'OLYMPIC PREVIEW,' FULL-HOUR NBC COLOR SPECIAL,  
TO FEATURE GAMES AND STARS--PAST AND PRESENT

Olympics and Olympians past and present will be featured in "Olympic Preview," a one-hour color special on the NBC-TV Network Monday, Sept. 28 (10-11 p.m. EDT).

One of the stars of the 1960 Olympics, decathlon champion Rafer Johnson, will join with Bud Palmer, Jim Simpson and Bill Henry as commentators for the show. The four also form the broadcasting team for NBC-TV's two-week coverage of the 1964 Summer Olympic Games in Tokyo starting Saturday, Oct. 10. NBC-TV plans to cover the opening ceremonies live via the new Syncom III satellite (1 to 3 a.m. EDT; 2 p.m. Japanese time that same day), and will present exclusive taped telecasts of Olympic events each evening while the Games are in progress, with 19 telecasts totaling 14½ hours.

Sponsoring the "Preview" special and NBC-TV's coverage of the Olympic Games will be P. Lorillard Company (through Lennen & Newell Inc.), Joseph Schlitz Brewing Company (through Leo Burnett Company Inc.), Texaco Inc. (through Benton & Bowles Inc.) and Autolite Division of Ford Motor Company (through Batten, Barton, Durstine & Osborn Inc.).

Motion picture film of the 1900 Games in Paris -- the II Olympiad -- will be shown during the historical segment of "Olympic

Preview." The 64-year-old film was discovered in the National Archives in Washington, D. C., by Dick Auerbach, associate producer of NBC-TV's Olympic coverage.

Former Olympic champions to be seen in film clips include Paavo Nurmi, Johnny Weissmuller, Buster Crabbe, Babe Didrikson and Jesse Owens. Film and still pictures will review the origin of the Ancient Olympic Games in Greece and the modern-era revival by French Baron Pierre de Coubertin, leading to the first Olympic Games of the present cycle at Athens in 1896.

Other highlights of "Olympic Preview" will include:

The closing ceremonies of the 1960 Games in Rome, with Avery Brundage, President of the International Olympic Committee, calling upon athletes of all countries to assemble at Tokyo for the 1964 Games;

Japan's preparations for staging the Olympics with construction of stadiums, pools, living quarters, highways and other facilities;

A report from Olympic Village by John Rich, NBC News correspondent in Tokyo;

Rafer Johnson reflecting on what it's like to compete in the Olympics;

Film clips of some of the outstanding contestants expected to compete this year, including C. K. Yang of Nationalist China, the favorite in the decathlon and 1960 runner-up to Johnson; Abebe Bikila of Ethiopia, defending champion in the marathon, who ran the 26 miles in bare feet four years ago; Peter Snell of New Zealand, 800-meter

champion in 1960; Valery Brumel of Russia, world record-holder in the high jump, and swimmer Donna de Varona, the baby of the U. S. Olympic team in 1960 when she was 13 years old;

The lighting of the Olympic torch at Olympia in Greece;

A roundtable discussion by the four commentators of new events in the 1964 Games, the records most likely to be broken and the overall schedule from Oct. 10 to 24.

"Olympic Preview" will be produced by Jim Kitchell, who also is producer of NBC-TV's two-week Olympic Games coverage. Dick Auerbach is associate producer, Ray Lockhart is the director, Al Helias the film editor and Roy Silver, Dennis Dalton and Tom Tomizawa the writers. Jacques Belasco will compose and conduct original music for the color special.

LINDSEY NELSON AND TERRY BRENNAN TO HANDLE  
THE PLAY-BY-PLAY COMMENTARY FOR NBC-NCAA  
NATIONAL FOOTBALL TELECASTS OF THE WEEK

Lindsey Nelson and Terry Brennan will handle the play-by-play commentary for NBC-NCAA national football telecasts of the week, Carl Lindemann Jr., Vice President, NBC Sports, announced today.

Nelson's football broadcasting career began back in 1941 while he was an undergraduate at the University of Tennessee. He joined NBC in 1952 as assistant sports director, and since then has been broadcasting both college and professional football as well as other sporting events. He was voted the nation's outstanding sportscaster four years running by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association Awards Committee, and was selected as Sportscaster of the Year in the All-American Awards Poll conducted by Radio-Television Daily.

Terry Brennan played halfback on three undefeated Notre Dame teams -- in 1946, 1947, and 1948 (the first two of them national champions) -- and led the team in scoring in 1946 and 1947. In 1953 he returned to Notre Dame as freshman coach and the following year was named head coach, a post he held for five years. This will be his third season of teaming with Lindsey Nelson, and their comprehensive knowledge of football played a role in a major rule change last year, establishing

the eligibility of the quarterback as a pass receiver, first back to handle the ball on most plays in modern-day football.

NBC-TV's national grid coverage starts Saturday, Sept. 12.

The five regional dates, all Saturdays, are Sept. 19, Oct. 3, Oct. 24, Oct. 31, and Nov. 21. The combined national-regional schedule provides football fans in the entire country with an outstanding football telecast on 13 consecutive Saturdays and Thanksgiving Day.

David Niven and Gig Young Star in Premiere

With Miami and Riviera Setting

David Niven and Gig Young will star in "The Personal Touch," the premiere episode of "The Rogues" on NBC-TV Sunday, Sept. 13 (10 to 11 p.m. NYT). Robert Coote and Gladys Cooper will co-star; Walter Matthau, Dina Merrill, Alfred Ryder and John Dehner will be guest stars.

The new weekly full-hour comedy-adventure series deals with a family of charming crooks who flourish by their wit, imagination and breeding. Niven, Young and Charles Boyer will alternate in weekly episodes and, when not starring, will appear in cameo roles. Coote and Miss Cooper will be virtual every-week performers.

In the initial episode, which opens in Miami, Niven and Coote con an American swindler (Dehner) out of \$25,000. This serves them as operating capital for the main caper that takes place on the Riviera. There they pose as tourists with the object of separating a greedy ship-owner (Matthau) from his fortune. They also separate him from the girl he plans to marry (Miss Merrill).

### "PRIVATE SCREENING--AN INFORMAL LOOK AT NBC'S GREAT NEW SEASON"

Richard Chamberlain, Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Danny Thomas, Jack Paar and Andy Williams are among the performers in a special NBC-TV color program. Newsmen Chet Huntley, David Brinkley, Frank McGee and the corps of NBC foreign correspondents will also appear. But this super-spectacular special color program will not be seen in the nation's homes.

This largest gathering of television talent ever assembled for a special program will be appearing in "Private Screening -- an Informal Look at NBC's Great New Season," a 75-minute closed circuit preview of the new NBC Television season, which will be transmitted to NBC affiliated stations across the country Wednesday, Sept. 9 (4:45 to 6 p.m. EDT).

For Jack Benny, his appearance on the special will mark his first performance since his return to NBC. Benny and Richard Chamberlain will act as co-hosts for the program, which will blueprint the entire NBC-TV nighttime entertainment schedule for the 1964-65 season. One of the special segments of the program will describe forthcoming NBC News programs, along with highlights in the impressive new NBC sports schedule.

The concluding segment of the program will be an outline of the unprecedented advertising, press and promotional support which the network has planned for the Fall premieres.

As announced, the guest will be Robert H. Welch Jr., founder and president of the John Birch Society. The program will be colorcast live from New York on the NBC-TV Network at 6 p.m. EDT and broadcast on the NBC Radio Network at 6:30 p.m. EDT.

## MEET 'THE ROGUES'

"The Rogues," NBC-TV's new comedy-melodrama about a family of jet-set jewel thieves and con men who are masters at separating the pompous rich from their ill-gotten gains, will be a regular feature on the network beginning Sunday, Sept. 13 (10-11 p.m. NYT).

Gig Young, Charles Boyer and David Niven star as the quick-witted, high-living swindlers whose credo -- "Honor Before Honesty" -- usually causes them to donate their loot to some deserving party -- after expenses, of course.

Played against a backdrop of Riviera beaches, palatial villas, beautiful women and the green felt gaming tables of Monte Carlo and other oases where the fabulously rich gather to play, "The Rogues" presents a weekly excursion into sophisticated comedy and a look at life as lived by "the other half."

Young, Boyer and Niven portray members of a cultured and refined family whose tree fairly bends under the weight of descendants who left a heritage of success as notorious but loved ne'er-do-wells. Young, as Tony Fleming, represents the American branch and lives in New York. Boyer portrays Marcel St. Clair of the Paris "office," and Niven, as Alec Fleming, heads the English branch. Although in semi-retirement at Montego Bay in the Caribbean, Alec still ventures out for very special "deals."

The three will alternate in weekly episodes of the series and, when not starring, will appear in cameo roles.

Each, regardless of where the "game" takes him, will be ably assisted by Timmy St. Clair (Robert Coote), cousin to all three. A firm advocate of the Honor Before Honesty credo and a

master of disguise, Timmy -- whether as a French gendarme, Swiss diplomat or Interpol inspector -- is always around as a backstop.

Aunt Margaret (Gladys Cooper), the grand dame of the group and Timmy's "Mum," resides in a plush town house almost in the shadow of Buckingham Palace. The home serves as sort of a command headquarters where plans are formulated and Aunt Meg mothers her brood with tea and watercress sandwiches. Occasionally she participates in a caper -- just to keep her hand in or to help the boys.

The other member of the clan is four-footed. He is Pertwee, a 100-pound English bulldog who loves his larcenous masters as only a bulldog can.

Other than Pertwee, only one member of the cast, Gig Young, is American born. As their swindling schemes are international, so is the cast. Boyer was born in France, Robert Coote and Gladys Cooper in England and Niven is a native of Scotland.

Gig Young's career began at the Pasadena Playhouse where he was spotted by Warner Brothers and signed to a contract. He has since garnered two Academy Award nominations for Best Supporting Actor" ("Come Fill the Cup" and "Teacher's Pet") and has twice won the Laurel Award presented by the Motion Picture Exhibitors and Theatre Owners of America for his supporting performances in "Tunnel of Love" and "That Touch of Mink."

Charles Boyer, one of Hollywood's all-time greats, has starred in dozens of films including "All This and Heaven Too," "Back Street," "Gaslight" and "Hold Back the Dawn." He is one of the founders -- with Niven -- of Four Star Productions, producers of "The Rogues" and many other TV series.

David Niven has long been a box office favorite and has starred in 82 pictures including "The Moon Is Blue," "Wuthering Heights," "Please Don't Eat the Daisies" and "Around the World in Eighty Days." In 1958 he won an Academy Award and the New York Film Critics Award as Best Actor for his performance in "Separate Tables."

Robert Coote, star of stage and screen in several countries, is probably best known to American audiences for his performances as Colonel Pickering in "My Fair Lady" and King Pellinore in "Camelot" -- both on Broadway.

Gladys Cooper has distinguished herself in both America and Europe during a career that spans more than half a century. She has won two Academy Award nominations, one in 1942 for "Now Voyager" and the next year for "Song of Bernadette." Other films in which she has appeared include "Green Dolphin Street," "Madame Bovary" and "Kitty Foyle."

Collier Young will produce the series. He previously produced "The Joseph Cotten Show -- On Trial" for NBC-TV and has been an executive in television and motion pictures for many years.

Hy Averback, who last year produced and directed the "Ensign O'Toole" series for the network, will direct many of the episodes. Other directors will be signed in the future.

Ivan Goff and Ben Roberts will be head writers. They have worked as a writing team for 20 years and have turned out such top feature films as "White Heat," "Come Fill the Cup," "Captain Horatio Hornblower," "Goodbye My Fancy" and "King of the Khyber Rifles."

