TV FILM COMMERCIAL #103

LUCKY STRIEK BULLSEYE DISSOLVE INTO SUN.

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CAMERA DOLLIES BACK RETAINING SUN IN UPPER RIGHT FIELD. FADE IN SCOOP IN FOREGROUND IN FLORIDA LOCATION. NEW GIRL POSED ON DIVING BOARD. GIRL DIVES INTO POOL.

EVERYTHING DISSOLVES OUT EXCEPT HUGE SPIASH.

SPIASH HOLDS ON SCREEN SCENE
BECOMES "OLD FAITHFUL" GEYSER
AT YELLOWSTONE PARK. SHOT OF
SCOOP AND GIRL WATCHING GEYSER
HE OFFERS HER A CIGARETTE. CUT
TO CLOSER SHOT AS HE LIGHTS HIS
AND GIRL'S CIGARETTES. SCOOP
AND GIRL BLOW SMOKE TO UPPER
HALF OF SCREEN.

SMOKE FORMS INTO LETTERING

LETTERING "SMOOTHER" ZOOMS UP TOWARD CAMERA. ONE "O" IN "SMOOTHER" REMAINS ON SCREEN. REST OF SCENE FADES OFF. "O" BECOMES CLOCK. PACKAGE FADES OUT. ANNOUNCER (CONT'D)

And the right place for a Lucky...

ANNOUNCER

DISSOLVE TO SCOOP AND GIRL ON SEAT. DIS. IN REST OF BROUGHAM AND

BACKGROUND SIMILAR TO OPENING SCENE. CAMERA

TRUCKS TO CLOSER SHOT

OF GIRL AND SCOOP.

You'll find...
...it's the best-testing cigarette
you ever smoked!

(AFTER OPENING COMMERCIAL)
(JACK COMES OUT TO MUSIC & APPLAUSE)

JACK ank you, thank y

Thank you, thank you, thank you... Good evening, friends, and welcome to the Lucky Strike Program... I usually say, "Good evening, ladies and gentlemen," but this close to Christmas I think it's nice to call you friends...And there are only seven more shopping days left for you to earn that title ... But this is an exciting time of year, isn't it? I mean, with all the shopping and everything...You know, I'll bet I've been in every department store in Los Angeles... and every store I went into I got something.

JACK (CONT'D)

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That is, I got something in every store except Sak's Fifth Avenue. There they said I was too big to sit on his lap..... Some Santa Clause -- never heard of a thyroid condition...But I did get a lot of shopping done. I got things for my director...my producer...my writers. However, it's always a problem to find something for my orchestra so I just forgot about it. In the first place, with their disregard for our parole system, I'm not sure they'll be home for Christmas... However, I will say that Remley. my guitar player, has managed to keep out of trouble the last few weeks, and got himself a good job. Well, it's not exactly a job. He goes around ringing doorbells and for fifteen cents he'll breathe on your Christmas tree and turn it white...

JACK (CONT'D)

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Unfortunately, he melts some of the ornaments, but then that's the risk you take ... Well, to get on with the show, ledies and gentlemen...on tonight's program I am going to do something rather unusual for me...something I've never done on television. So tonight we are going to do a condensed version of Gilbert and Sullivan's famous operatta... The Mikado. Now whenever I do anything, I like to do it right ... So I went to the trouble of acquiring a Japanese Opera Company direct from Tokyo. For years this troupe has been under the guidance of one of the greatest Japanese impresarios. He's been such a great help to us all during the long hours of rehearsal that I'd like to have you meet him... Mr. Sumoto Yamatashi.

(A DIGNIFIED JAPANESE COMES OUT DRESSED AS A TYPICAL AMERICAN BUSINESSMAN.)

(APPLAUSE)

JACK

Mr. Yamatashi, it's a pleasure to have you with us and I hope you and your troupe are enjoying your stay here in Los Angeles ...there are so many interestingsights.

YAMATASHI

So we have been told, but so far we have not been able to see much of city.

