VIDEO

OPEN ON ANIMATED MUSICAL STAFF
WITH TREBLE CLEF LOCATED CAMERA
LEFT. IN SYNC WITH THE MUSIC
NOTES OF THE KRUETZER ETUDE
POP ON LETTERS SPELLING OUT
"THE" AND "JACK".

LOSING TREBLE CLEF CAMERA NOW BEGINS TO PAN ALONG STAFF PICKING UP LETTERS THE POP ON IN SYNC TO NOTES OF ETUDE. WORD "BENNY" IS NOW VISIBLE.

AS PAN CONTINUES LETTERS OF WORD "PROGRAM" POP ON IN SYNC AS THE MUSIC BUILDS AND HOLDS.

ONCE THE WORD "PROGRAM" IS COMPLETE ON THE SCREEN, IT ANIMATES DOWN TO FIRST SPACE IN THE STAFF AND THE WORD "THE" TAKES A BALANCED POSITION ON THE TOP SPACE. SIMULTANEOUSLY SLIDING IN FROM EITHER SIDE ARE HEAVILY SHADED WORDS "JACK" AND "BENNY".

AS GUESTS ARE ANNOUNCED THE WORDS "JACK" AND "BENNY" ANIMATE INTO TWO BLACK LINES AND THE STAFF BEGINS TO TURN FROM A HORIZONTAL TO A VERTICAL POSITION.

IN SYNC WITH THE WORDS "LUCKY STRIKE" BLACK LINES ANIMATE INTO LETTERS; THE STAFF LINES FORM LUCKY STRIKE CIGARETTES IN PACK POSITION.

BULLSEYE LOGO NOW ANIMATES AROUND WORDS "LUCKY STRIKE" AS PACK BEGINS TO TAKE SHAPE.

PACK NOW COMPLETELY FORMED TAKES PERSPECTIVE SETTING AT CENTER SCREEN. A FEW CIGARETTES POP INTO VIEW.

AUDIO

(MUSIC: KRUETZER ETUDE PLAYED ON SOLO VIOLIN)

(MUSIC: ETUDE CONTINUES)

(MUSIC: ETUDE CONTINUES)

(MUSIC: STING AND HOLD UNDER:)

ANNOR (VO)

From Television City in Hollywood, the Jack Benny Program...

...with Jack's guest, Ernie Kovacs.

(MUSIC: SEGUE TO LAST SIX BARS OF "HONEST TASTE" SONG UNDER:)

ANNOR (VO)

Brought to you by Lucky Strike! Get the genuine article.

(MUSIC: UP TO END)

JACK BENNY PROGRAM JAN. 25, 1959 (Taped: Jan. 18, 1959) OPENING COMMERCIAL #180 - TEST DRIVER -- LAW ENFORCEMENT MACHINE GUNNER

VIDEO

AUDIO

OPEN ON CU OF TEST DRIVER IN CAR! (SOUND: SPEEDING CAR...TURN OVER.. HE PUFFS ON A LUCKY, THEN HANDS IT TO SOMEONE OUTSIDE. SHOT OF WHEELS AS CAR STARTS OFF. MED. SHOT OF CAR APPROACHING RAMP. ONE SIDE GOES UP ON RAMP, CAR TURNS OVER. DRIVER CLIMÉS OUT OF OVERTURNED CAR AS THREE MEN APPROACH HIM.

HE TAKES OUT LUCKIES AND LIGHTS UP AS THEY DISCUSS PERFORMANCE.

COMMENTATOR (OVER)

(SOUND: BRAKES...MOTOR OFF...DOOR SLAM...FOOTSTEPS...IN SYNC. UNDER:) Men like this go for fine tobacco

and no nonsense.

IN PERSPECTIVE.)

That's what you get with Lucky Strike. Here's honest taste. Fresh, smooth and unforgettable.

(SOUND: MACHINE GUN -- NOT TOO LOUD.)

IN SYNC. TITLE "LUCKY TRIKE" DISSOLVES ON AND HOLDS.

ABRUPT CUT TO THE INTERIOR OF A POLICE MACHINE GUN RANGE. AT FAR END WE SEE PAPIER MACHE TARGET WITH HEART AREA CLEARLY OUTLINED. SUB MACHINE GUN RIGHT FOREGROUND OPENS FIRE WITH TRACERS ON THE TARGET AND BORES A STREAM OF HOT LEAD THROUGH THE VITAL AREA OF THE INANIMATE SUBJECT.