'QUEBEC--OUI; OTTAWA--NON' WILL BE AN NBC NEWS  
FULL-HOUR COLOR SPECIAL ON GROWING HOSTILITY  
BETWEEN FRENCH AND BRITISH CANADIANS

"Quebec--Oui; Ottawa--Non," a special NBC-TV Network color-cast on Sunday, Sept. 27, 4:30-5:30 p.m. EDT, has been announced by William R. McAndrew, Executive Vice President in charge of NBC News. The hour will reflect the increasingly nationalistic attitudes of the French Canadians, who believe they have been repressed in economic, educational and social areas by the dominant British Canadians.

An NBC News unit, headed by producer Stuart Schulberg and correspondents Elie Abel and Robert MacNeil, spent several weeks in Quebec and Ottawa re-creating the English conquest of French Canada in 1759, recounting the history of French and British Canadian relations and developing a first-hand look at the present generation of French Canadians who want that relationship altered or even terminated.

At about the same time President Kennedy was establishing the "New Frontier" in the United States, the story shows how a revitalized Liberal Party, under young, vigorous leadership, took power in Quebec for the first time since before World War II and began instituting economic and social reforms to modernize the province. Although their efforts have been productive and they were reelected, extremist elements, who advocate a shooting rebellion in order to

establish a separate French nation, have been gaining support. Some officials fear that secession by Quebec would destroy Canada as a country and that the pieces would be gobbled up by the United States.

"Quebec--Oui; Ottawa--Non" shows how the national Canadian government has begun mollifying nationalistic sentiment in Quebec, while at the same time endeavoring to pacify hardline British Canadian sentiment which sees no need for reforms. One such move is the proposed new Canadian Flag, in which there would be no similarity to the British "Union Jack" such as now exists.

Although perhaps not as publicized as the turmoils in various Latin American countries, Schulberg feels the possibilities for upheaval in Canada are just as real. The program is particularly timely in view of the fact that Great Britain's Queen Elizabeth is due to visit Canada early next month. Recent terrorist activities have forced officials to consider whether the visit should continue as scheduled.

"Quebec--Oui; Ottawa--Non" is an attempt to familiarize the American public with the issues that seriously divide the peoples of Canada.

WITH STORY OF BUILDING A FORT TO THWART AN INDIAN ATTACK

Intrigue of pre-Revolutionary War politics and adventure on the Indian frontier are melded into an exciting, action-packed tale in "Ken-tuck-e," the premiere episode of NBC-TV's new "Daniel Boone" series, on Thursday, Sept. 24 (7:30-8:30 p.m. NYT).

The series stars Fess Parker as America's most famous frontiersman. It co-stars Albert Salmi as Yadkin, his woodsman sidekick; Ed Ames as Mingo, his Oxford-educated half-breed Indian friend; and Patricia Blair as his wife, Rebecca. Also to be seen in continuing roles will be Veronica Cartwright as Daniel's daughter, Jemima, and Darby Hinton as his son, Israel.

In "Ken-tuck-e," Daniel Boone and Yadkin are ordered by Gen. NIPPON TV'S PURCHASE OF 48 NEC NEWS AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS HOURS  
ANNOUNCED BY NBC INTERNATIONAL'S JOSEPH M. KLEIN, WHO RETURNS  
FROM JAPAN AND ANALYZES THE MARKET FOR U.S. SUPPLIERS

Nippon Television (NTV) bought 48 hours of NBC News and Public Affairs programming, it was announced by Joseph M. Klein, President, NBC International, a division of NBC Enterprises.

This package includes both instant news specials and planned documentaries. NTV transmits in color and thus will be able to take advantage of the fact that many NBC documentaries, such as "The Louvre" (scheduled for November on the network), are filmed in color. NTV also renewed "Bonanza" and Fuji TV bought "90 Bristol Court" and "Kentucky Jones." A variety of repeat programs were bought by other Japanese stations.

Mr. Klein just returned from a two-week trip to Japan where he reports that what was a seller's market for U. S. programming has turned into a buyer's market. Last year almost every American distributor was able to sell most, if not all, of his programs in Japan. However, heavy demand last year coupled with easing of exchange controls led to this year's slower sales and prices that are below last year's peaks.

According to Mr. Klein, the principal reason for this is that some American suppliers started asking record high prices at the end of last year and the beginning of this year. Where the average price was

approximately \$4,000, per hour, some producers started asking \$6,000 and \$8,000. Many Japanese stations, finding these prices beyond their economic capacity, were forced into varying degrees of production. An hour can be locally produced in Japan for as little as \$2,000-\$4,000 per hour. An American hour program, after the licensing fee, dubbing costs, and import duties are added, is priced around \$6,000. This, coupled with the fact that the top 20 programs in Japan are local Japanese programs, makes the inducement for home production obvious.

There is another factor which compounds this situation, Mr. Klein adds: Last year almost every network in Japan overbought American programming, and some of these programs are just now beginning to appear on the air.

While the sales picture appears somewhat discouraging, Mr. Klein is optimistic for the future. "American programs always have been and will continue to be popular in Japan," he says. The history of the feature film business in Japan shows that American programs have attracted as much as 25% of the sales in peak periods rather than the present 12%. The principal factor to be kept in mind by American producers, he adds, is that prices must be kept in proper relation with current economic factors in Japan to insure a sustained sales level.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION INTERVIEW OF DAVID POWERS BY NBC NEWS'

SANDER VANOCUR PLACED IN CONGRESSIONAL RECORD BY SEN. CHURCH

An interview with David Powers, longtime friend of the late President John F. Kennedy, by NBC News' correspondent Sander Vanocur at the Democratic national convention in Atlantic City, has been entered into the Congressional Record by Senator Frank Church (D.-Idaho).

Senator Church said that, in the interview, which took place Thursday night, Aug. 27, Vanocur "unearthed a fascinating addition to the growing compilation of historical sidelights on a great man." Senator Church also noted that an edited transcript of "this valuable" interview was printed in the Washington Post Sunday, Aug. 30.

In the interview Powers, a Bostonian who held the title of assistant to President Kennedy, recalled how he first met the late President in 1946 when Kennedy was running for Congress, and also related several anecdotes about incidents that took place during the 1960 Democratic convention, when President Kennedy appeared before the group of Protestant ministers in Houston, and before the first Kennedy-Nixon television debate.

Sixty minutes more...or 3,600 seconds in which Phyllis Diller can laugh. The 60 minutes more and Miss Diller both become part of NBC Radio's "Monitor" on Saturday, Oct. 3 when the Barry Nelson segment of "Monitor" begins broadcasting at 2 p.m. NYT, or one hour earlier than it is now heard.

The "daffy-dilly" Diller, often a guest on "Monitor," becomes a member of "Monitor Comedy Time" on Oct. 3. In the past year, Miss Diller has been interviewed on "Monitor" three times -- more than any other celebrity in showbusiness.

Now in its ninth year and one of the longest running programs in radio history, "Monitor" has compiled more hours of broadcasting than any other program since radio's beginnings.

Says Bob Maurer, "Monitor's" executive producer, "the 60 minutes more 'Monitor' is adding should be no chore at all to the program's staff of writers and feature coordinators. If pressed, they could turn the entire hour over to a dialogue between Phyllis Diller and her 'sister' on 'Comedy Time,' Selma Diamond. For 60 minutes that would be, if nothing else, 'unique.'

"Or..."Monitor" could turn Jonathan Winters loose and hope that "Maud Frickert" didn't wreck the joint. And Nichols and May could easily improvise for the 60 minutes more if not for the full four-hour segment. Then, too, 'Monitor's Expert on Nothing But Opinions on Everything,' Al Capp, could 'opinionate' in a pinch and Ethel of Ethel and Albert would glory in 60 minutes more in which to gossip."

Couple all of the above personalities with the NBC News corps stationed around the world and available to "Monitor" within seconds of a newsbreak and you've got 60 minutes bursting at the seams, Maurer says, and adds room still has to be made for Mel Allen and Joe Garagiola to report on and analyze the latest in the sports world. Also, somewhere in this 60 minutes more there must be air space for the musical moods of Frank Sinatra, Andy Williams, Patti Page and "Ella."

"Sixty minutes more? Why that hardly seems sufficient for 'Monitor,'" Maurer comments.

"WHAT'S THIS SONG?"--MUSICAL GAME SHOW  
STARRING WIN MARTINDALE--TO BE NBC-TV  
DAYTIME FEATURE STARTING OCT. 26

FOR RELEASE TUESDAY, SEPT. 8

"What's This Song?" a musical game show starring Win Martindale, will be presented in color on NBC-TV, Monday through Friday, from 10:30 to 10:55 a.m. NYT, beginning Monday, Oct. 26.

The program is based on the premise that every television viewer fancies himself an "expert" on popular music and would be amused by the opportunity to act as nonprofessional music detective. Two teams of players (two on a team) compete against each other in attempting to amass 200 points earned by identifying songs, after listening to the studio orchestra play the first eight bars of music from each of the "mystery" tunes.

In addition to receiving 20 points for correctly identifying a song, a team can add an additional 20 points if one or both of the members is able to sing the words to the first two lines of music correctly. Their rendition will be subject to challenge on the matter of correctness (though not the accuracy of their pitch). If the opponents' challenge is sustained, the challenging team gets the 20 points. If incorrect, the challengers have 20 points deducted from their score.

Each team will consist of one celebrity and one pre-selected member of the studio audience. Studio audience contestants will receive \$50 for each winning game, plus an opportunity to win an additional \$20 per song by correctly identifying the names of 10 songs in 60 seconds, in a special "Minute Medley" segment at the conclusion of each game. The celebrities participate in the entire day's play, but the losing studio contestant drops out and is replaced by a new player. At the outset of the game each team is given 100 of the 200 points it needs to win before play gets under way.

Music for "What's This Song?" will be provided by Bobby Hammack's Orchestra. The show, directed by Stuart Phelps, will be produced and packaged by Phelps-Reeves-Martin Productions, in association with NBC-TV.

The show will originate in NBC-TV's Burbank Color Studios.

"What's This Song?" will replace "Merv Griffin's Word for Word" in the Monday through Friday 10:30 a.m. NYT time-spot.

Win Martindale, host-emcee for "What's This Song?" is well-known in the Los Angeles and San Francisco area as a disk jockey and is to record fans as the singer of "Deck of Cards," which sold more than 1,000,000 copies. The 30-year old emcee-singer is heard six days a week on a Los Angeles radio station in his disk jockey role.

NBC NEWSMAN ALVIN ROSENFELD, WOUNDED IN CYPRUS, NOW IN  
NEW YORK FOR SURGERY TO REMOVE BULLET FROM HIS HEAD

NBC News correspondent Alvin Rosenfeld, who was wounded in Cyprus Aug. 9, was brought to New York from Jerusalem last night (Thursday, Sept. 3) for surgery to remove a bullet from his head.

At Harkness Pavilion, Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, he described his ordeal of waiting 10 hours for help after he was shot.

Rosenfeld was transferred to an ambulance at Kennedy International Airport upon his arrival aboard an El Al Israel Airlines plane. He was accompanied on the flight by Dr. Moshe M. Feuchtwanger of Hadassah University Hospital in Jerusalem, where he had been a patient.

"There was considerable fighting going on in the northwest part of Cyprus," Rosenfeld recalled. "The Greeks had mounted an offensive and the Turkish air force had bombed several buildings.

"I went out with my cameraman (Jay Miller) into this area where there was fighting. It was a no man's land near the village of Mansoura, which was half in Greek hands and half in Turkish hands. I was driving down a hill road toward a valley. Correspondents have driven down this road many times. We had a rented car which had a white stripe around it and Miller was waving a white handkerchief.

"I got shot. Whether or not they fired at me specifically is very difficult to tell. I was unconscious until the car came to a halt on two wheels in a ditch.

"Miller said they continued to fire at us. He tried to get help. It took 10 hours before an ambulance came. After a while I got out of the car and lay on the ground. During most of those 10 hours, while Miller was trying to get help, I was alone. I was conscious part of the time and unconscious part of the time.

"I was not aware that so much time went by, but the accident had happened about 5:30 p.m. and I was aware that night had fallen and I was alone. I was not frightened but I was concerned about when someone would come and help me.