JACK

Oh, yes, you've been busy with rehearsals and everything...too much work.

YAMATASHI

No, too much smog.

JACK

تعجالية

Oh...Well, that building that sticks up through the green cloud is City Hall...However, Mr. Yemateshi, I must say in defense of Los Angeles that on some days it is so clear that you can see Cucamonga.

THEATAMAY

Oh well, I hope soon we have clear day. I have been looking for Cucamonga.

JACK

You've been looking for Cucamonge?

YAMATASHI

Yes. Kimo Cucamonga, he is my cousin.

JACK

Oh..Well, I hope you see him soon...Now Mr. Yamatashi, I just wanted the audience to see you now..and, thanks again for your help.

YAMATASHI

Very good, Mr. Benny, but before I go, would like to have word with you.

JACK

What about?

YAMATASHI

Well, this morning my troupe and I read the fine print in the contract you gave us.

JACK

You read the fine print?

YAMATASHI

Yes, There are fifteen of us and we put our glasses together.

JACK

Oh..oh..Well, I wouldn't worry about the contract.

JACK (CONT'D)

ul.

And don't forget, when we discussed the arrangements, you were very pleased when I said the members of your troupe would live in my house..and you were very happy when I said that I would be responsible for their welfare.

YAMATASHI

Very true, but when you said you would make them feel at home, I did not know you would have them planting rice in the shallow end of your swimming pool.

JACK

Well, I'll explain all these things to your group in the morning when they come down for breakfast. Naturally, being in a new country, there are a lot of things that they probably don't understand.

YAMATASHI

Oh, yes...many things very confusing.

Members of company want to know why

Americans always in such a hurry..

freeways...zoom zoom zoom...

YAMATASHI (CONT'D)

Also puzzled why people wear shoes in house...Also something else hardest of all to understand.

JACK

What's that?

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YAMATASHI

What happened to Notre Dame this year?

JACK

That's been bothering me, too, and I'm about as Irish as you are. Now, Mr. Yematashi, you've been a very good sport coming out here... and once again I want to thank you.

YAMATASHI

Thank you, Mr. Benny.

(YAMATASHI BOWS TO AUDIENCE..THEN BOWS TO JACK. YAMATASHI LEAVES STAGE.)

JACK

Such a fine gentlemen. Ledies and gentlemen, it always gives me great pleasure to bring on the singing star of my show, Dennis Day. He's not only one of my favorite singers, but you have no idea how many letters I receive telling me how they love it when Dennis sings a beautiful ballad. So here he is now. Dennis Day.

(DENNIS COMES OUT DRESSED LIKE ELVIS PRESIEY... WITH GUITAR, SIDEBURNS, ETC.)

(APPLAUSE)

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JACK

Dennis, what's all this?

DENNIS

I'm going to do an imitation of Elvis Presley. I think your fans would like that.

JACK

Oh..you think my fans would like that.

DENNIS

I'll have them jumping out of their wheel chairs.

JACK

Look..

DENNIS

I did it for my Mother's Women's Club and you should have heard them scream.

JACK

They did?

DENNIS

Yeah, I forgot my pants.

JACK

What?

DENNIS

Step aside, I need plenty of leg room for this.

(SPREADS LEGS WIDE LIKE PRESLEY)

A-one, a-two, a-three ...

JACK

Hold it, hold it ... hold it ... wait a minute, Dennis.

DENNIS

Huh?

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JACK

I'm not letting you do an imitation of Elvis Presley on my show.

DENNIS

Why not?

JACK

Because every time you turn on the television set that's all you see, Everybody's doing an imitation of Elvis Presley.

DENNIS

If enough of us do it, maybe he'll stop.

JACK

Never mind ...

(JACK RIPS OFF SIDEBURNS)

And where did you get these ridiculous sideburns?

DENNIS

Off my chest.

JACK

Dennis ... you shaved all this hair off your chest?

DENNIS

I didn't have to, it was pasted on there, too.