DISSOLVE TO WAIST SHOT OF LAW OFFICER JUST HAVING PLACED MACHINE GUN IN VERTICAL RACK CAMERA LEFT. IN HIS FREE LEFT HAND HE HAS FRESH LUCKY WHICH HE POPS INTO HIS MOUTH. HE THEN PROCEEDS TO LIGHT LUCKY. IN BG. OTHER TARGETS.

GUN OFF SCREEN OPENS FIRE. SYNC. WITH BURSTS TITLE "LUCKY STRIKE" RATTLES ON IN BITS AND. CHUNKS UNTIL TITLE IS COMPLETE, BESIDE OUR MAN.

(SOUND: MACHINE GUN OUT) When a man like this wants a cigarette, he goes for the genuine article!

(SOUND: OFF SCREEN MACHINE GUN BURSTS -- SOFT)

Lucky Strike. This one is what smoking was meant to be.

CUT TO CLOSEUP AS MAN SMOKES, POLICE BADGES CAN BE SEEN ON HIS COLLAR.

LOSE TITLE, POP ON PACK ON BEAT AFTER "FORGET" AT MIDDLE GROUND. ZOOM UP ON "TASTE".

CUT TO CLOSEUP OF TEST DRIVER AS HE UNBUCKLES CRASH HELMET.

POP ON PACK AT LEFT MIDDLE GROUND ON BEAT AFTER "LIKE." ZOOM UP ON "TASTE".

CUT TO TIGHT CLOSEUP ON BEAT.

TITLE "THE GENUINE ARTICLE" SLIDES ON FROM BEHIND DRIVER.

DISSOLVE ON TITLE "GET THE HONEST TASTE OF A LUCKY STRIKE" OVER CARTON.

HOLD WORDS OF THEME LINE.

AUDIO

SINGERS (OVER)

Never was a man who could forget The taste of a genuine cigarette.

Get the honest taste a man can like.

The honest taste of a Lucky Strike.

COMMENTATOR (OVER)

Get the genuine article.

Get the honest taste

of a Lucky Strike.

(AFTER OPENING COMMERCIAL)

(JACK COMES OUT TO "LOVE IN BLOOM" AND APPLAUSE)

JACK

Thank you very much, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Lucky Strike Program... Those of you who tuned in on my show two weeks ago finally you will remember saw our parody of "Gaslight". For those of you who didn't tune in I'd like to say that Gaslight was that murder mystery... psychological drama in which I drove Barbara Stanwyck, MGM, and the Supreme Court nuts... And I do want to thank MGM for allowing me to release this picture...But then I kinds thought they would because 18 years ago they released me... They didn't exactly release me. They put me in a basket and left me on Warner Brothers doorstep... Well, so much for the past... (MORE)

JACK (CONT'D)

and I'm looking forward to the immediate future because ton ght or tomorrow...sometime in the next day or two...right after this show I'm leaving for Miami Beach, Florida, where I'm going to appear at the FountainBleu Hotel for two weeks starting February 3rd. After that they want me to. play two weeks in Havana, Cuba. We ve already been dickering alout my working there. Naturally I m afraid to go there with all tie commotion, excitement, and shooting down there a fellow could get killed...But if they meet my price...Eh, I'll work .t out some way...

(MORE)

And now, ladies and gentlemen,
I'd like to present my guest
star, a young man who in my
opinion is one of the most
versatile comedians in all of
show business...Mr. Ernie Kovacs.

ERNIE KOVACS COMES OUT TO APPLAUSE.

JACK (CONT'D)

(SHAKING HANDS WITH KOVACS)
Nice to have you on the show,
Ernie.

KOVACS

I want to thank you for that introduction, Mr. Benny.

JACK

Mr. Benny? We've known each other too long. You don't have to call me Mr. Benny.

KOVACS

I can't help it. Standing here in the presence of someone who has reached such eminence in the field of comedy makes me feel so humble that in the ancient tradition of the Orient, I feel that I should fall upon my knees and commit Hari Kari.

Commit hari kari? On my television show?