"Finally a Swedish UN ambulance came and took me to the nearest hospital a half hour's drive away. I was given plasma and then I was taken to the British military base hospital at Dekelia, five hours away. Until I got there I had not been in a hospital bed for over 15 hours."

Later he was transferred to Hadassah University Hospital.

Rosenfeld said he does not remember hearing any sounds other than rifle bullets, yet doctors have told him he may have been struck by a grenade or some other metallic object. He said he believes he was hit by a bullet which was spent after shattering the car's windshield.

His wife, Judy, is expected to arrive in New York next week. She was unable to travel with him because their eight-month-old son, Joel, has just had an operation. Rosenfeld and the infant were in the same hospital in Jerusalem.

The Rosenfelds have two other children, Michael, eight, and Dana, six.

WITH LARGEST REPORTORIAL STAFF EVER ASSIGNED TO SUCH CONTESTS

NBC News will cover the 1964 political campaigns with the largest reportorial staff ever assigned to such coverage, Robert Northshield, General Manager of NBC News, announced today.

The campaign activities of President Johnson and Senator Goldwater will be covered by teams of three NBC News correspondents each and the activities of Senator Humphrey and Representative Miller by two-man teams. Each team will be headed by a supervisor and will include a unit manager. Camera crews will accompany the teams or join them for specific assignments.

"NBC News has increased its operation for covering this year's Presidential contest because we feel it will be an exceptionally exciting and significant one," said Northshield, who is in charge of NBC's entire political coverage this election year.

Eight special full-hour NBC News programs will be devoted to the political campaigns. In addition, extensive coverage will be presented on the "Huntley-Brinkley Report," which, Northshield noted, "was expanded to a half-hour to provide sufficient time for carrying important and long-running stories of this kind." There also will be campaign coverage on other regular news programs: "Today," "Sunday," and the four five-minute news programs presented each weekday.

## 'HUNTLEY-BRINKLEY REPORT' STARTS SECOND YEAR IN HALF-HOUR FORMAT WITH SUBSTANTIAL LEAD OVER COMPETITIVE NETWORK NEWSCASTS

The Huntley-Brinkley Report, which begins its second season tomorrow (Wednesday, Sept. 9) in its expanded half-hour format, has proved to be an outstanding success both in acceptance by the public and commercially, according to William R. McAndrew, Executive Vice President in Charge of NBC News.

McAndrew pointed to the year-long trend that has seen the "Huntley-Brinkley Report" build up a substantial lead over competitive network newscasts until it now enjoys a nightly audience twice as large as the ABC-TV news entry and an edge over a million homes more than are tuned to CBS-TV.

The program is 90 percent sold out, something McAndrew said he did not believe had been achieved before for a half-hour five-nights-a-week show. Furthermore, he said, negotiations are being held to sell the remaining 10 percent of time.

Key to the success of the program, of course, has been the authoritativeness, knowledge and hard work brought to it by Chet Huntley and David Brinkley. Their success as a news team, since they were brought together for the 1956 national political conventions, is unmatched in television history.

Part of the success also can be found in executive producer Reuven Frank, who assumed that position for the first "Huntley-Brinkley Report" Oct. 29, 1956. Through the years Frank has built up a smoothly functioning unit, based in New York and Washington but with

correspondents in every area of the world, that daily films, writes, edits and narrates material for the 30-minute show.

McAndrew and Frank believe one of the most rewarding aspects of the expanded format has been the opportunity it has given NBC News to develop new reportorial talent. Exposure on the "Huntley-Brinkley Report" has helped make correspondents Elie Abel and Robert MacNeil the outstanding television reporters they are today, McAndrew said.

Examples of younger talent are Garrick Utley, Dean Brelis, Andrew Pearson. These men, Frank said, have been in the right place at the right time and, given the chance to produce, have come through admirably. They are now looked on as dependable and excellent newsmen who add considerably to the already talent-laden NBC News staff.

Utley, son of the highly respected newsman Clifton Utley, got his start in Brussels under NBC News correspondent John Chancellor. This was only fair since Chancellor himself broke into journalism as a "man Friday" for Clifton Utley. Young Garrick now has a roving assignment, and has filed stories for the "Huntley-Brinkley Report" and NBC News from such locations as Brussels, Saigon, Hong Kong and London.

Brelis two years ago resigned a news position in the United States to go to Greece and write a novel. To help with his living expenses, he had arranged to act as a stringer from Athens for NBC News. Brelis never has gotten to his novel. He has been roving the Mediterranean and the Middle East for NBC News since his arrival there. He is credited with giving NBC News several important beats when the crisis on Cyprus arose earlier this year.

Pearson, son of the late Leon Pearson and nephew of Drew Pearson, is a one-man gang ... cameraman, writer and commentator.

He now is based in Saigon, working for the "Huntley-Brinkley Report." Of him, Frank says admiringly, "It may take him a month or two to work out the story, but when he does, we have something."

Pettit has been attached to the NBC News Los Angeles staff, but has filled in on numerous assignments for the "Huntley-Brinkley Report." His next assignment will be the Presidential campaign trail.

Frank has no major or even minor changes in store for the "Huntley-Brinkley Report." He has found that strictly feature pieces tend to slow down the program. Thus all features done on the show must be pegged to some current news event.

The success of the "Huntley-Brinkley Report," Frank said, can simply be attributed to getting the news fast and accurately, writing it well and presenting it professionally.

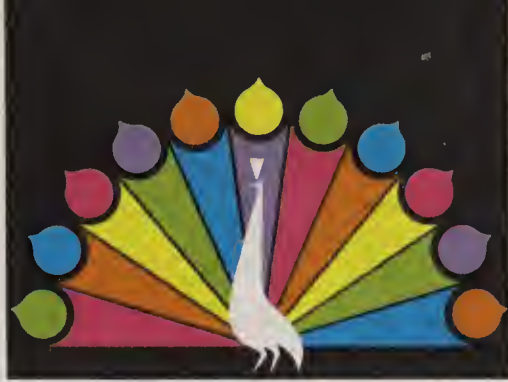

The fourth season of NBC-TV's "Saturday Night at the Movies" will be off and winging with the premiere color film, "Strategic Air Command," starring James Stewart, June Allyson, Frank Lovejoy and Barry Sullivan, Saturday, Oct. 3 (9 p.m. EDT to conclusion). The drama concerns the atom-carrying force on whose retaliatory strength the U. S. relies to maintain peace.

During the 1964-65 season, "Saturday Night at the Movies" will present 30 first-telecast Paramount and Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer films, most in color and with approximately two-thirds released in 1955 or later.

'G-E COLLEGE BOWL' STARTS ITS  
NEW SEASON SUNDAY, SEPT. 24

"G-E College Bowl," Peabody and Emmy Award-winning inter-collegiate question-and-answer series, will start its seventh season on TV and its second year as an NBC-TV color presentation when it resumes on the network Sunday, Sept. 20 (5:30-6 p.m. NYT).

Robert Earle is moderator of the fast-moving informational-educational entertainment program. He directs questions to opposing teams of college students, who compete for scholarship grants made to the schools they represent by the sponsor, the General Electric Company.

"G-E College Bowl" began as an NBC Radio Network series Oct. 10, 1953. Then, each four-member college team was on its own campus and the questions came from a moderator in NBC's New York radio studios via a three-way radio hookup. The program was revised to suit television presentation when it moved to CBS-TV Jan. 4, 1959, and each week's opposing teams were brought to New York to compete in the same studio. "College Bowl" returned to NBC when it started as a colorcast series Sept. 22, 1963.

Since its debut, the program has presented the cream of the nation's crop of bright and talented college and university students in weekly contests in which quick recall of facts -- in science, literature, government, world affairs, mathematics, history, mythology,

the performing arts and many other fields including nursery stories -- is paramount.

The rules of the contest provide that every week two teams of four students each compete against one another. The winning team receives a \$1,500 scholarship grant for its school and the runner-up \$500. The victors return the next week to face another school's group. Five consecutive victories are the maximum any school can win on the series. The earnings from five victories total \$7,500 plus a \$1,500 bonus for the fifth win, making a grand total of \$9,000, and the coveted title of "Retired Undefeated Champions" -- an accomplishment achieved by less than 10 percent of the more than 200 school teams that have competed during the past six seasons.

"G-E College Bowl" is sponsored by the General Electric Company. The advertising agency is Maxon, Inc. The series is produced by John B. Cleary with Robert Hultgren as director, Shirley Lavine as associate producer and Nancy Fobes as editorial supervisor. The series is a Moses, Reid, Cleary Production and originates at NBC's studios in New York.

INTERVIEW WITH MARC CHAGALL AT U.N.

TO BE TELECAST ON 'TODAY' SHOW

An interview with the noted French artist Marc Chagall at the United Nations, in front of the stained glass windows he designed to commemorate the death of former U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold, will be presented on NBC-TV's "Today" show Friday, Sept. 18 (during the 7:30 to 8 a.m. segment of the 7-9 a.m. EDT program).

NBC News' United Nations correspondent Pauline Frederick will interview Chagall, who is 77, in the lobby of the Secretariat Building, where the panel will be unveiled by Secretary-General U Thant Sept. 17. The date is the third anniversary of the death of Hammarskjold and a group of UN staff members, who were killed in a plane crash near Ndola, Northern Rhodesia, while on a UN mission.

The 200-square-foot panel was donated by Chagall, who began work on the original sketch 18 months ago. The work, executed in Rheims, France, symbolizes world peace. Miss Frederick will interview Chagall, through interpreter Basile Yakovlev, who also headed the U.N. staff committee that originated the project to have Chagall design the Hammarskjold memorial.

Before the Chagall interview, art critic Aline Saarinen, in the "Today" studio, will present a biography of Chagall and review some of his earlier works.

Two original television plays by Robert Crean, both presented by the "Catholic Hour" on NBC-TV, will appear in a paperback anthology of the best dramatic scripts produced during the past 10 years on the national TV networks in cooperation with the National Council of Catholic Men. The Paulist Press, Glen Rock, N. J., will publish the book, "Four Contemporary Religious Plays," this month.

The Crean plays are "Once There Was a Postman," first telecast Oct. 21, 1962, and repeated Oct. 6, 1963, and "Without the Angels," telecast Oct. 16, 1960, under the title "The Isle Is Full of Noises." Robert J. Allen, an NCCM television producer, has edited the plays for stage production. Photographs of the TV productions will illustrate the book.

Crean, known primarily for his work in TV, has contributed to virtually all the major network dramatic programs during the past decade. His first stage play, "A Time to Laugh," was produced in London in 1962. Last season he was represented on the English stage by a new musical.

A spokesman for the NCCM said the main purposes of the new volume are "to extend the creative artistry of religious television theatre to a wider audience and to augment the short supply of contemporary religious drama in published forms." The "Catholic Hour" is an NBC Public Affairs presentation.

WITH ALMOST \$8,000,000 IN SALES FOR 4TH QUARTER OF 1964

The "Today Show" and "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson" reached new heights in billing for the fourth quarter of 1964 with sales totaling almost \$8,000,000, it was announced today by Mike Weinblatt, Director of Participating Sales, NBC-TV.

Mr. Weinblatt added that the billing was the single highest figure ever achieved in one quarter on the two programs since they began on the air -- and it represents a virtual sold out position.

The billing also represents a typical selling period for the programs, since it is made up of many advertisers -- 45 different advertisers contributed to this total -- with a full range of products from Cracker Jack to beer, from games to insurance and from coffee to dog food.

Buys range from a single participation to great volume purchases such as \$830,000 from the Sunbeam Corporation. Other heavy purchasers include Liggett & Myers Tobacco Co. Inc. \$405,000, on "Tonight"; R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. \$353,000, on "Today"; General Electric Co. \$443,000; General Time Corp. (Westclox) \$285,000, and Allen Products Co. Inc. (for Alpo Dog Food) \$265,000, with the latter three buying into both "Today" and "Tonight" schedules.

