JANET: We live here in Beverly Hills.

JACK: Oh ... Are you the no-starch or the rough-dry Rawlinsons?

HERBERT: I'm afraid I don't --

RENITA: Mr. Benny's a comedian ... he's always making jokes.

JACK: Yes, did you hear the one about --

COLMAN: Come on, let's go into the next room and play Bridge.

HERRERT: But what about Mr. Benny?

BENITA . He's going to stay here and watch his picture on television.

JACK: Yes yes ... have a good game.

HERBERT

& JANET: Thank you.

(SOUND: FOOTSTEPS ... DOOR OPENS & CLOSES ...

SCUFFLING OF CHAIRS)

HERBERT: I see you have everything all set up.

BENITA: Yes, that's one thing Ronnie is serious about, his bridge playing.

COIMAN: Let's cut for deal, Herber ---

(SOUND: CUTTING OF CARDS)

HERBERT: Nine.

COLMAN: Six ... you deal.

(SOUND: SHUFFLING OF CARDS AND CARDS BEING DEALT THROUGH FOLLOWING SPEECHES)

JANET: Benita, it must be amusing living next door to a professional comedian.

BENITA: Oh, it is rather fun .. sometimes he gets Ronnie hysterical...

Doesn't he, Ronnie?

DJ

CCLMAN: Yes, sometimes I foam at the mouth.

JANET: By the way, did something strange happen in Beverly Hills lately?

COLMAN: No, why?

JANET: As we drove up your street, there was a buzzard circling overhead.

BENITA: Well, that is strange.

(SOUND: STOP DEALING)

COLMAN: It's your bid, Herb.

HEREERT: I pass.

BENITA: Two clubs.

JANET: By me.

COLMAN: Two no trump.

HERBERT: By.

BENITA: Four clubs.

JANET: By.

COLMAN: Five clubs.

HERBERT: Pass.

BENITA: Pass.

JAMET: Pass ... You're dummy, eh, Ronnie?

COLMAN: That's right.

RENITA: And it's your lead, Janet.

(SOUND: DOOR OPENS)

JACK: Well, how's the game coming along?

BENITA: (SURPRISED) / Jáck, I thought you were watching your picture

on television.

JACK: No, they made an announcement saying they're postponing it

till next week.

COLMAN: On no, they can't do that to ust

JACK: I felt the same way ... Well, you folks go ahead with your

game ... Don't worry about little me ... I'll just watch.

JANET: Well, it's my lead ... I'll play the eight of hearts.

BENITA: Two of hearts from the table.

HERBERT: Queen of hearts.

BENITA: (VERY SLOWLY) Let's see ... I think I'll play this --

JACK: No, no, no, no, no, not that one.

BENITA: I don't know what to do.

JACK: Play the black three and freeze the deck That's what

I'd do,

COLMAN: (MAD) JACK, WE'RE PLAYING BRIDGE, NOT CANASTA.

JACK: Oh, well, I can't see from way back here.

HERBERT: If I move over, perhaps you can --

(SOUND: ASH TRAY FALLING ON FLOOR)

JANET: Oh, Herbert, you knocked the ash tray off the table.

HERBERT: What a shame .. I got ashes all over the rug.

JACK: That's all right, I'll clean it up ... I'll get the Hoover ..

Herbert ... HA HA HA HA HA . ?. Don't you folks get it?...

Herbert Hoover ... That's what we comedians call a "switch",

BENITA: Ronnie, you're foaming at the mouth again.

COLMAN: (VERY ANGRY) Look Jack, we're trying to play Bridge, so if

you don't mind, would you please --

(SOUND: PHONE RINGS)

DJ

COLMAN: I'll get it.

(SOUND: FOOTSTEPS .. RECEIVER UP)

COLMAN: Hello?

ROCH: HELLO, MR. COLMAN, THIS IS ROCHESTER.

COLMAN: Yes?

ROCH: I FIXED MR. BENNY'S TELEVISION SET AND I HEARD THEM ANNOUNCE THAT MR. BENNY'S PICTURE WAS CALLED OFF.

COLMAN: That's right.

ROCH: WELL, WITHOUT BEATING AROUND THE BUSH, WOULD YOU LIKE TO GET RID OF HIM.

COLMAN: Yes yes, I would.

ROCH: THEN TELL HIM I JUST HEARD THE BURGLAR ALARM GO OFF IN HIS VAULT.

COLMAN: Just a minute ... On Jack?

JACK: Yes?

COIMAN: Rochester is on the phone and he said the burglar alarm in your vault just went off.

(SOUND: LOUD WIND WHISTIE ... DOOR SLAMS)

COLMAN: / I told him, Rochester.

ROCH: I KNOW, HE'S HERE.

COLMAN: Well, let me ask you something .. Did the burglar alarm really go off?

ROCH: NO AND MY BIRTHDAY IS MARCH TWENTY-THIRD!

COLMAN: Thank you Rochester!

(APPLAUSE AND PLAYOFF)

(APPLAUSE)

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DON:

Jack will be back in just a moment, but first .. with Washington's birthday almost here, let's go back to Colonial days.