KOVACS

It won't hurt anything. I bleed in black and white.

JACK

Well...that would be something first in television. But, Ernie, I must say that I do appreciate your compliment, in all modesty I must admit that I have been fortunate in television.

KOVACS

Not only in television, but radio and pictures. You made your last picture fifteen years ago and people are still talking about it.

JACK |

Just a minute, Ernie...

(LAUGHINGLY)

... that could be taken either way.

KOVACS

If it could, I guess I gave it the wrong inflection.

JACK

Now wait a minute...Listen, Ernie...

I didn't bring you out here to

argue with you...

(MORE)

JACK (CONT'D)

I was very, very serious when I introduced you as one of the most versatile comedians.

When you had your own television show, I watched all of your programs and, believe me, your dialogue was so sparkling, witty and original...I wish my writers could be that funny.

KOVACS

You...use writers?

JACK

Ernie, don't you use writers? KOVACS

Only for suicide notes.

JACK

Now I wish I'd let him commit
hari kari...But, Ernie, you
really interest me. I've learned
so much about you since you've
been out here. You've done so
many things...And I heard that
as busy as you are, you still
find time for a hobby, I understand.

KOVACS

Yeah...I guess I'm just about the world's most renowned moustache collector.

Moustache collector?

KOVACS

Listed in the Encyclopedia
Brittanica. It's called
Fuzzomologist.

JACK

Fuzzomologist? Oh, for heaven's sakes.

KOVACS

What's the matter?

JACK

You just finished a crossword puzzle I've been working on for two weeks.

KOVACS

Jack, have you ever considered what a moustache would do for you?

JACK 3

No, no, I haven't.

KOVACS

I found it to be a very important influence in my life... There was a time when I was shy ...withdrawn...but the moment I grew a moustache, it changed my whole personality.

JACK :

Really?

KOVACS

Yes...I was the most popular eight year old on the block.

JACK

You wore a moustache when you were eight years old?

KOVACS

On my way to school people used to point at me and say, "Help that little old man across the street."

JACK

That's funny...I don't wear a moustache and that happened to me yesterday.

KOVACS

(LOOKING CLOSELY AT JACK)
You know, Jack...you could
change your whole personality.
I have my moustache collection
right here.

JACK

Look, Ernie...

KOVACS

(CALLS)

Would you bring my collection out, please?

JACK

Moustache collection?

I've heard of a lot of other...

A BEAUTIFUL GIRL COMES IN WHEELING A CART ON WHICH IS A CLOSED SHALLOW BOX. SHE GIVES KOVACS A KISS.

KOVACS (CONT'D)

(TO JACK)

It's the moustache...

THE GIRL KISSES KOVACS AGAIN...HE FINALLY PUSHES HER AWAY. (JACK APPROACHES GIRL...KOVACS HOLDS UP HAND)

KOVACS (CONT'D)

Barely enough for me...
You're crushing my picture
of Bert Parks... Later perhaps.

HE BEATS HER OFF AND SHE EXITS.

KOVACS

It's enough to drive you to shave.

JACK

I can imagine.

KOVACS

(OPENING THE BOX)

Now, then, what kind of a moustache would you prefer?

JACK

Well....

(LOOKING OFF AFTER GIRL)

If you're going to shave yours, I'd like that one.

KOVACS

No, no, Jack...We have to find one to suit your personality.

HE HANDS JACK A MIRROR, THEN REACHES INTO THE BOX AND BRINGS OUT A NORMAL MOUSTACHE.

KOVACS (CONT'D)

Here...something more for your personality. Let's try this.

HE PUTS THE MOUSTACHE ON JACK. JACK LOOKS AT HIMSELF IN THE MIRROR.

JACK

I look like Colonel Blimp. I don't like this one. Doesn't do anything for me.

KOVACS TAKES THAT MOUSTACHE OFF JACK. PUTS ANOTHER ON.

KOVACS

WHATIS TRIS?

A smog filter.

JACK

A smog filter?

KOVÁCS

You can put it on your nose or your exhaust pipe.

JACK PULLS IT OFF.

KOVACS (CONT'D)

Let's not give up, Jack...Ah, this one will be very popular now that Alaska is a state.

(PUTS A WALRUS MOUSTACHE ON JACK)

A walrus moustache.

