money please.

JACK: Then every once in awhile on my travels, I have to take a train..and at the railroad station, again you hear Mel Blanc.

MEL: (FILTER) TRAIN LEAVING ON TRACK FIVE FOR ANAHEIM, AZUSA,
AND CUC --

JACK: And he also does-2

MEL: --AMONGA.

JACK: Yes --- Then sometimes I decide not to take the train .and go by automobile.. And when I get in my car, and step on the starter, does the motor start?..No, it's Mel Blanc.

MEL: (DOES CAR STARTING BIT)

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Thank you, Wel, and good luck with that wonderful novelty song you wrote. "Big Bear Lake"...which you-recorded with the Sportsmen Quartet..well, folks, the program is almost over and it looks as though we've brought on everybody -- except--- (SCUND: PHONE RINGS)

JACK: There he is now.

(SCUMD: RECEIVER UP)

JACK: Hello.

ROCH: HELLO, LP. BENNY. THIS IS ROCHESTER.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Oh, Hello, Rochester..have you got my car ready for my trip?

ROCH: ALMOST, BOSS. I'M LOOKING FOR A PIECE OF CHEESECLOTH SO I
CAN STRAIN THE OIL INTO THE CRANK CASE.

JACK: But Rochester, the last time you poured the oil right out of the can..you didn't bother to strain it.

ROCH: I KNOW..AND WHEN YOU DROVE AWAY, THE EXHAUST PIPE KEPT SPITTING SARDINES.

JACK: Oh yes, I remember...Well, anyway it'll be a long automobile trip to New York, so be sure and put my Charlie's Aunt costume in the back seat.

ROCH: YOUR CHARLIE'S AUMT COSTUME?

JACK: Yes..the skirt, the blouse and my sheerest mylons.

ROCH: OH BOSS, WHY GO THROUGH ALL THAT..IF YOU GET A FLAT THEE, FIX IT YOURSELF.

JACK: I know what I'm doing, anyway I'll be home right after the program, so have everything ready.

ROCH: OKAY...GOODBYE.

JACK: Goodbye.

ROCH: OH SAY, BOSS.

JACK: What is it?

ROCH: I HAPPENED TO GLANCE AT THE ROAD MAP AND I NOTICE THAT YOU'RE DRIVING EAST THE WAY YOU ALWAYS DO.

JACK: That's right..I'm going straight to the Mississippi River.
then I turn North, go up to Canada, through Terento, across
to Quebec, end then down the East Coast.

ROCH: YOU DON'T HAVE TO DO THAT THIS YEAR, BOSS. WHEN YOU GET TO THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER, YOU CAN GO RIGHT ACROSS NOW.

JACK: I can?

ROCH: YEAH, THEY TOOK THE TOLL OFF THAT BRIDGE.

JACK: Good, good. Well, so long, Rochester.

ROCH: GOODBYE.

(SOULD: RECEIVER DOWN)

(APPLAUSE)

JACK: Sell, I guess that just about winds up another--

DOM: Oh Jack. Jack.

JACK: Yes, Don.

DON: While you were talking to Rochester, a gentleman dropped in to see you. He's from Washington.

JACK: From Weshington?

CLARK: Yes., my name is Vernon L. Clark. I'm from the United States
Treasury Department.

JACK: The Treesury Department?

WARY:Jack, get up off your knees, he's here to give you something.

JACK: Oh. Ch. I'm sorry. I mean, I'm happy. I mean, what is it?

OHARK: Well Jack: you don't mind if I call you Jack, do you?

JACK: No no, Vernon, it's all right.

CIARK: Well Jack, I'm here to thank you on behalf of the Treasury

Department for the motion picture short you made to spur on
the Opportunity Bond Drive.

JACK: Well, thank you very much.

CLARK: I think the title of this picture—"The Spirit of Forty-nine."

-- is very appropriate and when it is released in all the theaters in the country, I am sure it will be very successful in stimulating the sale of more bonds

JACK: Well, I hope so, too. And by the way, Mr. Clark. I can appreciate the responsibility you have in the Treasury Department because I happen to be the treasurer of the Beverly Hills Beavers Club. and all of us kids got \$13.75 together to buy a twenty-five dollar savings bond.

CIARK: And you're one or the kids?

JACKs Well, I'm the only gray one.