Most of the 45 clients contributing to the record fourth quarter sales figure have supported the programs during all or most of the year, Mr. Weinblatt said.

ITS 1964 TELECAST COVERAGE OF NCAA FOOTBALL GAMES

Sept. 12 Colorcast to Originate at Pitt Stadium

Coach Johnny Michelosen's University of Pittsburgh Panthers and Coach Bill Barnes' UCLA Bruins will answer a lot of questions when they meet Saturday, Sept. 12, at Pitt Stadium, in the first contest on NBC-TV's 1964 NCAA College Football telecast schedule. The game will be televised in color starting at 12:45 p.m. NYT -- 15 minutes before kickoff.

Commentators will be Lindsey Nelson and Terry Brennan.

Last year's Pitt Panthers won nine games while losing only to Navy, the number two team in the country. Returning quarterback Fred Mazurek set a Pitt record for total offense as the Panthers surprised their opponents with a wide-open brand of football. Also surprising was the fact that Pitt did not go to a post-season bowl game.

Much of the conjecture about whether the Panthers will go to a bowl this year will be answered by the game against UCLA, whose performance will be of great interest to the members of the AAWU, the Bruins' own conference. Last year, the Bruins had a prime aerial attack and quarterbacks Zeno and Sindell, the major contributors to it, are back. If the running game is stronger UCLA will be a strong contender for the Rose Bowl.

8 NBC NEWS SPECIAL FULL-HOUR TELECASTS WILL COVER CAMPAIGNS IN  
PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION AND KEY RACES FOR SENATORIAL,  
CONGRESSIONAL, GUBERNATORIAL POSTS

Eight NBC News special programs covering the campaigns in the Presidential election and key Senatorial, Congressional and Gubernatorial races will be presented on NBC-TV beginning Saturday, Sept. 12.

NBC News correspondent Frank McGee will be anchor man of these full-hour programs in the "Campaign and the Candidates" series, produced by Chet Hagan. A ninth program in the series, on Nov. 4, will summarize and interpret the election results.

The opening of the 1964 campaigns will be reported in the first of these specials Saturday, Sept. 12 (7:30-8:30 p.m. EDT). Hagan said the program will indicate what kind of campaigns may be expected from the Republican and Democratic Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates, and will present a region-by-region analysis of the hopes and fears of these major parties in important contests.

Highlights will include an exclusive interview with Senator Goldwater by NBC News correspondent Robert MacNeil, interviews by MacNeil with Mrs. Goldwater and other members of the family, and an interview by NBC News correspondent Nancy Dickerson with President Johnson's daughters, Luci Baines and Lynda Bird. As part of a regional roundup, McGee will discuss the political situation in the South. The segment will include coverage of the Democratic state convention in

Mississippi which reconvenes today (Sept. 9), and an interview with Governor Carl Sanders of Georgia by NBC News correspondent Neil Boggs. Other regional reports will be given by NBC News correspondents Merrill Mueller -- East; Floyd Kalber -- Midwest, and Elmer Peterson -- West.

The program will include a segment explaining Section 315 of the Federal Communications Act -- the so-called equal-time law -- and comparing it with a British law under which television time is allocated to candidates according to vote totals in the previous election.

The revolution within the national committees of both major parties will be the principal subject of the second special Thursday, Sept. 17 (7:30-8:30 p.m. EDT). The program will show how the Republican National Committee and its staff have been completely revamped by the Goldwater forces, and what changes President Johnson has made in the Democratic National Committee. The telecast will include interviews with Dean Burch and John M. Bailey, chairmen of the Republican and Democratic National Committees, respectively.

Reports updating the progress of the Presidential and Vice Presidential campaigns will be given by NBC News correspondents Tom Pettit, Robert MacNeil, Ray Scherer and Richard Hunt, who are assigned to cover the four major candidates.

Key races for Senate and House seats, with emphasis on those races which have a direct connection with the Presidential contest, will be covered in the third special on Tuesday, Sept. 22 (10-11 p.m. EDT). The coverage will be concerned primarily with candidates who are running apart from their party's national ticket or who are riding on the coattails of a Presidential candidate, Hagan said.

The fourth special Tuesday, Sept. 29 (10-11 p.m. EDT), will present a region-by-region evaluation of the campaign, featuring

interviews with key politicians around the country. It will show the men around both Presidential candidates and describe how they are influencing the respective campaigns. The program also will include a segment on the financing of the Republican and Democratic campaigns.

The first part of the fifth special program Sunday, Oct. 4, (6:30-7:30 p.m. EDT) will deal with key gubernatorial contests. The second part will show the role that the families of the Presidential and Vice Presidential candidates are playing in the campaign activity.

A thorough analysis of one state and the Presidential campaign within it will be the content of the sixth special, Tuesday, Oct. 13 (10-11 p.m. EDT). Hagan has chosen California for this study. The program will show how campaign workers have been recruited and organized by both parties, how funds have been raised, what the people of California think of the candidates and how the state is likely to vote in November.

The strengths and weaknesses of the Presidential candidates in each state will be assessed in a state-by-state roundup on the seventh special Tuesday, Oct. 27 (10-11 p.m. EST). The program will include evaluations by the national party chairmen and political leaders in key states, discussions of the major campaign issues and reports on what polls of voters show.

A last-minute look at the campaign, summarizing the important races, will be presented in the eighth and final pre-election special Sunday, Nov. 1 (6:30-7:30 p.m. EST). A segment of the program will show NBC News' extensive plans for covering the election on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

The post-election program will be presented Wednesday, Nov. 4 (11:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. EST).

Charles Boyer Will Narrate Full-Hour NBC News Color Special

Produced by Exclusive Arrangement with French Government

In a sharp break with precedent, the matchless beauty and historical grandeur of the Louvre will be seen on television in this country for the first time when NBC-TV presents "The Louvre," a full-hour color special, Tuesday, Nov. 17 (10-11 p.m. EST). Charles Boyer will be the narrator.

NBC producer Lucy Jarvis, who was associate producer of NBC News' widely acclaimed TV portrayal of "The Kremlin" last season, will produce "The Louvre" for NBC News by special and exclusive arrangement with the Ministry of Culture and the Department of French National Museums. John J. Sughrue Jr. will be co-producer and director.

Gaining permission to bring TV cameras into this greatest of all art treasuries, originally constructed as a fortress by King Philippe-Auguste about 1200, represents another historic television breakthrough for Mrs. Jarvis. Five months of negotiations with French officials were necessary before all the roadblocks could be cleared.

A well-known art editor has said: "The Louvre is a world. To call it an art museum would be no more appropriate than calling Everest a mountain, or a skyscraper a house. Stretching along the River Seine for 2,200 feet, the three-story edifice is longer than two Eiffel Towers laid on end. It encompasses an area of about 500 acres, 45 city blocks, in the heart of Paris." The colossal showcase, containing over 300,000 art masterpieces, ranks as one of Europe's half-dozen prime sights.

"The full-hour special," says Mrs. Jarvis, "will illustrate how the growth of the Louvre collection records, in paintings and sculptures of the masters, the cultural progress of mankind through the ages. By tracing the story of the men and women of royalty who helped enrich this collection, beginning with Francis I in 1546, we are reminded of the great achievements and advances, as well as the defeats and frustrations of humanity through four centuries."

More than being simply a repository for the world's finest art, the Louvre itself stands as an architectural phenomenon. New and inventive filming techniques have been evolved by NBC News to capture not only its aesthetic values but its enormous dimensions, which have been expanded and improved functionally by kings and emperors over a period of three centuries.

For the production of "The Louvre" Mrs. Jarvis has assembled a distinguished staff of television specialists, each an authority in the creative arts. The writer will be Sidney Carroll, whose script, "The Stranger Left No Card" won first prize at a recent Cannes Film Festival. John J. Sughrue Jr., director and co-producer, is a graduate of the Columbia School of Painting and Sculpture. Tom Priestley, director of photography, has been responsible for the direction and camera work for some of NBC-TV's greatest documentaries.

Germain Bazin, Chief Curator of the Louvre, as well as the art editor and Louvre authority, Milton S. Fox, of the Harry N. Abrams Publishing Co., publishers of numerous books on art, will act as consultants for art and history. A blind-date mixup, a missing report, and a young doctor's loss of confidence form the basis for the premiere stories on NBC-TV's "90 Bristol Court," a 90-minute series comprised of three related comedies, Monday, Oct. 5 (7:30-9 p.m. EDT).

The comedies -- "Karen," "Harris Against the World," and "Tom, Dick and Mary" -- mark a programming innovation in which the stories are woven around three neighboring families in an apartment court and are interlinked by a common theme. "Lost and Found" is the over-all title of the premiere stories, in which each family loses, and finds, something important to it.

"Karen" opens the program and stars a 15-year-old newcomer, Debbie Watson, in the title role. Richard Denning and Mary LaRoche star as her parents, Steve and Barbara Scott and Gina Gillespie co-stars as little sister Mimi. In the premiere "Karen" story Karen loses her blind date with an Italian boy when she gathers up at the airport the wrong Italian -- a mature sculptor who can't speak English. The sculptor Arturo Magdelinni (Lee Bergere), is puzzled but assumes that Karen is his official greeter. He thoroughly misunderstands Karen's efforts to break her "date." The cast also includes Bobo Lewis as Florence, Teddy Quinn as Peter, Anthony Hall as Angelo Falconi, Vito Scotti as Tony Morelli, Trudi Ames as Candy, Bill Quinn as Mr. Adams, Jim Douglas as Mr. Bromley, and Jeff Parker as the airport clerk.

Emmy winner Jack Klugman stars in the title role and Patricia Barry stars as his pretty wife, Kate, in the second sequence, "Harris Against the World." (Editor's Note: "Harris" has been moved to the second part of the program and "Tom, Dick and Mary" to the third part rather than vice versa as previously announced.) Harris gets a new secretary, Phyllis (Hope Holiday), in the initial "Harris" story only to have her botch up an important report and then lose it altogether. Harris tries to fire the girl several times but his courage always deserts him at the crucial moment. The Harris children, David and Deedee, are played by David Macklin and Claire Wilcox. The cast also includes George Ives as Ben Sherman, Madge Blake as Mrs. Donlon, Gene Blakely as Pete, Alan Reed as Mr. Farnum, and Lucile Curtis as a woman bystander.

Edward McKinley), cooks up a scheme to provide a bogus patient, Myron Sears (Woodrow Parfrey), who claims that only the good Dr. Dick Moran can "cure" him. Dick, and a pretty nurse, Wilma Cartwright (Linda Kennon) cure Sears in a way hardly to the liking of the chief of interns, Dr. Krevoy (John Hoyt).

In all three stories the court handyman, Cliff Murdock, played by Guy Raymond, provides the connecting link for each part. Joe Connelly is executive producer of the three comedies.

NBC's "Project 20" color television production of "The Red, White and Blue" has won the commendation of the American Legion, Department of New York, for its attempt "to instill pride in our nation."

The program, telling the story of American patriotism, was presented on the NBC-TV Network June 12. Donald B. Hyatt was the producer and director.

A resolution adopted by the American Legion, Department of New York, at its recent convention in Syracuse, N. Y., commends the network for "its presentation of the program, its awareness of the urgent need for such material."

A copy of the resolution will be transmitted by the Department of New York to the National Organization for consideration at the national convention to be held in Dallas, Tex., Sept. 18-24.

RESOLVED, that The American Legion, Department of New York, in 46th Annual Convention assembled in Syracuse, New York, July 30th, 31st and August 1st, 1964, send a letter of commendation to the producer of "The Red, White and Blue," Mr. Donald Hyatt, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that a letter also be sent to NBC-TV commending its presentation of the program, its awareness of the urgent need for such material and urging it in its programming to actively foster and promote patriotism, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be transmitted by the Department of New York to the National Organization for consideration at the National Convention to be held in Dallas, Texas, September 18th through 24th, 1964.