JACK `

(LOOKING AT SELF IN MIRROR)

Does this bring out my personality?

KOVACS

I don't know...If we put a fish in your mouth...

JACK PULLS OFF THE MOUSTACHE.

Chic and petit. On boy...Huh?
HE PUTS AN ATTRACTIVE MOUSTACHE ON JACK.

JACK

This one. I like this one.

I could wear it all the time,

I really could.

KOVACS

I think it's beginning to work now...Look.

AN OLD LADY COMES UP ON STAGE FROM AUDIENCE, KISSES JACK, DOES AN ECSTATIC BACK FLIP, THEN EXITS OFF STAGE.

JACK

That's the one that helped me across the street yesterday.

Well, I don't know, Ernie.

USHER COMES ON STAGE.

USHER

Pardon me, but there's a phone call for Mr. Kovacs...It's a Mr. Sherman.

JACK

Is that Mr. Sherman the movie producer?

KOVACS

Yes...He's casting a new picture.

A picture?

KOVACS

(TO USHER)

Look, I'm in the middle of a show, would you tell him I can't take the call now.

JACK .

I'll take it! I'll take it!

KOVACS

On second thought, maybe I better talk to him.

KOVACS RIPS MOUSTACHE OFF JACK. WE HEAR RIP AND JACK RUBS HIS LIP.

JACK

Okay...while Ernie is gone to use the phone, I'll have Don Wilson do the commercial.

ERNIE KOVACS EXITS TO APPLAUSE, PUSHING CART OFF.

JACK (CONT'D)

Oh, Don...Don Wilson. Would you come out, please?

DON COMES OUT TO <u>APPLAUSE</u>. HE IS WEARING A BEATNIK BEARD.

JACK (CONT'D)

Don, I know we have Ernie Kovacs as a guest and we did a lot of jokes about moustaches, but this is ridiculous. DON

Man, this has nothing to do
with Kovacs. All us boys at the
coffee house wear beards.

JACK

Coffee house?

DON

(WITH A CIRCULAR MOVEMENT OF HAND)

Like yes.

Like yes?!...Don, you've started hanging out in coffee houses?

DON

Expresso, man, Expresso.

JACK

Don, I never thought you'd become a beatnick... A fatnick, yes... but a beatnick no.

DON

(TAKING JACK'S HEAD IN HIS HANDS)

Oh, man, your melon has corners on it.

JACK

Now cut that out. Look, Don,
I don't know what you're talking
about but obviously you have
something in mind so get started
with it.

DON AND GROUP DO COMMERCIAL. APPIAUSE.

DON

Listen to the beat

Beat, beat, beat, beat...

Listen to the beat

If you're bugged with your business

If you're weary of your wife

Don't be dull or dejected

There's a better way of life.

Just forget responsibilities

Prepare to have a treat...manlike.

GROUP.

and listen to the beat.

Yes, we're the beat generation,

Assorted aggregation.

We scorn obligation...

No, we won't conform...

On, dig the beat generation,

A modest operation,

We're taking the nation by a very little storm.

DON

Lend an ear to our story, chum.

If you're a working man

Take a break...light a Lucky

Which there's no smoke better than.

Get the taste that's true and always rich

A taste just mild enough.

MORE)

DON (CONT'D)

You'll dig the taste of Lucky Strike. When you begin to puff...puff...puff...puff...

GROUP

Puff...puff...puff...puff...puff...

MAN

Hey, Don.

DON

Yeah, man.

MAN

If you're gonna be beat, the first thing you gotta do is communicate. I mean like you gotta talk the language you know.

DON

Like how?

GROUP

A cig is what you're smoking and jazzy means it's great. A cat is one who's on the beat. An outer gets the gate.

DON

So don't be an outer...just be a cat. And puff on a Lucky while you chitchat. For that's the way you're smoking. If you're smoking on the beat...beat...beat...

ALL

A Lucky Strike is the utmost.

The very living utmost.

From East to the West Coast

Lucky Strike is really in.

Get a good grip on your lighter

And prepare to have a treat.

Man, like, light up a Lucky

And you're smoking on the beat.

(AFTER INTEGRATED COMMERCIAL)

JACK

I don't know. Times have changed.