JACK

Oh, fine ... Now, Dennis, just sing your song ... the one you rehearsed.

DENNIS

Okay.

(JACK TAKES GUITAR FROM DENNIS AND LEAVES)

JACK

(WALKING OFF)

Everybody wants to imitate Elvis Presley.

(DENNIS SINGS SONG)

(APPLAUSE)

LOVE IN A HOME

YOU CAN TELL WHEN YOU OPEN THE DOOR
YOU CAN TELL IF THERE'S LOVE IN A HOME.
EVERY TABLE AND CHAIR SEEMS TO SMILE
DO COME IN, COME AND STAY AWHILE.
YOU ALMOST FEEL YOU'VE BEEN THERE ONCE BEFORE.
BY THE SHINE AND THE GLOW OF THE ROOM
AND THE CLOCK SEEMS TO CHIME
COME AGAIN ANYTIME
YOU'LL BE WELCOME WHEREVER YOU ROAM
YOU CAN TELL WHEN THERE'S LOVE IN A HOME.

(AFTER DENNIS' SONG)
(JACK COMES OUT TO DENNIS)

JACK

Dennis, I'm really proud of you.

I really am. You did that
number beautifully.

DENNIS

I thought there were a few places where I was a little flat.

JACK

No, no, Dennis, every note was as true as could be. It was beautiful.

DENNIS

I still think that during a few spots I could have been better.

JACK

No no, it was beautiful ... Why do you say these things?

DENNIS

When you're talented, you can afford to be modest.

JACK

Oh ... yes yes ... there is something to that, Dennis.

JACK (CONT'D)

And now that you brought it up, there are a lot of times when I feel that I could be a lot funnier.

DENNIS

So do I.

JACK

What?

DENNIS

When you're talented you can also afford to be honest.

(HE WALKS OFF)

(JACK LOOKS AFTER HIM)

JACK

You know, ladies and gentlemen, the reason Dennis is so hard to handle is that he's so independent since he got another job. You can see him every week. They use his head for a bubble on the Lawrence Welk Show. And now, ladies and gentlemen, at this time the Sportsmen Quartet has prepared a very wonderful --

(DON COMES OUT ON STAGE)

DON

Oh, Jack ... Jack.

JACK

What is it, Don? Where are the Sportsmen?

DON

That's what I want to talk to you about. After dress rehearsal they told me that they had a chance to get an out-of-town job if they went right away, so I took the liberty of telling them that they could leave.

JACK

You ... you took the libery to telling the Sportsmen they could leave?

DON

Yes, Jack.

JACK

Oh, I see ... Well, Don, the next time you take the liberty of running my show, the unemployment line will not only be longer, but fatter ... What are we going to do for a commercial?

DON

Oh, Jack, you don't think I'd let the Sportsmen go without having something to replace them?

JACK

Well, that's different. Who have you got to take their place?

DON

My son, Harlow.

JACK

Harlow!

DON

(CALLING)

Come on out, son.

(HARLOW ENTERS)

JACK

Oh, no, Don...no no...not again.

Last year, not once, but twice,
you talked me into giving your
bouncing boy a chance to do the
commercial and it was awful...it
was embarrassing. Your boy is
not an announcer and you might as
well know it.

DON

Jack, believe me, this time it will be different.

DON (CONT'D)

All last summer he took elecution lessons...and not only is his enunciation perfect, but you should hear his beautifully rounded tone. The way he says "L S M F T" will just -- Well..Go ahead, Harlow, show him...Say L S M F T.

HARLOW

Okay.. LSMFT.

JACK

(CLAPPING HIS HANDS IN ECSTASY)

That was beautiful!

DON

I knew you'd think so, Jack..And wait till you hear the way he says "Lucky Strike means fine tobacco." Go ahead, Harlow...say it.

HARLOW

Lucky Strike means fine --

DON

And when he says "It's toasted to taste better, cleaner, fresher, smoother", it will just thrill you. Go ahead, Harlow...say "It's toasted to taste better, cleaner, fresher, smoother."