Walter Brennan was the off-and-on-camera storyteller for "The Red, White and Blue." Philip Reisman Jr. wrote the script. Robert Russell Bennett composed and conducted the orchestral score.

The "Project 20" unit has started work on a companion piece, "Immigrants All," which has grown out of the research on "The Red, White and Blue."

'MOMENT OF TRUTH," NEW MONDAY-THROUGH-FRIDAY DAYTIME  
DRAMATIC SERIES WILL START JAN. 4 ON NBC-TV

"Moment of Truth," a new daytime dramatic series, will be presented on the NBC-TV Network Monday through Friday from 2 to 2:30 p.m. EST, beginning Monday, Jan. 4, 1965, it was announced today by Robert F. Aaron, Director, Daytime Programs.

The series will concern events in the lives of the principal characters -- Dr. Robert Wallace, his wife Nancy and their young son and daughter. Dr. Wallace is an assistant professor of psychology at Carlisle University, and is also a practicing psychologist. The episodes will be set in the university and in Dr. Wallace's home, where he conducts his private practice.

The producer and packager of "Moment of Truth" is Robert Maxwell, who created "National Velvet" for NBC-TV and "Lassie" for another network. Maxwell said that the new series will be videotaped, but that film techniques will be used in the production. He plans to use more on-location and exterior shots than in any other daytime dramatic series. "Moment of Truth" will be taped in Toronto, and will also be seen in Canada on CBC-TV. The cast will be announced soon.

"Moment of Truth" will replace "Loretta Young Theatre" in the Monday-through-Friday 2 p.m. time-spot.

## 'JOHN F. KENNEDY REMEMBERED'

Memorial on First Anniversary of Assassination to be Telecast  
In Full-Hour NBC News Special Program

A majestic memorial to President Kennedy on the first anniversary of his assassination will be presented as a full-hour NBC News television special, "John F. Kennedy Remembered," Sunday, Nov. 22 (6:30-7:30 p.m. EST).

Six NBC News correspondents will figure prominently in the program: Frank McGee, as narrator; David Brinkley, Sander Vanocur, Ray Scherer, Edwin Newman and Chet Huntley.

Lou Hazam will produce and write "John F. Kennedy Remembered." Tom Priestley will be the director.

As outlined by Hazam, the program will open at the President's grave in Arlington National Cemetery and move backward in two ways: backward along the route the cortege followed from the Capitol, and backward in time to the Inauguration.

"Though the cameras will follow the cortege route to the constant sound of muffled drums, we shall never see the cortege," Hazam said. "Rather, we shall pause at important points along the way where NBC News correspondents will recall, through their own words and through the use of appropriate Kennedy films, the high points of his brief White House years."

The major portion of the historic sound-film will reflect President Kennedy's keen sense of history, which he regarded not so much

as a guide to the present as a source for confidence in the future. At Lincoln Memorial, viewers will see and hear him as he talked about Abraham Lincoln; at the Capitol, they will see and hear again the Inaugural address.

David Brinkley, in Lafayette Park, will recall the Inaugural parade. Sander Vanocur, on the White House lawn, will speak about John F. Kennedy's views of the Presidency. Ray Scherer, in the Rose Garden of the White House, will recollect President Kennedy's informal meetings with various groups there. Edwin Newman, at 15th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, will recall how President Kennedy led visiting notables down the ceremonial street. Chet Huntley, at the Capitol, will recall the Inaugural address.

"What is remembered is never lost," Hazam said. "We shall try to recollect the 'living' John F. Kennedy in a constructive program marking the anniversary of his death. Now he belongs to history, and his deeds to the nation's heritage."

MUSICAL VARIETY COLORCASTS, TO START OCT. 5

Andy Williams, one of America's favorite singers and star of his own musical variety show on NBC-TV the past two seasons, will return to the network on a weekly basis during the 1964-65 season when "The Andy Williams Show" premieres in color on Monday, Oct. 5 (9-10 p.m. NYT).

Although the show was broadcast on a limited basis (12 performances last year) it received an Emmy nomination for "outstanding program achievement in the field of variety," an honor it captured during the 1962-63 schedule when it was on a weekly basis.

In addition to the 26 scheduled broadcasts of "The Andy Williams Show," six specials, starring comedian Jonathan Winters, will occupy Andy's Monday night spot during the year at approximately five-week intervals. Although the comedy specials will be broadcast in the same time period, they are in no way connected with "The Andy Williams Show." However, Winters has been signed to appear as Andy's guest on six occasions.

Williams will continue the popular informal portion of the show during which he sings requests. The Good Time Singers will also return on a weekly basis. Other name guest stars will be announced during the year as they are signed.

Andy, who in a recent poll taken by Radio-Television Daily was named television's "Man of the Year," "Vocalist of the Year (Male)" and whose program was selected as "Musical Show of the Year," began his singing career as a boy soprano in Wall Lake, Iowa -- a town he has made famous on his show, and has zoomed to stardom in recent years through his recordings and by appearing on many television specials. ## JOHN CHANCELLOR IS ASSIGNED TO NBC NEWS' STAFF OF WASHINGTON CORRESPONDENTS

John Chancellor, one of the NBC News team of television floor reporters acclaimed by critics for its outstanding performance at the Republican and Democratic conventions, has been assigned to NBC News' staff of Washington correspondents, it was announced today by William R. McAndrew, Executive Vice President in charge of NBC News.

In addition to his duties in covering the capital, Chancellor will prepare for his Election Night assignment of reporting the vote projections and analysis provided by NBC's "Electronic Vote Analysis" system.

As one of the "floor horsemen" at the Democratic convention, Chancellor maintained exclusive network television and radio coverage of the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party demonstration outside Convention Hall for more than an hour during one session. His many other news beats at that convention included the only interview with Eugene (Bull) Connor of Alabama as Connor, ordered to leave by a sergeant-at-arms, forced his way through the crowd and out of the hall.

At the Republican convention, Chancellor had the unique experience of broadcasting his own "arrest" as he was escorted off the convention floor. His refusal to leave until police led him away, and his humorous reporting of the incident, brought many congratulatory telegrams and letters from all parts of the country.

Since 1950 he has covered every Presidential campaign and all but one important off-year election for NBC News. He traveled with Adlai E. Stevenson during the 1956 campaign, and was a television floor reporter at both conventions that year. In 1960 he interviewed the candidates on "The Great Debates" and handled the Midwest Desk on Election Night. After this latter assignment, Time magazine wrote that he "was one of the few commentators who kept saying all night long that the results would be close."

Chancellor joined NBC News in 1950 as the network's Midwestern correspondent. After working in NBC bureaus in Vienna and London, he was named chief of NBC News' Moscow Bureau in mid-1960 and covered the trial of Francis Gary Powers and other important stories. He headed the NBC News bureau covering the Common Market in Brussels last year. His reporting has won him a national Sigma Delta Chi Award and a Robert E. Sherwood Award.

For one year beginning July, 1961, Chancellor was host of NBC-TV's "Today" program.

Chancellor was born in Chicago in 1927. He attended local schools and the University of Illinois. After Army service, he joined the Chicago Sun-Times in 1948 and for two years had various assignments as reporter, rewrite man and feature writer before starting his career in broadcasting.

### NBC ENTERPRISES RENEWS MADE-IN-JAPAN 'ASTRO BOY,' HALF-HOUR CARTOON SERIES, FOR ANOTHER YEAR

"Astro Boy," the half-hour cartoon series which has had spectacular success since it was introduced in the United States by NBC in 1963, has been signed for another year, it was announced today by George Graham, Vice President in Charge of NBC Enterprises, a division of the National Broadcasting Company.

Last year's series plus the new 52 half hours gives prospective buyers 104 half-hours which can be stripped five times a week or run once a week, whichever they choose. "Astro Boy" is the only Japanese half-hour to be successfully distributed world-wide by a TV network or packager. The show was created and produced by NBC Films in co-operation with Japan's Mushi Production Company.

Since "Astro Boy" is the property of NBC Enterprises, it falls into two categories, NBC International and NBC Domestic Enterprises. On the International side of the picture, "Astro Boy" has been successfully dubbed into Spanish and Portuguese and distributed in Latin America. It has also been sold in the United Kingdom, Nigeria, Syria, and Australia. It is planned to dub it into two other languages, Italian and German.

"Astro Boy" has had unequalled success in Domestic film sales and audience popularity. Through NBC Films it reaches a complete cross-section of the country. The two latest additions to the show's sales roster are WEWS - Cleveland, Ohio and WCAX - Burlington, Vt. Three stations, WNEW, New York; WTTG, Washington, D.C.; and KHJ, Los Angeles, have renewed "Astro Boy."

NBC TELEVISION RELIGIOUS PROGRAM TO START  
14TH YEAR OF CONTINUOUS WEEKLY PRODUCTION

The NBC Television Religious Program will start its 14th year of continuous weekly production Sunday, Oct. 4 (1:30-2 p.m. NYT), with "Requiem for Henry Perrin," a drama of the priest-worker movement in France after the Second World War.

Outstanding on the agenda for 1964-65 will be a full-hour color film on archaeology and the Bible, made on location in the Middle East and surveying the remains of great civilizations of antiquity -- Persian, Babylonian, Assyrian, Sumerian, Egyptian, Israelite, and Greek among them.

Other prominent features will be a dramatic series dealing with the "crisis in the Christian conscience," a documentary-style cycle concerning family responsibility, a lecture series devoted to "Prophetic Voices of the Old Testament," and a memorial tribute to President Kennedy on the first anniversary of his assassination.

Each presentation in the 52-week schedule will be produced in cooperation with one of the nation's major faith groups. During 1964-65 the program will be on view 24 times as "Frontiers of Faith" (in cooperation with the National Council of Churches), 16 times as "The Catholic Hour" (with the National Council of Catholic Men), eight times as "The Eternal Light" (with the Jewish Theological Seminary of America), twice as "The Southern Baptist Hour" (with the Southern Baptist Convention), once as "I Believe" (with the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod), and once as "Faith and the Bible" (with the American Council of Christian Churches.) CHRONOLOGY FOR 1964-65

In October, "The Catholic Hour" will offer a series of four dramas under the general title of "Crisis in the Christian Conscience," emphasizing the dilemma of the Catholic, priest or layman, in relationship to contemporary moral issues. "Requiem for Henri Perrin," the first (Oct. 4), is by the Rev. Donald Cunningham and tells the story of Father Perrin, a priest-worker who combined his ministry with factory life.

Robert Crean, well-known TV writer who has contributed many prize-winning scripts to "The Catholic Hour" in recent seasons, is the author of the three other dramas in this cycle: "Nightwatch," concerning a fictional priest in America today who questions his impact on parish and society, Oct. 11; "The Witness," the true story of a German peasant who died a martyr because he refused to fight in "unjust" World War II, Oct. 18; and "The Prophet," depicting an American who finds he must take risks in order to influence his community and society, Oct. 25.

In November and December, "The Eternal Light" will present a series of five dramas and three conversations. The first, "Inscription for a Blank Page," a drama by Millard Lampell based on the life of the theologian and historian Solomon Schechter, will be telecast Nov. 1; a conversation with the singer Robert Merrill, Nov. 8; a conversation with Associate Justice Arthur Goldberg of the United States Supreme Court, Nov. 15; "Some Small Part of Each of Us," a dramatic tribute by Virginia Mazer marking the first anniversary of President Kennedy's assassination, Nov. 22; and a conversation between Mark Van Doren and Maurice Samuel on "The Psychology of the Bible," Nov. 29.

Also, "Immortal Journey," a drama by Alvin Boretz in observance of Human Rights Day, Dec. 6; an as yet untitled drama by Millard Lampell dealing with a labor leader, Dec. 13; "The Alibi," a drama by Irve Tunick based on the Jewish Theological Seminary's 1963 message for the High Holy Days, Dec. 20. A "Southern Baptist Hour" drama will follow Dec. 27.