I used to be a minuet-nik.

KOVACS COMES BACK ON.

KOVACS

I'm sorry I took so long, Jack, but it's all settled.

JACK

Good, good. Did Mr. Sherman offer you a part in the picture.

KOVACS

(WITH CIRCULAR HAND MOTION)

But, yes. But I turned it down.

JACK -

You turned down the picture. But why?

KOVACS

Well, Jack, it's a story about a prison with the rock pile... leg irons...jute mills...and all that stuff.

JACK

What's wrong with that?

KOVACS

Those things are passe. Prisons aren't like that any more. Now they use the scientific approach. The prisoners now have recreation...visiting privileges ...honor systems.

JACK

You're right, Ernie. I was reading an article about that. The emphasis now is on rehabilitation...on being nice to the prisoners.

KOVACS

That's true...and if the present trend continues, can you imagine what it will lead to?

JACK -

I certainly can.

KOVACS

Well, with your help, let's show the audience what prisons could be like in 1970.

JACK -

All right, Ernie...Let's do that... (CALLS)

A little prison music, please.

PRISON MUSIC

EXTERIOR STILL SHOT OF HILLCREST COUNTRY CLUB.

DON'S VOICE

Ladies and gentlemen, this is
Claremont Prison, a federal penal
institution in the year 1970.
Claremont Prison, typical of many
institutions throughout the country,
is located on Nob Hill in San
Francisco, overlooking the Golden
Gate Bridge. Here, taking their
course of correction, are such
notorious criminals as Mugsy
McGurk.

CLOSE UP OF TOUGH-LOOKING MUGSY MCGURK.

Mr. McGurk, how long have you been in Claremont Prison?

1ST MAN

(MOOLEY)

Now let's see...I've been incarcerated in this rehabilitation center for high onto 16 years.

DON'S VOICE

Sixteen years?

1ST MAN

Yep...Four more years and they give me a gold watch...Would you like to meet some of the other boys?

DON'S VOICE

Yes, yes, I would.

1ST MAN

(POINTING TO HIS RIGHT)

Over there stands the country's number one counterfeiter.

CAMERA MOVES OVER TO MAN WHO LOOKS LIKE GEORGE WASHINGTON.

DON'S VOICE

So you're the country's number one counterfeiter.

SND MAN

No.

CAMERA PULLS BACK TO INCLUDE A MAN TO HIS RIGHT.

2ND MAN (CONT'D)

(POINTING TO MAN ON HIS RIGHT)

He's the counterfeiter, I'm his model.

DON'S VOICE

Oh...then you're the counterfeiter.

3RD MAN

That's me... Inky Green.

DON'S VOICE

Tell me, what made you take up counterfeiting?

3RD MAN

Well, I used to be a shoplifter...
then one day my conscience bothered
me so I figured I ought to start
paying for the stuff.

DON'S VOICE

Well, all I can say is you're all heart, Stinky.

3RD MAN

That's Inky!

DON'S VOICE

Now, ladies and gentlemen, having met some of the inmates, we bring you "A Day in Claremont Prison" ...or...Blockhouse Ninety.

STINGER AND MUSIC

CUT TO LARGE CELL WITH NO DOOR ON IT. ON THE REAR WALL IS A LARGE WINDOW WITH BARS SET CLOSER TOGETHER THAN NORMAL. TWO MEN ARE IN THE CELL PLAYING CHECKERS. ONE OF THEM IS GETTING A SHINE. A MAN COMES IN WITH SOME MAIL.

4TH MAN

Mail call...Mail call...I've got some letters for Killer Kovacs and Benny the Louse...Where are they?

1ST PRISONER

I don't know, I haven't seen them this morning. Did you, Joe?

2ND PRISONER

No...

(TO MAN SHINING HIS SHOES)

Did you, Warden?

WARDEN

No.

WE HEAR AN AUTO HORN.

4TH MAN

Here they come now.

KOVACS AND JACK COME IN IN A GOLF CART WITH GOLF BAGS IN THE REAR. KOVACS IS DRIVING AND WHEN THE CART STOPS, THEY GET OUT.

JACK

Well, Killer, you sure played a great game today. Your drives are improving.

KOVACS

Yeah...much better than yesterday.

JACK

Oh, I just remembered...we forgot to pay the caddy.

