SCOOP DANCES AS BORDER OF LABEL MOVES INTO SCENE.

VENETIAN BLINDS DROP

BLINDS CLOSE REVEALING "LUCKY STRIKE" LABEL

...It's toested....

(CLAP...CLAP...CLAP)

....Cigarette.

BR

(AFTER OPENING COMMERCIAL, JACK COMES OUT TO MUSIC AND APPLAUSE.)

JACK

Thank you, thank you, thank you, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Lucky Strike Program. I know that many of you must be surprised to see me here because you probably read in the paper that I was in the hospital... end I was. As a matter of fact, I was there for two days. I didn't want to go but I had to. You see, the publicity was out already ... But it's just as well that I went because I did have a slight touch of Pancreatitis. Years ago they called it a stomach ache, but now that I'm doing well, it's Pancrestitis ... If Jackie Gleeson ever gets it, they'll have to find a new word....Anyway, while I was in the hospital, I had a complete physical checkup and even though I'm in very good condition, they did recommend that I have my appendix taken out...which I intend to do. I don't know just when, but I'm trying to get e guest shot on the Medic Program... As a metter of fact, I was going to have my operation on the program two weeks from now, but when I saw the script, I turned it down.

(MORE)

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JACK (CONT'D)

They had Dennis Day as the doctor I know he's clever, but that's ridiculous... Anyway, I'm glad to be out....not only so I can do this television show, but tonight I'm going to ettend a very big testimonial dinner given to George Burns and Gracie Allen by the Friers Club. This is a big charity affair and it costs a hundred dollars a plate. Imagine George Burns being the guest of honor et such e dinner ... It just shows you how you can come up in the world. This is the second testimonial dinner that's been given to Burns. The first one was at a Rescue Mission.... And even though I'm going to be one of the speakers tonight, I also had to pay a hundred dollars....And I know I'm going to enjoy the dinner....I haven't esten since Tuesday...Yep....a hundred dollars a plate You've got to est a lot of food to make up for all that I guess in the morning I'll be back to Pancreatitis.... And now, ladies and gentlemen, to get on with the show, I'd like to present my guest star....a young lady who is one of the stars on the Lucky Strike Hit Perade and who flew all the way out here from New York to be with us today ... And here she is...Miss Giselle MacKenzie...

(GISELLE COMES OUT TO APPLAUSE)

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Giselle, I want to tell you how very very happy I am that you flaw out to California to be on my program today.

GISELLE

Well, thank you, Jack...It's my pleasure.

JACK

But you know, Giselle...you're one of
the strengest girls that I've ever met.
Here we've been rehearsing for three days
and yet the only time I ever see you is in
the studio. You come here alone...you
leave alone..and....well...I was just
wondering if maybe before you go back to
New York, some evening we could go out
and maybe go to some night club together
and have a few dances....and then I could
take you home...How about it?

GISELLE

Well....I can't see any harm in that.

JACK

Oh, I wish you could... By the way, Giselle, what are your plans after you finish your television season?

GISELLE

Well, I'm going to play some night clubs and then I'm very excited because I'm going to make my first picture.

BB

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Oh, isn't that nice. You know, I used to make pictures but I haven't made one in a long time and I don't think I'll make any more pictures - I think I'll just stick to radio and television. I don't know, I think I'm a little too old for pictures.

GISELLE

Oh, Jack, you're not old at all.

JACK

I'm not? Well, now how old would you say that I am?...Just guess.

GISELLE

Oh, I don't know...about thirty-seven... thirty-eight?

JACK

Well, no, no... That's awfully nice of you but I'm really a little older than that. Guess sgain.

GISELLE

Sixty-three?

JACK

What?

GISELLE

My first guess was wild, I tamed it a little.

BB

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JACK.

Well, you didn't have to use a whip.

Giselle, I'm going to leave you all

alone now for you to do your number...

GISELLE

Okay, Jack...I'll be happy to do a couple of numbers.

JACK

No, no, Giselle...you just do one number and then when you finish, I'm going to come out and do a violin solo.

GISELLE

I thought that was cut at rehearsal.

JACK

Well, it was, but I put it back in.

I'm going to play a violin solo.

GISELLE

But I heard the producer say---

JACK

We have a new one...Go ahead and sing, Giselle.