In January, "The Catholic Hour" will offer a series of four "visual lectures" on family responsibility (Jan. 3, 10, 17 and 24).

In February, March and April, "Frontiers of Faith" will present a series of 13 illustrated lectures on "Prophetic Voices of the Old Testament" by Dr. Hagen Staack, who heads the department of religion at Muhlenberg College in Allentown, Pa. (Feb. 7 through April 25). Dr. Staack, a geologist as well as a theologian, gave a 13-week series of lectures in 1963 which proved to be so successful that he was recalled for another 13-week series in 1964.

In May, "The Catholic Hour" will be back with a series of four documentary-style telecasts on mental health in the United States (May 2, 9, 16 and 23).

A full-hour color telecast dealing with archaeology and the Bible will be a "Southern Baptist Hour" presentation May 30 (exact hour to be announced). The program, surveying the remains of great civilizations of antiquity, was filmed on location in Iran, Iraq, Egypt, Jordan and Israel. It will show, through the surviving physical monuments and writings, how man moved forward to a belief in one God and to the development of an ethical life within the Judaic-Christian tradition.

In June and July, "Frontiers of Faith" will offer an eight-week series of illustrated lectures on "The Parables" by Dr. Browne Barr, of the Pacific School of Religion, Berkeley, Calif. (June 6 through July 25).

In August, "The Catholic Hour" will have a series of four conversations (Aug. 1, 8, 15 and 22), to be followed by a "Faith and the Bible" devotional service Aug. 29.

In September, "Frontiers of Faith" will offer a four-week lecture series by Dr. Leonidas C. Contos, dean of St. Sophia Greek Orthodox Cathedral, Los Angeles (Sept. 5, 12, 19 and 26). "I Believe" will be the Oct. 3 presentation.

In addition to the regular weekly presentation of the NBC Television Religious Program, eight specials will be produced by the unit for religious holidays in 1964-65. These will include telecasts on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, Palm Sunday, Easter Sunday, as well as for the Jewish observances of Hanukkah, Passover, Rosh Hashonah and Yom Kippur.

Doris Ann, manager of NBC religious programs, is executive producer of all the NBC Television Religious Program offerings. Martin Hoade is producer-director of all but "Frontiers of Faith."

"First," Mr. Aaron said, "we know that these competitions are tremendously effective. Last season, 'Concentration' scheduled its first 'Challenge of Champions' and achieved its highest share of the season. It seems that the game show viewers develop very strong rooting interests over the year and look forward to seeing how their favorites will do against other top players in the game.

"Second, during the Summer months, normal viewing habits are dislocated because of the high incidence of children's TV viewing. In the

NBC News will provide American audiences with comprehensive coverage of the British elections, including the election night returns to be telecast live via Relay Satellite on Thursday, Oct. 15.

David Brinkley will go to Great Britain to participate in coverage of pre-election developments; Chet Huntley will be there later to cover the election itself. Brinkley will return to the United States before Huntley's departure for Great Britain. The one based in Britain will provide the other, based in this country, with timely election information for the Monday-through-Friday "Huntley-Brinkley Report" on NBC-TV.

NBC News will establish its own area of operations in the BBC election headquarters in London, where it will have full access to all of BBC's coverage.

In addition to Huntley and Brinkley, the NBC News team will include Joseph C. Harsch, NBC News senior European correspondent; Kenneth Bernstein, London correspondent, and other members of the news staff. A special production team will leave New York next week to cover the pre-election events and the election itself.

Other British election features will be a half-hour special on Sunday, Oct. 11 (NBC-TV, 5-5:30 p.m. EST), and a telecast via Relay Satellite on the "Today" show, Friday, Oct. 16, the day after the election.

A science segment is next, featuring Dr. Hibbs and the Ritts Puppets, exploring the mysteries of bird and animal migration. Here Calvin the Crow learns that going South for the Winter is more difficult than he had imagined. Mr Pennywhistle, a new Ritts puppet, has some wise words on safety for all children.

"Exploring's" second half-hour combines historic film footage, animated treatment of stills and old prints, song and story, to bring to children the history of one of the greatest human migrations -- to the New World.

From the early migrations of the American Indians, the early settlements of Spanish, French and English colonists to the great wave of European immigrants of the 19th and 20th Centuries, the program unfolds the story of the early development of America's people.

Young viewers will see wide-eyed children on Ellis Island, people streaming off ferryboats, moving Westward, working in the new land and finding, at the end of their migrations, a new country and a new home.

Hailing "The Catholic Hour" as a "uniquely American institution," Cardinal Ritter said, "It represents a remarkable collaboration between one of the great commercial broadcasting networks and the Catholic Church in the United States. As part of its effort to serve the American people, the National Broadcasting Company deserves great credit for having pioneered and sustained religious broadcasting in this country."

Cardinal Ritter took special note of the program's ecumenical appeal. "Vitaly concerned with the betterment of ecumenical relations, 'The Catholic Hour' has offered a platform to distinguished leaders of the Protestant, Jewish and Orthodox communities," he said. "The ecumenical appeal of the program has been eloquently attested to by the thousands of letters received each year from members of other communities."

Through the years, the program has presented the "finest minds in the Church, both lay and clerical," Cardinal Ritter said. "Writers and scholars, artists and musicians, theologians and liturgists, philosophers, scientists and educators all have shared their wisdom and experience with the 'Catholic Hour's' listening audience. Their subjects have encompassed the whole spectrum of human aspiration and endeavor."

The October broadcasts of "The Catholic Hour" (Sundays, Oct. 4, 11, 18 and 25) will be related directly to the Third Session of the Second Vatican Council. The broadcasts will be tape-recorded in Rome, and will include interviews with cardinals and other prelates, as well as with Protestant and Orthodox observers.

In keeping with the changing patterns of network radio, "The Catholic Hour" during the past several years has revised its format to include dramatic, documentary and music programs. The range of subjects has included alcoholism, teen-age moral values, Zen Buddhism, ecumenical dialogues and the Church's mission in such countries as India and Japan.

The program's constant theme, however, is "to relate Catholicism to everyday life and, without proselytizing, to present the Church's message as it is meaningful to the needs and problems of modern man." The program draws a great volume of audience mail, almost 40 per cent of which comes from members of other faiths.

An NBC Public Affairs presentation, "The Catholic Hour" is produced in cooperation with the National Council of Catholic Men.

TV TO START IN SAUDI ARABIA APRIL 1 ON FIRST TWO STATIONS  
NBC INTERNATIONAL IS CONSTRUCTING IN JIDDA AND RIYADH  
AS PART OF 13-STATION PROJECT FOR NATION

Television will begin in Saudi Arabia as of April 1, 1965, on the first two stations which NBC International is constructing at Jidda and Riyadh as part of the previously announced plan to provide Saudi Arabia with 13 television stations.

NBC's Frank Warren, Project Manager for Saudi Arabian TV, who just returned from there, reports that construction has begun on both stations. The building in Jidda, Saudi Arabia's port city and also the largest city in the country, is expected to be ready to receive equipment by the first of October. The building in Riyadh, the capital city of Saudi Arabia, will be ready in early November.

Warren, who joined NBC International July 1, is preparing to move to Saudi Arabia with his family for the duration of the project, estimated at eight to ten years. His first visit there in July was chiefly a survey trip to look over building sites and discuss program policy with government officials. The second, in August, was spent screening Saudi personnel for prospective employment and administering a series of aptitude tests to them. The future employees will be equipment operators and have, at the minimum, a high school education which includes some English.

Robert Myers, of NBC International, will escort two English teachers to Riyadh and Jidda next week to conduct a nine-week supplementary course in English for the Saudi personnel. This will facilitate their training by Americans.

The latter half of Warren's second trip was spent visiting Kuwait, Beirut, and Cairo to look at the television facilities in those countries for extension of the Saudi TV projects. According to Warren, Beirut is simultaneously telecasting on two channels from one facility. Both channels broadcast in the evening when Channel 7 runs one feature in Arabic while Channel 9 presents a completely different feature in English or French.

When the two Saudi stations begin telecasting in April, documentaries, educational and travel films, and sports will fill the Saudi Arabian viewers' first schedules.

NBC AND OLYMPIC EMBLEMS ARE JOINED IN A SINGLE INSIGNIA  
FOR NBC USE IN CONNECTION WITH SUMMER OLYMPICS COVERAGE

Two well-known symbols -- the interlocking initials of NBC and the interlaced circles representing the Olympic Games -- have been incorporated into an identifying emblem being used by NBC in connection with its two-week coverage of the 1964 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, starting Saturday, Oct. 10.

One of the uses, as seen at the top of this page, is for the NBC Press Department's Olympic release paper.

The shield-shaped insignia will be seen on film in the opening seconds of every Olympic telecast. Other emblem uses are as lapel pins and pocket patches being worn by NBC's Tokyo-bound personnel, for identification cards, baggage stickers, stationery and identification markers on cars and equipment being used by NBC people in Tokyo.

The interlaced circles forming the Olympic symbol also are used in the Olympic Flag, and appeared at Olympic competition for the first time at Antwerp in 1920. The rings originally represented the five major continents, namely Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia and America (both North and South). The modern concept is that the circles are linked together to denote the sporting friendship of the peoples of the earth, whatever their creed or color.

NBC's Olympic emblem was designed by John J. Graham, Creative Director in the NBC Advertising Department.

The program will be presented exactly 20 years after the start of the battle on the 85-mile Ardennes Front in Belgium. The German attack was launched before dawn Dec. 16, 1944. Because of the time difference, it was then late evening on Dec. 15 in the United States.

The story of this epic battle, which was won at a cost of 77,000 American casualties, will be told through first-person narratives of American soldiers, from generals to raw recruits, who fought in this bloody combat, and through the first-person accounts of others, including the general who led the German spearhead. It will be re-created through historic film of the fighting, through original film shot in the towns and on the battlefields as they are today, virtually unchanged over the years, and through the dramatic use of still photographs by American and German cameramen. Specially prepared maps and animation will make clear the complexity of the battle as it continually evolved.

"The Battle of the Bulge" is being produced, written and directed by Frank DeFelitta, who produced for NBC News such distinguished programs as "Emergency Ward" and "An Experiment in Excellence," as well as "The Stately Ghosts of England," which will be telecast later this season. Joseph A. Mehan is associate producer.

The soldiers narrating the critical events in the battle or describing the personal heroism they witnessed will include Gen. Omar N. Bradley, whom General Eisenhower chose to direct the southern half of the Allied defense in the battle; Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe, commander of the U. S. forces at Bastogne, who issued the famous "Nuts" answer to the German surrender ultimatum; Baron Hasso Von Manteufel, general in command of the Fifth Panzer Army; Brig. Gen. Bruce Clarke, whose Seventh Armored Division held off the northern pincer of Manteufel's crushing offensive at the vital road junction of St. Vith for three important days; Gen. Ernie Harmon, famed commander of the Second Armored Division, who commanded the American forces in the largest tank battle of the Western war; Sgt. Jim Revell, who remembers two days of enormous casualties on the Elsenborn Ridge; and Sgt. Kenneth Ahrens, who feigned death and escaped when 86 captured American soldiers were massacred at Malmedy.

Generals McAuliffe, Clarke and Harmon and Sergeants Revell and Ahrens will be flown by NBC to the scenes of their experiences in the battle, where they will describe the events of those terrible days. Baron Manteufel will be filmed at his command post across the Our River from the American lines.

Many other American soldiers, including two Congressional Medal of Honor winners -- Pfc. Frank Curry and Pfc. Geno Merli --

will take part in the program. NBC News' cameras have filmed 20th anniversary reunions of battle veterans from the 84th Infantry Division, 101st Airborne Division, 28th Infantry Division, Second Armored Division and Seventh Armored Division, and the reminiscences of these soldiers add colorful and significant details to the story.

Several Belgian civilians also will recount their involvement in the battle, from their personal points of view.