KOVACS

We won't have to... I ran over him.

JACK

Oh, good, good...Say, Warden, when you finish there, will you take care of these clubs?

WARDEN

Yes, sir.

4TH MAN

Here are some letters for you.

(HANDING LETTER)

Here's yours, Killer.

(HANDING LETTER)

And here's one for Benny the Louse.

4TH MAN EXITS. JACK OPENS HIS LETTER.

KOVACS

Hey, who's it from?

JACK :

(PEERING AT LETTER)

I don't know...It's kind of dark in here...I can't see...

KOVACS

Wait a minute...I'll get you a little more light.

JACK

Yeah, get some more light, will you? I can hardly read this.

KOVACS PULLS ON A CORD AT THE SIDE OF THE BARRED REAR WINDOW AND THE BARS PULL TO ONE SIDE LIKE A VERTICAL VENETIAN BLIND. WE HEAR THE CLANKING OF METAL BARS AS THIS HAPPENS.

JACK

Hey, it's from my wife. Look how she starts it. Isn't that cute? "Dear Louse..."

WARDEN

Hey, Louse, do me a favor, will you? This is Claremont Prison. Why don't you change your name?

JACK -

(SCRATCHING)

If you change my sheets, I'll change my name.

WARDEN

We change them three times a day.
You're always complaining...always
complaining.

KOVACS

Never mind...just clean the clubs or I'll call the governor. Get this out of here.

WARDEN DRIVES OFF IN GOLF CART.

KOVACS

(TO CHECKER PLAYERS, ANGRILY)

Checkers...checkers...all the time checkers.

JACK :

What's the matter, Killer?
They're not bothering anybody.
They're a couple of nice guys.

KOVACS

Nice guys. All I know is when I came up here, they promised me a single room...stinking judge!

TWO MEN WALK BY CARRYING TENNIS RACQUETS AND TOWELS AND WEARING STRIPED TENNIS SHORTS. KOVACS GOES OVER TO THE BULLETIN BOARD.

KOVACS (CONT'D)

Look, they posted the week's activities...

(READING)

On next Tuesday the Polo match will be delayed a half hour in order not to conflict with the cha cha lessons.

JACK

Who needs cha cha lessons?

KOVACS

You do. During the New Year's Eve party you stepped all over my feet.

JACK

Well, you deserved it. Wearing a dress with that silly moustache. That was ridiculous.

A PRISON GUARD COMES IN CARRYING TWO SUITCASES.

JACK (CONTID)

Hey, what's going on here?

GUARD

The warden is bringing in a new prisoner.

JACK

In this same room?

KOVACS

Another one? On, that stinking judge.

GUARD EXITS.

WARDEN'S VOICE

Right this way.

THE WARDEN ENTERS WITH A NEW PRISONER. THE WARDEN SHOWS HIM AROUND THE CELL.

WARDEN (CONT'D)

(OPENING DOOR IN STONE WALL)

(CLOSES DOOR)

I hope you enjoy your stay.

WARDEN EXITS.

NEW PRISONER

Say, fellows, is this one of those prisons without bars?

JACK

No...no...We have bars all over.
We have a bar in the lounge...one
in the dining hall...and one in
the gas chamber.

NEW PRISONER

A bar in the gas chamber?

KOVACS -

You know...one for the road.

NEW PRISONER

Hey, fellows, when do we eat around here? I'm starved.

JACK

I wish you'd mentioned it. About time.

(MORE)

JACK (CONT'D) :

(PICKS UP PHONE)

Hello...Room Service?...This is Cell Number 785...We have a standing order to have dinner here every night at five o'clock. Where

is it?

CHEF WHEELS IN A CART LADEN WITH FOOD. THE CHEF IS DRESSED IN FULL REGALIA AND IS FOLLOWED BY TWO WAITERS, PUSHING TABLE SET WITH PLATES AND FLOWERS.

JACK (CONT'D)

(HANGS UP. TO NEW PRISONER;)

You'll like the food in here.

Won't he, Killer?

KOVACS

Yeah, it's great.

AS THEY CONTINUE EATING A CIGARETTE GIRL COMES IN.

CIGARETTE GIRL

Cigarettes...Candy

...souveniers...cigarettes...

cigarettes....