HARLOW

It's toasted to --

DON

But the best thing of all is the way he says "For the taste that you like, light up a Lucky Strike ..It's light up time." Go ahead, Harlow, show him.

HARLOW

For the --

DON

And when he says --

HARLOW

(STAMPING HIS FOOT

IN RAGE)

Let me say it!

JACK

Yes, Don...for goodness sakes...
You said you wanted me to hear
him and then every time he tries
to say something, you have to
open your big fat mouth.

HARLOW

(WALKING TO JACK)

(MAD)

You can't talk to my daddy like that.

JACK

But, Harlow, I'm on your side.

HARLOW

I don't care, you can't come between father and son.

JACK

(TO AUDIENCE)

I wouldn't get between you two unless I had time to leave a note.

(TO HARLOW)

Anyway, I was only trying to help you.

DON

Well, we don't need your help.

JACK

Well, let me tell you something, Don...Don't you ever try to get Harlow on this show again. I've been in this business a long time. I know what kind of a show people like...I know what I'm doing.

DON

Then why aren't you funnier?

JACK

Because I'm modest, and shut up.

DON

Come on, Harlow, let's go.

(THEY DO THEIR LITTLE KICK TOGETHER AND WALK OFF ARM IN ARM)
(APPLAUSE)

JACK

I don't know how I ever get a show on the air. I have an announcer who takes the liberty of running my show. I have a singer who wants to do silly imitations of Elvis Presley yet. And all on a day when I'm trying to do something classy like the Mikado... Well, in spite of them, we're going to do what I said we'd do.. So now, ladies and gentlemen, my cast and myself will present The Mikado.

(JACK LEAVES. CUT TO YAMATASHI WHO IS STANDING AT A LECTURN.)

THE MIKADO

(Music)

MEN:

If you want to know who we are,

We are gentlemen of Japan

On many a vase and jar

On many a screen and fan,

We figure in lively paint

Our attitude's queer and quaint

You're wrong if you think it ain't

On vase and jar, on screen and fan

On many, many, many, many, many, many, many, many a jar.

Oh! Oh! Oh!

on. on. on.

On vase and jar, on screen and fan.

MAN (Spoken)

Yum-Yum, the Mikado has arrived. Before long we will know the plight of KO-KO and the state of your marriage.

MIYA SAMA

GIRLS &

BOYS:

Miya sama miya sama on himma na naye ni Pira pira suru no wa Nangia na Toko Tonyare ton yare na!

(Don Wilson enters)

DON:

A more humane Mikado never did in Japan exist

To nobody second I'm certainly reckoned a true philanthropist.

It is my very humane endeavor to make to some extent

Each evil liver a running river of harmless merriment.

(More)

DON:

(Cont.)

My object all sublime I shall achieve in time

To let the punishment fit the crime, the punishment fit the crime.

And make each pris ner pent, unwillingly represent
A source of innocent merriment, of innocent merriment.

MIKADO (Spoken)

Yum-Yum, bright dawns your wedding day. I decree that joy shall reign in Titipu throughout the gala festivities.

YUM-YUM

But what of KO-KO?

MIKADO

That wretched miscreant! Summon him immediately. But insignificant wretch he may be, proffer him a welcome becoming his exalted station.

THE LORD HIGH EXECUTIONER

MEN:

Behold the Lord High Executioner

A personage of noble rank and title

A dignified and potent officer

Whose functions are particularly vital

Defer, Defer - to the Lord High Executioner

Defer, Defer - to the noble Lord

To the noble Lord High Executioner

(Jack Benny enters)

TIT WILLOW

Jack: On a tree by a river a little Tom-tit

Sang "Willow, tit willow, tit willow"

(More)

JACK: (Cont.)

And I said to him "Dicky bird why do you sit Singing willow, tit willow, tit willow? Is it weakness of intellect, birdy" I cried "Or a rather tough worm in your little inside?" With a nod of his poor little head he replied "Oh willow, tit willow".