Tapes of actual NBC Radio broadcasts during the battle by NBC News correspondents Morgan Beatty, Merrill Mueller, Richard Harkness and others will be used in describing the action and conveying America's hopes and fears as it progressed.

ABOUT THE NBC "TEACHER'S GUIDE"

(NOTE TO EDITORS: The current issue of NBC Teacher's Guide is enclosed in this mailing.) - - -

"The children were able to visualize people and places and things met vicariously on the lighted screen. Vocabularies grew by leaps and bounds and the child grew in awareness and knowledge right before my eyes," wrote Mrs. Frances Raivio, a teacher in the school district of Bristol Township, Pa., to NBC recently.

Mrs. Raivio's comments were directed to Mrs. Gloria Kirshner, editor of the NBC Teacher's Guide, and are typical of the enthusiastic responses of educators around the country to the combination of television and teacher's guides, which has become a year-round, full-time and meaningful project at NBC. This is the third year that the network will provide these teacher's guides.

The exceptionally fine reaction to NBC's "Exploring" and "NBC Children's Theatre" is attributed in large measure to the guides, which were prepared for use by teachers in connection with these shows, according to Edward Stanley, NBC Director of Public Affairs.

This year the NBC Teacher's Guide has been requested for every elementary teacher in the cities of San Diego, Houston, Portland (Ore.), Seattle and Atlanta. More than a quarter-million requests for the first "Exploring" guide have already been filled.

Originally, study guides were considered "flyers" or advertisements for programs. But under the guidance of Stanley, today's study guide has an "instant information" quality which, when

combined with the television program's subject matter, brings a freshness and immediacy that no textbook can supply.

The response to the NBC Teacher's Guides has been most impressive, according to Stanley. One out of every four teachers in the nation's elementary schools and every high school in the country was reached by the NBC Teacher's Guides during the past year. Further statistics give added importance to the role of the NBC guides. In their first year, they had an 86 per cent "in-use" role in the classroom, according to a survey conducted by an independent research company in six different cities and 6,000 classrooms.

Stanley and Mrs. Kirshner would like to say that they expected such a tremendous response to the study guides, but they admit frankly that they were "overwhelmed." "We never anticipated a success so complete as this," said Stanley, "we had been advised by direct mail experts to expect a 5 per cent return on our initial mailing of 70,000. Within a few weeks we had passed the 20 per cent mark and were confounding the experts and ourselves with a quarter of a million requests. There doesn't seem to be any saturation point in the learning process."

The three NBC programs which will be covered in these teacher's guides are "Exploring," "Profiles in Courage," based on the book by President John F. Kennedy (premiering Nov. 8), and "NBC Children's Theatre." They combine education and entertainment for the 5 through 11-year age group. The NBC Teacher's Guide to "Profiles in Courage" will be sent to every high school in the country.

In designing the study guides for the teacher's use, according to Stanley, "we have tried to help the program on which the

guide is based live up to its greatest social usefulness, through the study guides. There are a great many youngsters who don't have books in the home, but they do have television and, through the combination of program subject matter and study guide, the child is able to use his television set as a tool of learning.

"It is no longer unusual for children to be assigned to watch a television program as part of their homework, as television continues to become an accepted part of school work and part of a whole new approach to teaching," says Stanley, "and we are delighted that the NBC Teacher's Guides have constituted a significant and meaningful advance both in the world of education and of television. We have broken at least one trail down which both the public school system and the television network can travel together and together work toward the achievement of a great goal."

Mrs. Kirshner, who produces and edits the NBC Teacher's Guides, is herself a professional teacher who received her Master's degree at Teacher's college, Columbia University. Bibliographies are prepared with the cooperation of the American Library Association.

He was buffeted by many winds and currents and was helped on his way by human hands, until, at last, he reached the Atlantic and earned the right to be called a true Paddle-to-the-Sea."

**SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES:** Map the journey of Paddle-to-the-Sea! Why are the

Great Lakes "like bowls on a hillside?" How does Lake Superior's outline make a wolf's head? Where did ancient Indians mine copper in the middle of the lake? How many states could you fit into this great lake? Where did Paddle leave Canada and enter the United States? Which cities on either side of the U. S. and Canadian border are twins? How does Lake Michigan look like a squash with leaves attached to it? (What kind of country surrounds it?) Lake Huron like a trapper with a pack of furs? Lake Erie like a lump of coal? (Where are the coal mines and the steel mills?) Lake Ontario like a carrot? What are "rivers in the sea"?

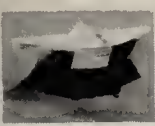

# Man Explores the Air (Oct. 24) Language Arts, Social Studies, Science

**AIM:** To trace man's conquest of the air. To discover the principles of flight, and to compare the flight of man's machines with the flight of living creatures. To identify the contributions of people all over the world, all through the ages, to the Wright brothers' victory in the 20th century.

## **SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES BEFORE VIEWING:**

Prepare a time-line that traces the efforts of living creatures to conquer the air. Insects were the first true masters of flight, and dragonflies 150 million years ago looked just like the dragonflies of 1964! Nearly half of the birds we have today also lived more than 45 million years ago—including ostrich-like birds, hawks, gulls, and owls. (Of the 8600 kinds of birds, at least half migrate in some fashion.) Man has inhabited the earth for only about a quarter of a million years, but it was only about 70 or 80 thousand years ago that the first stone age man shot his arrow into the air! The ancient Egyptians were the first to use the air to help sail their ships. It was the end of the sixteenth century, however, before great sailing vessels could sail from England and cross the ocean in three months.

The air age did not truly begin until the 16th century, when Leonardo da Vinci began his studies of the flights of birds. It was 1783 before man first flew. This was the year in which the Montgolfier brothers reached a height of 10,000 feet in a hydrogen balloon that enabled them to cover 27 miles in 2 hours. The first airplane in history was made by Sir George Cayley, an Englishman, who in 1852 or '53 successfully glided across a valley. In 1895 Otto Lilienthal, after studying the gliding and soaring of birds, made a biplane with a wing area of 200 square feet which could reach heights greater than that from which he started. The first man ever to leave level ground in a powered heavier-than-air craft was a Frenchman, Clement Ader. In 1890 he hopped 164 feet at a height of two feet from the ground. On December 17, 1903 the Wright brothers made the first true powered flight in a machine that travelled 852 feet over the ground, and for the first time in the history of the planet a living creature conquered the air without depending upon nature. The Wright brothers' achievement was a result of the searching curiosity and contributions of endless numbers of minds, beginning with the ancient Chinese kings who flew strange kites, and continuing through the Greeks, who sought the secret of steam, the Germans who studied the pressure of



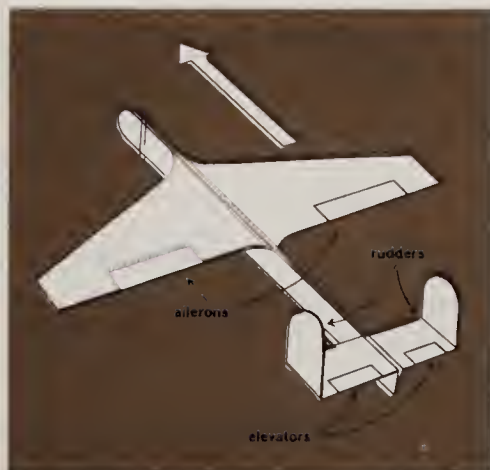
**Elevators in position for climbing.**

the atmosphere, the French who invented the internal combustion engine, Italians, Englishmen, Americans and Russians, all seeking the secret of flight. List the many contributions made by men of each nationality to man's final conquest of the air. Do you believe the Wright brothers could have succeeded if all the others had not tried before them?

**SYNOPSIS:** We watch the story of "Darius Green and His Flying Machine," discover how air produces the exciting music of the bagpipes, explore the properties of the ocean of air in which man lives, with the Ritts puppets, and see films of some of man's earliest efforts to fly.

## **SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES AFTER VIEWING:**

To discover how a plane that is heavier than air can be supported by the air, hold the end of a strip of paper with your thumb and forefinger. Blow on the under surface of the paper. In which direction does it move? Blow across the top of the paper. Does it still move up? Moving air exerts less force on a surface than air that is not moving. The pressure on top of the paper has been decreased because the air was moving. A partial vacuum has been created, but the pressure underneath the paper has remained the same. The paper moved to the area of least pressure. Why are airplane wings designed with a curved surface to produce this same effect?

Construct an oaktag airplane. As you fly your plane, observe how the movement of the wing through the air develops a force which can lift the airplane and hold it up. The lift of the plane is due to the increased pressure of air on the lower surface of the wing, and the decreased pressure of air on the top of the wing. The positions of the elevator, rudder and ailerons determine the direction of the plane. When the elevators are turned up the plane goes up. Why? When air strikes rudders that have been turned to the left the tail of the plane moves to the right. What direction does the plane take? When the left aileron is up and the right aileron is down the left wing of the plane is lowered and the right wing raised. What happens to the direction of the plane? What can you do to improve the flight of your plane?

What are America, England, France and Russia now doing to improve the flight of their present planes to reach speeds of 2,000 to 4,000 miles per hour? How many miles per hour can sound travel through the air? How much faster than sound will these supersonic planes be?

We have not always been able to answer all of your letters, but we do try, and, from the teacher who wrote to tell us about the 18 insect observatories that arrived in class one morning, to the mother of 12 who wrote "those Guides were helping my children a lot," we are delighted to hear from each of you, and hope that you will be delighted to find so many of your ideas and suggestions incorporated into this year's programs and Teacher's Guides. All good wishes for a successful teaching year!

### GILLETTE AND CHRYSLER WILL CO-SPONSOR NBC-TV AND RADIO COVERAGE OF WORLD SERIES

The nation's number one sports attraction -- the World Series -- will be covered by the NBC Television Network for the 18th straight year when baseball's Fall classic begins Wednesday, Oct. 7. The NBC Radio Network also will carry the entire Series.

All games will be televised in color for the sixth year in a row.

NBC's television and radio coverage will be co-sponsored by the Gillette Safety Razor Company (through Maxon Inc.) and Chrysler Corporation (through Young & Rubicam Inc.).

The 61st World Series opens in the home park of the National League pennant-winner, shifts after two games to the park of the American League champion, and returns to the N.L. park if games six and seven are required to decide the best-four-of-seven competition.

If the Philadelphia Phillies and New York Yankees, the current leaders, maintain their first-place positions, the Series schedule would be as follows:

Games 1 and 2 -- at Connie Mack Stadium, Philadelphia, on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 7 and 8.

Games 3, 4 and (if necessary) 5 -- at Yankee Stadium, New York, on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 9, 10 and 11.

Games 6 and 7 (if necessary) -- at Connie Mack Stadium on Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 12 and 13.

There would be no open dates for travel in a Philadelphia-New York Series.

All Series games will start at 1 p.m. local time, and NBC's TV and radio coverage will begin 15 minutes before game time -- at 12:45 p.m. EDT in both Philadelphia and New York. Should any of the other contenders (except for Baltimore) overtake the leaders, playing dates after games one and two and starting times in any other city would differ from those listed above.

Perry Smith will be executive producer of NBC-TV's World Series coverage, with Lou Kusserow as producer and Harry Coyle as director. The radio broadcasts will be directed by Ken MacGregor. Commentators will be announced after the pennant races are decided.

NBC has covered the World Series on television every year since 1947, and on radio every year since 1957.

LIVE SATELLITE RELAY OF OPENING OLYMPIC CEREMONIES TO MEXICO IS ONE OF THE MANY TV COVERAGE ITEMS ON NBC INTERNATIONAL'S AGENDA IN RUSHING PROGRAMS ON TOKYO GAMES TO FOREIGN LANDS

NBC International, in conjunction with NBC News, will bring the opening ceremonies of the 1964 Tokyo Summer Olympic Games live to Mexico via the medium of the Syncom III satellite, it was announced today by Joseph M. Klein, President, NBC International. The broadcast will be received from the satellite by WOAI-TV, NBC's affiliate station in San Antonio, Tex., and sent by microwave relay to all Mexico through Telesistema in Mexico City.