JACK

Yes, thanks. I'll have some

Luckies.

A GIRL ENTERS WITH A CAMERA.

CAMERA GIRL

Would you like your picture taken?

KOVACS

No, thanks.

CAMERA GIRL STARTS TO EXIT.

Wait a minute, Miss...come back.

KOVACS

But I don't want my picture taken.

JACK

But Killer.. I want something to remember you by. This is your last day here.. Today you're being released.

KOVACS !

(EMOTIONALLY UPSET)

You promised you wouldn't talk about that.

JACK

Come on, Killer...let's have our picture taken.

KOVACS

Well, okay...lend me your comb.

JACK HANDS HIM A COMB, KOVACS COMBS HIS MOUSTACHE. THEY POSE, THE GIRL TAKES THEIR PICTURE.

CAMERA GIRL

I'll have this for you in a few minutes.

WARDEN COMES IN WITH TWO GUARDS.

WARDEN

Killer Kovacs, your time has come.

JACK

They're after you, Killer. You gotta go.

KOVACS

I don't went to go! I don't went to go!

JACK

Take it easy, Killer...go like a man...the rest of the guys look up to you as an example.

KOVACS

I don't care about being an example. I don't want to go.

JACK :

Killer, control yourself.

KOVACS

(CALLS)

I'm going, fellows.

HE SHAKES HANDS WITH JACK.

JACK .

Good bye, Killer.

KOVACS

Good bye, Louse.

HE SHAKES HANDS WITH NEW PRISONER.

KOVACS -

Good bye, Alfred.

HE SHAKES HANDS WITH INKY

KOVACS

So long, Stinky.

INKY

Inky!

KOVACS

Inky...Inky!

HE SHAKES HANDS WITH 1ST MAN AND THEY SOB,

WARDEN

Come on, Killer, we're waiting.

PRISONERS LINE UP TO SAY GOODBYE TO KOVACS AS HE WALKS THE LAST MILE. THEY HUM "GOING HOME" AS HE SLOWLY WALKS BY THEM ...AT ONE POINT HE STUMBLES AND THE GUARDS HOLD HIM UP.

KOVACS

(AS THEY REACH THE DOOR)

I can't face it! I can't face it!

WARDEN

You've got to... Open the door.

ONE OF THE GUARDS OFENS THE DOOR. WE SEE PROCESS SHOT OF CARS DRIVING BY ON BUSY STREET.

KOVACS

(HYSTERICAL)

Taxes...and traffic. You can't do this to me. You can't do this to me. Please...please!

THEY THROW HIM OUT AND CLOSE THE DOOR BEHIND HIM.

JACK

I never thought Killer would crack...but we all have to go sometime.

(HOLDING UP SMALL JAR)

Here, stranger, have some caviar.

NEW PRISONER

Thanks. By the way, Louse, how long are you in for?

Ten years.

NEW PRISONER

Ten years...What did you do?

JACK

Nothing, I won it on a quiz program.

JACK LOOKS AT THE AUDIENCE. CHEF HEGINS SERVING FOOD.

MUSIC STARTS

MUSIC UP FULL AND APPLAUSE

DON

Benny the Louse will be back in just a moment with his guest, Ernie Kovacs, but first, here's a word about the honest taste of a Lucky Strike.

CUT TO COMMERCIAL.

JACK BENNY PROGRAM
JANUARY 25, 1959 (Taped: Jan. 18, 1959)
CLOSING COMMERCIAL
#178 WRECKER -- SURF FISHERMAN

VIDEO

OPEN ON A LONG SHOT OF A SETEL BALL SWINGING MENACINGLY BACK AND FORTH ON THE END OF A WIRE CABLE.

CAMERA FOLLOWS AS BALL WHIPS SUDDENLY FROM LEFT TO RIGHT AND SMASHES INTO A BRICK WALL. BRICKS EXPLODE IN A SHOWER OF DUST.

CUT TO MCU OF OPERATOR OF HOUSEWRECKING CRANE SITTING IN THE CABIN OF HIS MACHINE. THROUGH THE CABIN WINDOW WE GLIMPSE THE HALF-SMASHED WALL AND THE SUSPENDED STEEL BALL. HE IS SMOKING A LUCKY.