MIKADO (Spoken)

This is a very sad tale you sing of Ko-Ko.

JACK (Spoken)

It is, your Excellency, but my own plight will be far more miserable if I am refused the hand of lovely Yum-Yum.

(Crowd noises)

MIKADO

What is all this commotion?

YUM-YUM

It is a stranger who approaches.

(Dennis enters)

DENNIS

Gentlemen, I pray you, tell me where a gentle maiden dwelleth named Yum-Yum. The ward of Ko-Ko. In pity speak, oh speak, I pray you.

JACK

Who are you who ask this questions?

DENNIS

Come gather round me and I'll tell you.

WAND'RING MINSTREL I

DENNIS: A wandering minstrel I

A thing of shreds and patches Of ballads songs and snatches

(More)

DENNIS: (Cont.)

And dreamy lullaby
My catalogue is long
Thro every passion ranging
And to your humors changing
I tune my supple song
I tune my supple song
Are you in a sentimental mood?
I'll sigh with you
Oh ------ sorrow.

One for Yokohama Two for Tokyo Three for Nagasaki Now go cat, go But don't you step on my blue suede sandals. You can do enything But lay off my blue suede Sandals. You can ride in my rickshaw Eat my rice Fill my pogoda With big fat mice Take my tea pots Break the handles But uh, uh honey Lay off of my sandals Don't you step on my blue suede sandals Go cat, go Go cat, go, etc, etc, etc, (INTO PANDEMONIUM)

CHRISTMAS CARTON (1:00)

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OPEN ON MEDIUM SHOT OF LIVING ROOM SUPER "SEASON'S GREETINGS."
PAN TO GRACE AND RUSS AT A TABLE IN SAME SETTING AS THE "BUDGET" COMMERCIAL. NOW, HOWEVER, THEY ARE WEARING DIFFERENT CLOTHES. THEY ARE BOTH SMOKING LUCKIES. RUSS IS WRITING THE LAST OF A PILE OF TAGS FOR A STACK OF CHRISTMAS CARTONS. GRACE TAKES THE TAGS. AFTER RUSS WRITES ON THEM, AND STICKS THEM ON THE CARTONS. THE GRANDFATHER'S CLOCK STANDS IN SOFT FOCUS IN THE BACKGROUND. IT READS A FEW MINUTES PAST 8.

CUT TO GRACE ALONE. SHE PUTS CARTON ON TABLE.

SHE PICKS UP ANOTHER CARTON AND HOLDS IT, REFERRING TO IT AND SHOWING IT TO US AS SHE SPEAKS TO US.

CUT TO CU CARTON IN HER HANDS.

CUT BACK TO GRACE.

(SOUND: PRESENCE IN THE ROOM, MUSIC OF BELLS)

SINGERS (OVER)

Give lots of Luckies
At Christmes time
Be Happy, Go Lucky
At Christmas time.
Give the folks that you like
A gift of Lucky Strike
This year.

GRACE (SPEAKING)

Give cartons of Luckies.

SINGERS (AGAIN)

At Christmes time.

(HUMMING OF "LIGHT-UP TIME" THEME
CONTINUES BEHIND:)

GRACE (SPEAKING)

These Christmas cartons of Luckies make wonderful gifts for every smoker on your list. They're so bright and colorful and they say "Merry Chr.stmas and Happy Smoking" two-hundred times!

THE AMERICAN TOBACCO COMPANY LUCKY STRIKE TV FILM COMMERCIAL #108 (CONT'D)

CUT TO CU GRACE.

JACK

Thank you very much, ladies and gentlemen. At this time I had planned to bring out the Japanese impresario, Mr. Yamatashi, to take a bow, but unfortunately, he just committed Hari-Kari.

(DENNIS LEAVES)

JACK

Ladies and gentlemen, I have a very important announcement to make. Thousands of refugees from Hungary are in desperate need of food, clothing, and shelter.