As previously announced, NBC International is exclusive agent for distribution of the Olympic Games TV coverage in Latin America, Africa and the Caribbean. Many countries (in terms of local time) will be viewing the Games within hours of their taking place because of the International Date Line and NBC International's fast servicing of the tapes. A typical example is the first day's games on Oct. 11: The tapes will be received in Seattle at 2:30 p.m. (Pacific Time) where they will be processed and sent on to Mexico City by jet plane to arrive on time for the 11 p.m. broadcast.

Mr. Klein, who leaves for Tokyo Oct. 6, will meet each day in that city with a committee of experts from each area NBC International is

servicing to select the sports popular there to be dubbed into the appropriate language. Every area will receive a daily package of sports indigenous to its interests, according to Mr. Klein.

Olympic sports which would interest Americans would not necessarily be of special interest to a Kenyan or a Brazilian. Soccer is an example. In many parts of the world, soccer is as popular a spectator sport as baseball is in the United States. "In Brazil, soccer draws 100,000-plus audiences, as a matter of course," Mr. Klein said. Mexico is particularly interested in equestrian sports which is evidenced by their consistently excellent equestrian teams. Volleyball, the newest Olympic sport, was represented in the 1959 Pan American Games mostly by teams from South America. The Marathon, a classic 26 mile cross country run, will be of special interest to Ethiopia because it was won at the 1960 Olympics by Abebe Bakila, an Ethiopian, who not only won it but ran barefoot. Jamaica's Wendell Mottley is highly favored in the area of track and field sports which should generate more than usual interest in that country.

This will be the first time, according to Mr. Klein, the Olympic Games have been brought to Latin America, Africa and the Caribbean with such dispatch and in such quantity, and it is the first time an effort has been made to tailor the coverage to each area's individual interests. Mr. Klein relates that the only things that will be the same in each package are the opening and closing ceremonies.

### "MR. WIZARD" PROBES "LIGHT UNDERNEATH" IN SEASON'S PREMIERE

A look at some of the unexpected things that happen to light as it passed through water and an explanation of why the changes occur will be the subject for the first "Watch Mr. Wizard" telecast of the 1964-65 season Sunday, Oct. 4 on NBC-TV (12:30-1 p.m. EDT).

Don Herbert, star of the award-winning science series for children, will be assisted by 13-year-old Rita McLaughlin on the season's first program. Rita alternates with Alan Howard, also 13, on the weekly series.

In the opening program, titled "Light Underwater," Mr. Wizard (Herbert) will use such ordinary items as a soot-covered putty knife, a penny and a knitting needle in a bowl of water to demonstrate total internal reflection. He will also illustrate "fiber optics" -- the use of needle-thin plastic fibers bunched together in a flexible rod to carry light and even images around corners.

"Watch Mr. Wizard," which will observe its 14th anniversary on NBC-TV next March, earlier this year won its third Edison Foundation Award as "The Best Science Television Program for Youth." This is the 18th national honor received by the program in its long history.

"Watch Mr. Wizard" is a Public Affairs presentation of NBC News. Herbert is also the program's producer. Dr. Morris H. Shamos, chairman of the physics department of New York University's Washington Square College, is the scientific adviser.

## LEE OSWALD'S BIZARRE PLAN TO HIJACK PLANE FOR FLIGHT TO CUBA IS REVEALED FOR FIRST TIME IN NBC NEWS INTERVIEW WITH WIFE ON "WARREN COMMISSION REPORT"

A bizarre plan by Lee Oswald to hijack a plane to take him to Cuba will be revealed for the first time when an interview with Oswald's wife, Marina, conducted Sept. 10 in New Orleans by NBC News reporters, is telecast by NBC on "The Warren Commission Report" Sunday, Sept. 27 (6:30-7:30 p.m. EDT).

Oswald's abortive plan to enter Cuba by this devious plot occurred in July, 1963, approximately four months before the assassination of President Kennedy. Later, after the plan to seize a plane for Cuba was abandoned, Oswald did go to Mexico City and sought Russian and Cuban visas, which he did not succeed in obtaining.

The transcript of the interview with Marina Oswald relevant to this incident follows:

NBC NEWS REPORTER: This story about his wanting to grab, to steal an airplane and go to Cuba. Now, will you tell me about that in your own words.

MRS. OSWALD: I know Lee, he don't tell me his plan about Cuba, because, I don't know why, first time he wanted to try to, not to steal, seize airplane and go to Cuba, and first time he went just himself and I told him Lee, you can't do this. Anyway I didn't

want he do this, but I told him just don't do this because he can't. He is not so strong man to do this hisself and he told me okay, you help me, and I said how? And he explain me how, he want to fly in airplane with him and how this... and I told him that I just scared to death to hold his gun and it be very funny story, very funny picture for everybody, a pregnant woman with one child and hold his gun. And I left and I don't take this serious, and he was so upset about this. Probably he know I don't help him, and after this he wants to try some legal way and this reason you know he want to go to Mexico and after Mexico he want to go in Cuba.

Did you think he was serious about this plan to seize..

MRS. OSWALD:

Yes, I think he was serious. He really was serious. He think he can do this hisself. After he ask me about help and I was laughing and I said this looks like joke. I don't know. That time I think there really something wrong with him. He is so sick. You know just this way.

What did he plan to do?

MRS. OSWALD:

He told me he go in Mexico City and he want to visit to embassy, Cuban embassy and Russian embassy, and he want to he want to go first in Russian embassy and tell, you know it likes he

The shows (in black and white only) will begin 15 minutes before the start of each Series colorcast -- 30 minutes before game time. The first "Spotlight" program will be Wednesday, Oct. 7, at 12:30 p.m. EDT.

Co-sponsors will be General Mills Inc. (through Knox Reeves Advertising Inc.) and Joseph Schlitz Brewing Company (through Leo Burnett Company Inc.). General Mills has been a co-sponsor of the pre-game shows for the last five years.

"World Series Spotlight" will be taped each morning of a Series game in the city where that day's game is being played. Wolff, one of the commentators for NBC-TV's "Major League Baseball" telecasts, will have baseball personalities as guests to give their views on the game coming up and, after the opener, on the previous day's action.

ELECTION RESULTS, NETWORK ELECTION SERVICE ANNOUNCES

Oct. 7 Is Deadline for Applications to Purchase

Access to NES Tabulation Centers

Arrangements for tabulation of the Nov. 3 election results are virtually complete, Network Election Service said today.

Sites for tabulation centers in 50 states and the District of Columbia have been selected and organization of the 51 tabulation centers is under way, according to a spokesman for the cooperative arrangement among the three networks and two press associations. A mid-Manhattan hotel has been chosen for the national tabulation center, which will accumulate the national Presidential vote totals.

The press associations, Associated Press and United Press International, also are making plans for swift dissemination of totals in 547 Presidential, Senatorial, gubernatorial and Congressional races to their clients and members. Between them, AP and UPI serve virtually every daily newspaper, television station and radio station in the country.

The NES spokesman announced, however, that any news medium could participate in NES, either at the state or national level, upon payment of an appropriate share of the pool costs.

Any newspaper or broadcasting outlet that participates in NES at the state level will have the right to physical access to the NES

tabulation center in that state. A news medium that joins NES at the national level will have the right to physical access to the national tabulation center and to all state tabulation centers.

In addition, the NES spokesman said, any such news medium will have the right to receive at each center to which it has acquired physical access a separate copy of all vote totals produced by the pool at that center.

An NES ban against broadcasting facilities in tabulation centers would apply to any station that purchased access to a tabulation center, however.

Oct. 7 is the deadline for applications to purchase access to NES tabulation centers, the NES spokesman said. The deadline is necessary to allow NES to firm up space requirements in the tabulation centers, he said.

Opening Olympic Ceremonies, a World Series Game

and Texas-Oklahoma Grid Contest on Schedule

The most widespread live sports coverage in the history of television -- with originations in two hemispheres -- will be seen on NBC-TV Saturday, Oct. 10, in a schedule which will take viewers from the opening Tokyo ceremonies of the Games of the XVIII Olympiad to the U. S. ballpark where the day's World Series game will be played, and then to Dallas for the Texas-Oklahoma football game.

In addition, through NBC International, sports viewers in Mexico will be able to see the Olympics ceremonies live, as NBC's affiliated station WOAI-TV in San Antonio, Tex., routes the live broadcast received via Syncom III satellite to all Mexico through Telesistema in Mexico City.

The fact that each of the three major sports events will be seen live as they happen makes the NBC-TV sports schedule of Oct. 10 one of the most significant in the last 25 years to sports fans.

It was 25 years ago when NBC-TV presented the first telecast of a sports event -- the baseball game between Columbia and Princeton.

The Oct. 10 NBC-TV schedule (EDT) begins at 1 a.m. when, via the new Syncom III satellite, the opening ceremonies of the Games of

the XVIII Olympiad are telecast direct from Tokyo. The telecast, which is expected to last until 3 a.m., will feature the entrance of Emperor Hirohito at the opening ceremonies, as well as the parade of athletes, the address by Avery Brundage (President of the International Olympic Committee), the raising of the Olympic Flag, the arrival of the Olympic Flame, and the athletes taking the Olympic oath.

NBC-TV has set up its own broadcast center at the site of the Olympics in Tokyo, at the broadcasting facilities of NHK, the Japanese Broadcasting Company. NBC personnel, from producers to TV tape editors and operators, are already on the scene in Tokyo for the network's coverage of the Olympics, commencing with the Oct. 10 opening ceremonies and including all 20 sports in two weeks of coverage.

NBC International has plans to distribute the Olympic Games TV coverage in Latin America, Africa and the Caribbean. Because of the International Date Line and an "extra-rush" set-up planned by NBC International, TV tapes of the Olympic events will be available (in terms of local time in many overseas areas) within hours of their taking place.

The second major attraction in the NBC-TV record-setting day of sports coverage will be the colorcast of the World Series game, scheduled to begin at 1 p.m. EDT. Barring unexpected developments, Yankee Stadium will be the scene of this World Series game. NBC-TV will have its color mobile unit, consisting of five color cameras and one black and white camera, along with a technical staff of approximately 20 men, at the baseball park.

At approximately 4:45, the network will switch its sports attention to Dallas and the traditional NCAA football game between

Texas and Oklahoma. For the colorcast, NBC-TV will have about 25 technical men on the scene.

In addition to the three live sports attractions, other sports-related Oct. 10 NBC-TV programming -- some taped, some live -- will include pre-game and post-game World Series shows, a 30-minute sports program between the World Series game and the NCAA game, and pre-game and post-game football shows.

It is expected that NBC-TV will resume its regular programming at about 8 p.m. with "The Famous Adventures of Mr. Magoo," after the unprecedented scheduling of the largest and most far-reaching one-day sports programming.

NBC News correspondent Sander Vanocur will conduct the interviews in the studios of NBC-TV affiliates in states where the local races are being held, or in the regions where the Presidential race is being evaluated. The candidates will be interviewed separately.

For the opening report in "Today's" special pre-election series Tuesday, Oct. 6 (during the program's 7:30-8 a.m. segment), Vanocur will be in Philadelphia to interview the candidates in Pennsylvania's Senatorial contest -- Senator Hugh Scott, Republican, and Genevieve Blatt, Democrat.

On Thursday, Oct. 15 (during the 8:30-9 a.m. segment) "Today" will focus on the Ohio Senatorial contest. In Cleveland, Vanocur will interview Senator Stephen M. Young, Democrat, and Representative Robert Taft Jr., his Republican opponent.

The candidates in the Illinois gubernatorial race will be interviewed in Chicago Thursday, Oct. 22 (during the 7:30-8 a.m. segment). They are Governor Otto Kerner, Democrat, and Charles Percy, Republican.

Additional reports in the series will be announced soon.