JACK WAIKS OFF. GISELLE DOES HER SONG, "MR. SANDMAN." (APPLAUSE)

BB

DISSOLVE TO:

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JACK'S DRESSING ROOM.

JACK IS SEARCHING THE ROOM, BEHIND THE TRUNK, ETC. ROCHESTER ENTERS.

JACK

That violin must be somewhere.

ROCHESTER

Hello, boss.

(APPLAUSE)

JACK

Well! Where have you been? I told you a thousand times. Never leave my dressing room while I'm working.

ROCHESTER

But, boss, I had to go out to where your car was parked. The time was up.

JACK

Oh. Did you put a penny in the meter?

ROCHESTER

No, I just hit it with a rock like you

JACK

Good good.

do.

ROCHESTER

Boss, what are you doing in your dressing room while your show is on?

I'm looking for my violin, that's what I'm doing. I was going to play it on my show today, and I left it right on this trunk. Now, help me look for it.

ROCHESTER

Yes, sir,

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JACK AND ROCHESTER SEARCH THE ROOM, OPENING THE DRAWERS OF THE TRUNK, LIFTING THE CUSHION ON THE CHAIR, ETC. ROCHESTER PICKS UP A SMALL POTTERY DISH FROM THE DRESSING TABLE AND EXAMINES IT CLOSELY.

JACK

(ANNOYED)

Rochester, my violin can't possibly be in there. That's an ash tray.

ROCHESTER

One match could do it.

JACK QUICKLY LOOKS IN THE ASH TRAY, THEN SMELLS IT.

JACK

No...that's the ash from a Lucky
Strike. I can tell...it's toasted:

JACK PUTS DOWN THE ASH TRAY AND MOVES ACROSS THE ROOM.

JACK

I just can't understand where.... Well, I've just got to find that violin. Who could have taken it?....I'm supposed to play Mendelssohn's Concerto.

ROCHESTER

Mendelssohn's Who?

BB

Concerto.

ROCHESTER

Did you get permission from Mendelssohn?

JACK

Mendelsschn has been dead for over 50 years.

ROCHESTER

Then he couldn't have taken it.

JACK

Rochester, they're always having a lot of guided tours through Television City.. are you sure no one could have come in here and.... Hey, I just thought of something....You've been making too many remarks about my violin. Rochester, sit down.

ROCHESTER

Yes, sir.

ROCHESTER SITS DOWN.

JACK

Now, Rochester, how long have you been with me?

ROCHESTER

A long time, boss... Eighteen years.

BB

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Uh huh...and you've never lied to me, have you?

ROCHESTER

No, sir.

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JACK

Now I want you to look me right in the eye and tell me...did you hide my violin?

ROCHESTER

Well.....yes, boss.

JACK

Why did you do it?

ROCHESTER

I thought Mendelssohn was alive.

JACK

Well, he isn't.... Now where is my violin?

ROCHESTER

Okay, I'll get it for you.

ROCHESTER TAKES BOW OUT OF CLOTHES TREE AND HANDS IT TO JACK.

JACK

All right, this is the bow, now where's the violin?

ROCHESTER

I'll get it.

HE GETS UP ON CHAIR, OPENS VENTILATOR GRATE, TAKES OUT JACK'S VIOLIN, AND HANDS IT TO JACK.

BB

Imagine using the air conditioner to hide my violin.

MAN WITH FLASHLIGHT STICKS HIS HEAD OUT OF VENTILATOR. HE IS WEARING A GAS MASK.

MAN

Oh, is that what it was? We were looking for a dead cat.

JACK

Rochester, I'll telk to you about this later.

JACK STARTS OUT

DISSOLVE TO "ONE".

ORCHESTRA PLAYS "LOVE IN BLOOM" AND JACK COMES OUT TO APPLAUSE, CARRYING HIS VIOLIN AND BOW.

Ladies and gentlemen, you know, I've always been kidding about my violin, but this time I'm really going to play something worthwhile...
I'm going to play Mendelsohn's Concerto.....