CUT TO CU AS TITLE BEGINS TO TUMBLE DOWN IN PIECES, FORMING WORDS "LUCKY STRIKE" HOLD.

ABRUPT CUT TO DAWN SETTING ON BEACH. A MODERATELY HEAVY SURF IS RUNNING. A MAN, CENTER FORE-GROUND WINDS UP AND LETS FLY IN PERFECT SURF CAST. HE HAS A LUCKY IN HIS MOUTH.

TITLE "LUCKY STRIKE" SHIPS ON INSIDE OUT IN SYNC.

ABSORBED IN THE OUTCOME OF HIS TRY, HE SMOKES UNSELF-CONSCIOUSLY.

AUDIO

(SOUND: SOUND OF DEISELS -- NOT TOO LOUD)

(SOUND: "WHUMMMMMMP" AS STEEL BALL HITS WALL)

(SOUND: MUFFLED RUMBLE OF MACHINES -- UNDER:)

COMMENTATOR (OVER)

You can be awfully busy and still have time for a cigarette.

A lot of men like this one ...

(SOUND: OFF SCREEN DEMOLITION NOT TOO LOUD)

like this one. Lucky Strike. It's the genuine article.

(SOUND: SURF FOUNDING IN ON BEACH MIXED WITH THE CRY OF GULLS -- NOT TOO LOUD)

(SOUND: THE SCREAM OF THE REEL AS IT UNWINDS AT HIGH SPEED -- NOT TOO LOUD)

COMMENTATOR (OVER)

Outdoors you can taste it when you smoke -- Lucky Strike.

(SOUND: REEL OUT)

The honest taste of fine tobacco.

That's what you get with Lucky

Strike. Smoke one and see.

VIDEO

CUT TO CLOSEUP OF FISHERMAN ON DOWNBEAT OF SONG. IN BACKGROUND WE SEE DUNES.

POP ON PACK AT MIDDLE-GROUND, SCREEN RIGHT, ON BEAT AFTER "FORGET". ZOOM UP ON "TASTE".

CUT ON BEAT TO WRECKER AT SCREEN RIGHT, PACK ON LEFT.

LOSING SUPERED PACK.

ANIMATE ON TITLE, "THE GENUINE ARTICLE" IN SYNC.

DISSOLVE TO CARTON BELOW "GET THE HONEST TASTE OF A LUCKY STRIKE".

HOLD WORDS.

AUDIO

SINGERS (OVER)

Never was a man who could forget The taste of a genuine cigarette.

Get the honest taste a man can like The honest taste of a Lucky Strike.

CUT ON BEAT TO TIGHT SHOT OF GUY, The honest taste of a Lucky Strike.

COMMENTATOR (OVER)

Get the genuine article. Get the honest taste ...

. . of a Lucky Strike.

TAG

JACK COMES OUT TO MUSIC & APPLAUSE.

JACK

Thank you, ladies and gentlemen..

and now once again I'd like to

bring out my guest star..Ernie Kovacs....ERNIE.

KOVACS COMES OUT TO APPLAUSE.

JACK

Ernie, it was nice having you on the show and it was a lot of fun doing that prison sketch, wasn't it?

KOVACS

Yes, but do you think we started a crime wave?

JACK

No..some of the comic books
beat us to it...But, Ernie, at
the finish when you had to leave
the prison, I thought you did
a terrific job of acting..In fact,
it was so good it got me right here.

(PATS CHEST)

KOVACS

If that's the place you keep the wallet, we got it.

That's all right. We won't forget.

KOVACS

Jack, before I go, I want to compliment you for your wonderful performance in that picture, "Bell, Book and Candle."

JACK

Wait a minute, Ernie... I wasn't in "Bell, Book and Candle."

KOVACS

Well, I was and nobody's even mentioned it.

JACK

I'm sorry...I forgot about it...
and thanks again. Now Ernie,
I believe our half hour is up...
so good bye.

KOVACS

(DRAMATIC)

I don't want to go...I don't want to go...In five minutes I would have been on overtime.

APPLAUSE

Ladies and gentlemen, next week
be sure to watch Bachelor Father
starring John Forsythe and I'll
be back in two weeks when my guest
star will be Danny Thomas...and
also, but don't tell her...Mary
Livingstone.