(HE TUNES UP A LITTLE)

......You know, I wasn't always a comedian. I started out as a violinist. But once when I was playing at the Palace Theatre in New York -- in fact, it was my very first appearance at the Palace --- I thought maybe I could be a comedian, too....so I told a joke. And that joke got such a big laugh that it really started me off as a comedian. It was so funny that I'd like to tell it to you now This joke is about an actor who was standing in front of the Palace Theatre in New York and he was very blue and dejected and a friend of his walked over to him and he said, "Joe, what's the matter with you?" This actor said, "Nothing".....So his friend said, "There must be something the matter with you, kid what is it?"....So the actor said, "Well, let me tell you what happened." He said, "Five weeks ago an uncle of mine died and left me ten thousand dollars Three weeks ago another uncle of mine died and left me two hundred dollars Last week --

DON WILSON COMES ON FOLLOWED BY A GROUP OF SIGHT-SEERS.

DON

This way, ladies and gentlemen.

THEY ALL COME OUT ON STAGE AND PON CONTINUES TAIKING.

DON

Now, folks, this is Studio 31. This is a microphone....and the apparatus from which it is manipulated is called a boom. Out there you see the cameras. Now, this particular studio is the origination point of the Lucky Strike Program.

MEL

(SLIGHTLY MULLY)

I like the Lucky Strike program. That's my favorite show.

DON

Well, I'm glad it is.

MEL

I understand that a lot of stars lock different in person than they do on the screen.

DON

Well....that may be true in some cases.

MEL

(CONFIDENTIALLY)

Er....Mr. Wilson.....

DON

Yes?

BB

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MEL

(POINTING TO JACK)

Is that Ann Southern?

DON

No, no, she's on every other week.

Now, as I said before, from this

studio originates the Lucky Strike

Program. By the way, how many of
you smoke Lucky Strikes?

THEY ALL RAISE THEIR HANDS.

DON

Well, that's wonderful. Now can you tell me why you smoke Lucky Strike?

MEL

Well...(IN RHYTHM) If you want better taste from your cigarette -Lucky Strike is the brand to get.
It's toasted to give you the best taste yet -It's the toasted (CIAP, CIAP, CIAP) cigarette.

DON

Oh....Well...there are many more interesting things to be seen at Television City, so just follow me.

THE GROUP FOLLOWS DON OFF, WALKING BEHIND, AROUND AND IN FRONT OF JACK. WHEN THE STAGE IS CLEARED, JACK ONCE AGAIN FACES THE AUDIENCE.

So this actor......This actor said,
"Last week, an uncle of mine died and
left me nothing."....That's the end
of the joke....Of course, it goes over
much bigger when people don't come on
in the middle of it...Oh well....Now,
ladies and gentlemen, before I go into
my violin solo....and because we may
not have time to do it later, I'd like
to bring out my guest star, Miss Giselle
MacKenzie just to take a bow....Oh
Giselle...Giselle.

GISELLE COMES OUT TO APPLAUSE.

JACK

Giselle, I must say that you're one of the most thoughtful persons I've ever known. Here you were just coming out to take a bow, and yet you went to all the trouble of putting on another gown. And you know something...Women in the audience and at home love that. They like to see beautiful clothes... Now I just want to thank you once more for being on my show.

BB

GISELLE

You're welcome, Jack. I had a lot of fun...By the way, that's a beautiful violin, do you mind if I look at your violin?

JACK

My violin? No, no, go right ahead..

Be careful, though...That's right.

It's a french violin, it's a Viom....

Hold it like this...That's it.

GISELLE

Can I look at your bow?

JACK

The bow...be careful you don't touch the hair with your fingers...That's it....right on the end...there you are.

GISELLE PIAYS HER DIFFICULT CADENZA ON THE VIOLIN, THEN HANDS IT BACK TO JACK.

GISELLE

Nice fiddle you've got there, Jack.

SHE WALKS OFF.

JACK

Well, how do you like that?....Giselle...
Giselle....come back here.

GISELLE COMES BACK.

JACK

You mean to say that besides singing and playing the piene, you play the violin, too?

BB

J.

GISELLE NODS HER HEAD "YES".

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JACK

Well, as long as you're such a show-off....
"Let me see your violin". Can we get
a violin from the orchestra, please.

GISELLE

Oh, no, Jack, I don't want to.

JACK

You started it, now we're going through with it.... Hey fellows, get a violin from the orchestra and bring it up here, will you please?

GISELLE

Jack, I'm not prepared to play a number.

JACK

Prepared or not, you made a whole big thing out of it and we're going through with it. We'll play a duet together.

MAN BRINGS VIOLIN ON.

JACK

There you are...All right, now what shall we play?

GISELLE

I don't know...How about The Introduction and Rondo Capricciosa by Saint Saens.

JACK

Well....What was that?

The Introduction and Rondo Capriciosa by Saint Saens.

JACK

Oh, I don't know...that's been done to death....Everybody's humming it...

Rondo Capriciosa....how about playing some popular song from one of the shows....like Oklahoma, South

Pacific....or The King and I?

GISELLE

All right...let's play..."Getting
To Know You."

JACK

Getting To Know You?....I can't see any harm in that. All right.... give me an "A".

THEY TUNE UP.

1.E

JACK

That's close enough. All right, Mahlon....Getting To Know You.

(THEY DO THE NUMBER)

(APPLAUSE)

BB

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Giselle, that was awfully cute...
but you know what? We're nearing
the end of the show and that was
not a big finish. You see, we need
something that can get us off the
stage in an exciting way. How about
a reprise of the song you sang earlier
in the show..Mr. Sandman?

GISELLE

That's okay with me.... Can you handle it, Dad?

JACK

I'll be right behind you, Gizzell. Okay, Mahlon, hit it.

(THEY DO ONE CHORUS OF "MR. SANDMAN")

DURING CHORUS DON LEADS TOUR ON AGAIN. MEL LAGS BEHIND, STARES AT JACK, TAKES VIOLIN AWAY FROM JACK, JOINS GISELLE IN ANOTHER CHORUS. THEY EXIT LEAVING JACK STANDING THERE.

DON (VOICE OVER)

Jack will be back in just a moment, but first a word to cigarette smokers.

(CUT TO CLOSING COMMERCIAL)

BB

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THE AMERICAN TOBACCO COMPANY LUCKY STRIKE TED WILLIAMS TESTIMONIAL (1:30) #85 CLOSE -1-

CLOSING COMMERCIAL

OPEN ON FILM CLIPS FROM RKO TED WILLIAMS SHORT SUBJECT AS FOLLOWS: (NEW TRACK) ANDRE BARUCH (VO)

WAIST SHOT OF WILLIAMS CASTING.

Here's Ted Williams, one of baseball's greatest sluggers. Watch Ted go after a hard-fighting bone fish off the Florida Keys.

CUT TO ANOTHER SHOT AS TED REACTS TO A STRIKE. He's hooked one!

LINE GOING OFF REEL.

Look at that line peel off!

CUT TO SHOT OF FISH BEING

A good-sized catch. Looks like an eight pounder!

WEIGHED BY TED.

DISSOLVE THROUGH TO TWO-SHOT OF TED AND BARUCH. THEY ARE ON PORCH OF FISHING LODGE, WILLIAMS IS HOLDING 9-FOOT GIASS ROD.and it's all done with a glass rod. Ted's own company makes it.

(BARUCH NOW ON CAMERA TO AUDIENCE)

BARUCH TURNS TO TED.

Ted, what do you call that rod?

CUT TO MEDIUM CLOSE SHOT OF TED. HE IS LOOKING AT ROD, SNAPPING IT AS HE ANSWERS.

TED WILLIAMS

Well, it's a Ted Williams 9-footer.

And I may be a little prejudiced,
but I think it's the very best
there is for bonefishing.

BARUCH

I don't doubt it. Tell me another thing, Ted. How do you feel about that Lucky you're smoking? THE AMERICAN TOBACCO COMPANY LUCKY STRIKE TED WILLIAMS TESTIMONIAL (1:30) #85 CLOSE -2-

CLOSING COMMERCIAL (CONT'D)

CUT TO EVEN TIGHTER CLOSEUP OF WILLIAMS HOLDING HIS LUCKY.

CUT TO DIFFERENT ANGLE SHOT OF WILLIAMS.

CUT TO BARUCH ALONE IN MEDIUM SHOT. HE LOCKS OFF CAMERA TO WILLIAMS.

HE TURNS AND ADDRESSES CAMERA. HE HOLDS UP PACK CASUALLY.

MOVE INTO MEDIUM CU OF BARUCH HOLDING LUCKY PACK. HE TILTS IT SO THAT BOTTOM FACES CAMERA.

HE CASUALLY TURNS PACK TO FEATURE BULLSEYE.

CUT TO TIGHT SHOT OF BULLSEYE, FEATURING "IT'S TOASTED".

CUT BACK TO MEDIUM SHOT OF BARUCH.

TED WILLIAMS
